You'll Ante Up More Money For Postage May 16!

If you've been delaying that chore of writing a letter to a friend or loved one, better 'hitch up' and do it this week and save money. You can't even write your congressman and mail the letter for six cents next Sunday!

Beginning next Sunday, postage rates are going up. It will take eight cents to mail a letter, and 11 cents if you want it to go air mail. Even "penny" post cards will cost you six cents, if you use them.

All second and third-class rates, plus some fourth-class rates will increase by from 10 per cent to 20 per cent. Special delivery and registered mail also go up.

Talk about the cost of living! This is the cost of mailing that's skyrocketing, but some people you'd better write if you want to keep on living!

This boost, effective May 16, comes under what the Postal Service says is its authority to make temporary increases in postal rates pending a recommendation by the Postal Rate Commission-so all we can do



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
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
