## Voters Face Dual Elections May 18

## Haskell Man Is Killed In Car-Truck Accident Here Early Wednesday

A grinding car-truck crash claimed the life of a Haskell man in the early morning hours Wednesday. The accident occurred at the intersection of North Ave. E. and North 14th Street at 2:30 a. m. Wednesday. Dead upon arrival at the Haskell Memorial Hospital was Felipe Palacio of Haskell. According to investigating officers, the 1963 Chevrolet driven by Palacio was traveling west on 14th Street and pulled in front of a 1960 International truck-tractor trailer driven by Johnny Adolph Dormier of Iowa Park headed south on North Ave. E. The Palacio car was practically demolished, and some damage was done to the truck. Randy Trahan of Iowa Park was a passenger in the truck. Neither of the occupants were seriously injured. Funeral arrangements for Palacio are pending at Holden-McCauley Funeral Home in Haskell. The victim was employed on the Tom Bevel farm near Haskell. The accident was investigated by Patrolmen Skip Lane and James Davis, who were assisted by Troy Braswell, also of the Texas Highway Patrol.

authorized county officials. Haskell County having 8,512 inhabitants and less than 10,000 inhabitants, it is made mandatory by Constitutional law that an election be held to determine whether or not an Assessor-Collector of Taxes be added to the list of authorized county officials.

If a majority of voters approve adding an Assessor-Collector of Taxes, then such official shall be elected at the next General Election for such Constitutional term of office as is provided for other Assessor-Collectors in this State.

Heretofore Haskell County has elected a Sheriff and an Assessor-Collector of Taxes and has kept the two offices separated.

#### Amendments

The proposed amendments to the constitution follow:

No. 1: FOR or AGAINST the constitutional amendment to create a State Ethics Commission empowered to set rules of ethics for members of the Legislature, State officers and legislative officers, to investigate violations thereof, and to recommend compensation for the members of the Legislature and the Lieutenant Governor and recommend improvements and economy in the legislative process.

No. 2: FOR or AGAINST the constitutional amendment providing that the Legislature may propose an amendment to the Constitution at any session of the Legislature.

No. 3: FOR or AGAINST the constitutional amendment removing the limitation on the total State appropriations for assistance grants to the needy aged, the needy disabled, and the needy blind, and setting a limitation on total State appropriations during any fiscal year for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.

No. 4: FOR or AGAINST the constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) bonds to provide final assistance to cities and other public agencies for water quality enhancement purposes, providing for the improvement and continuance of the resources program, and establishing an interest ceiling on Water Development Bonds at 6% per annum.

## Rodeo Plans In Full Swing

**Haskell Jaycees to stage their wild and wooly rodeo on the nights of Thursday, Friday, Saturday, May 20-21-22.**

It is a pretty well known fact that the World's first rodeo was held in Pecos, Texas on July 4, 1883. This first competition between cowboys of neighboring ranches was really nothing more than a roping contest with the action taking place in the dusty street of the little western town.

Since that humble beginning some 88 years ago, rodeo has grown by leaps and bounds until it has attained national and worldwide fame. It has been presented before the Kings and Queens of England and before all classes of people in the Americas, Australia and little known islands of the Pacific by

cowboys in the uniform of Uncle Sam during the World War. Madison Square Garden of New York City and many other famous gardens in the United States have featured rodeo for many years as one of their chief annual attractions. It had its origin, of course, from the everyday work done by the cowboys on the range as they pitted their skill and ability to ride and rope the outlaw cattle and horses.

There have been few ranches which did not have some near unrideable horses that were turned out by the cowboys string or "remuda", as his own particular bunch of horses was known. Naturally, all cowboys were not good bronc riders and usually on the largest ranches a bronc peeler or bronc stomper, would be hired to do nothing but ride the rough edge off of the ranch horses which were later turned over to the

## You'll Ante Up More Money For Postage May 16!

If you've been delaying that chore of writing a letter to a friend or loved one, better "hitch up" and do it this week—and save money. You can't even write your congressman and mail the letter for six cents next Sunday!

Beginning next Sunday, postage rates are going up. It will take eight cents to mail a letter, and 11 cents if you want it to go air mail. Even "penny" post cards will cost you six cents, if you use them.

All second and third-class rates, plus some fourth-class rates will increase by from 10 per cent to 20 per cent. Special delivery and registered mail also go up.

Talk about the cost of living! This is the cost of mailing that skyrocketing, but some people you'd better write if you want to keep on living!

This boost, effective May 16, comes under what the Postal Service says is its authority to make temporary increases in postal rates pending a recommendation by the Postal Rate Commission—so all we can do is ante up!

## Lengthy Agenda By City Council

Haskell City Council met in regular session Tuesday night with a full business agenda facing them.

A trio of citizens, John Thewanger, Carl Bailey and J. W. Aycock, presented the Council with a petition bearing approximately 100 signatures, concerning the teen-age dances sponsored by the local Jaycees. Their concern was in the alleged consumption of alcoholic beverages. Representing the Jaycees were Frank Jenkins, Von Marr, Charles Thornhill and Ben McGee, who assured those present that the dances were properly chaperoned, gave full facts and opinion of the club. A lengthy discussion was heard, and the Council asked that all involved investigate in person for the facts of the matter, and a decision would be made.

Announcement was made of the impending retirement of Alfred Fowler from city employment after 20-odd years. State Highway Department building and land has been offered to the school or city for purchase and will be investigated. An Equalization Board will be appointed and a date set at a future meeting. A tax percentage of 65 and 35 was set to General and Interest and Sinking Fund; bids were opened on a new police car and Council voted to buy a Plymouth; Belton Duncan gave a report on the Air Port.

Council then heard Ollie Lewis, L. C. Johnson and Bul Whitaker request cost estimate to residents of Avenue A to 14th street for paving that section of road, and adding street lights.

Councilmen Carl Anderson, W. O. Holden, Mayor pro tem Belton Duncan, Lorraine Johnson and Buster Gholson were present, along with City Secretary, Ira Hester and City Water Superintendent Marvin Collins. Also present for the meeting were Charles Thornhill, Frank Jenkins and Von Marr, along with publisher Bill Comedy.

Kent is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Delbert Lefevre, and his grade average was 92.27.

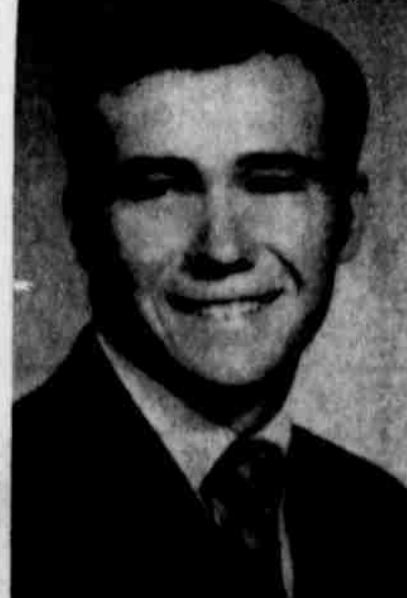

Above is a sample ballot that Haskell County Voters will be voting on Tuesday, May 18. The purpose of this Election is to either keep the Tax-Assessor Collector's office and the Sheriff's office

separated; or to combine the two into one office. We feel the two offices should be kept separate for all practical purposes. When a county falls below 10,000 population, by law the

two offices are combined, unless the Voters vote to keep them separated. To do this, mark the ballot where it says "FOR" adding an Assessor-Collector of Tax to the list of authorized County officials.

If absentee balloting is any indication, voters of Haskell County are showing very little interest in the forthcoming election on Tuesday, May 18, when four proposed constitutional amendments will be voted upon, in addition to adding an Assessor-Collector to the list of authorized county officials.

Voting by absentee may be done in the office of Mrs. Lee McKeivain, County Clerk. Absentee balloting will end tomorrow, Friday, May 14.

## Beauty In The Country

"I just like flowers," is the answer you get when you ask Mr. Cliff Dunnam what began his acre of garden. "About seven years ago I began a small iris garden, and as people heard I was collecting different kinds, they would drop by with a couple or so of new ones," he explained as he hoed the practically non-existent weeds from the beds. Friends did the same thing with cactus plants, as they learned he had added them to his collection. He gets both from all over the southwest, and his collection has grown to over 300 different varieties of iris and hundreds of cactus, including a whole greenhouse of miniature plants.

Mrs. J. R. Perry, a great fan of the Dunnam's, tipped me off to his beautiful garden, and showed me the way to their farm. It was a real treat, and proved to be one of the beauty spots in Haskell County. But, Mrs. Dunnam hastened to assure me it was his garden, and she just helped whenever he needed her. "He lets me pick the old blooms off the plants every morning," she laughed, "and he will let me water them, if I do so carefully."

The iris are planted in rows with two plants of each variety labeled neatly for the viewer. There's also a huge bed of

Texas bluebonnets that adds to the glory of the garden, plus a big bed of dahlias, another of day lilies, and the aforementioned cactus garden, landscaped with lava rock, driftwood, and beautifully shaped and colored stones.

Then, just when you think you must have seen it all, Cliff Dunnam casually mentions that you can take a peek in the greenhouse, if you want. This turns into another "Oh" and "Ahh" session. Huge boulders of lava rock are planted with a miniature cactus in every crevice, and big pots of other plants are all over the room.

But, that's not all! The Dunnam's also have an "African Violet" room in their home—a crowning climax to the miniature. Over 30 varieties are in full bloom at all times here, in every conceivable color.

Visitors to the Dunnam gardens have become so numerous that they've invested in a "guest register" and urge everyone to register as they leave.

"I'm told it's a common sight to see Mr. Dunnam almost any time you drive by, with his pipe in the corner of his mouth, carefully working around the plants with a hoe, Amelia Perry, an old family friend, was chiding him for getting more rain recently than they had received down around Paint Creek, and Mr. Dunnam (an avid Democrat) replied, "Well, you see, there just aren't many Republicans living in my part of the county, and you know it always rains on the Democrats!"

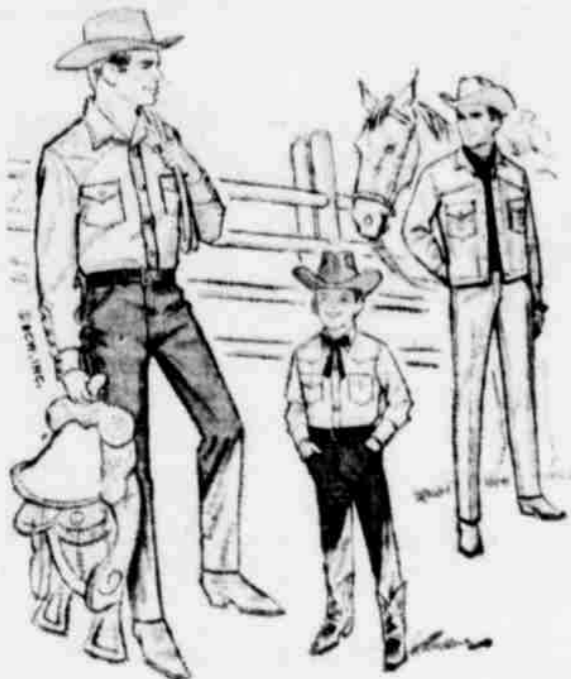

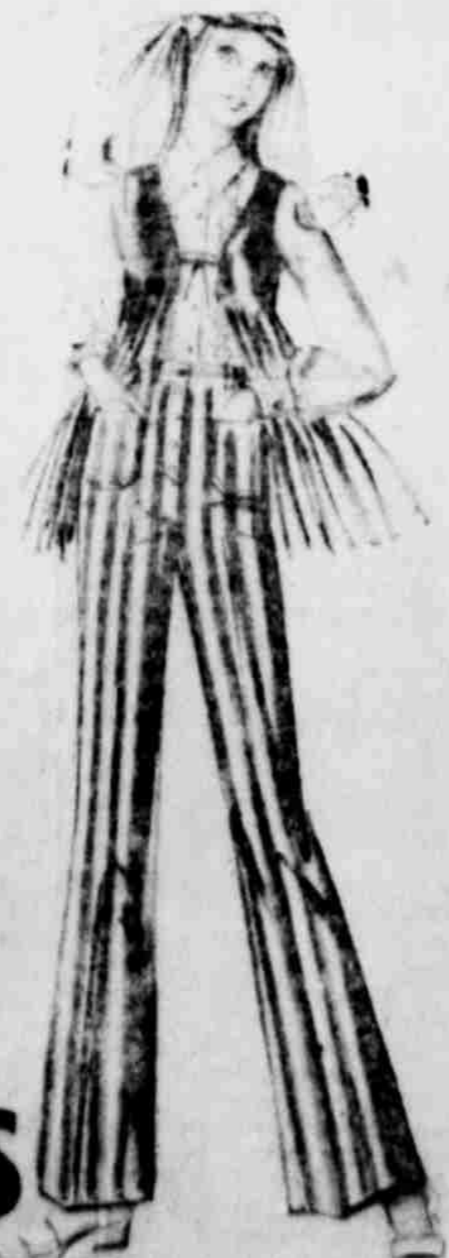

(Continued from Page 1) steer tying and bull riding were added and the rodeo was in its heyday, being staged in baseball parks and any available site.

The first saddle bronc riding contests were quite different from the ones seen in the arena today as the bucking horses were led out in the center of the arena where he was snub-

bed down, saddled and mounted by the rider who had to stay with him until he quit bucking to be able to make a qualified ride.

Today's rodeo with its colorful and daring exhibition acts, its funny clowns and the streamlined presentation for the approval of the spectators, has come a long way since that July 4th in Pecos, Texas.

Similar to the other great sporting contests of the nation, the cowboys have their own Hall of Fame that pays tribute to outstanding cowboys, one of which is the late Will Rogers.

But, not to be outdone by the cowboys, the famous bucking horses also have their own place in the history of the rodeo and the west, and when bronc riders get together, there is usually a swapping of yarns about the great bucking horses.

Perhaps the most well known and outstanding bucking horse was in his heyday over 80 years ago. He was Steamboat who got his name from the results of an accident which impaired his nostrils to such a degree that when he breathed heavily he made a sound quite like that of a steamboat whistle on a river boat. Some historians of the west claim that Steamboat was never ridden even though he bucked for many years in the greatest rodeos and was mounted by the top bronc riders of his era. Others say that he was ridden once or twice in his rodeo career.

After Old Steamboat there came other top bucking horses that gave the cowboys a bad time for the eight seconds required to stay on top to make a qualified ride according to the judges. Some of these were: Midnight, Five Minutes to Midnight, Hell's Angels, Red Gold, Amos and Andy, of the Baetler Brothers string of rodeo stock over 30 years ago. Also, a well known bucking horse familiar to this area was Blue Jay who was still unseating cowboys in the arena of the ripe old age of 32 years. He first made his appearance in Haskell in the early 20's with a wild west show which was held behind Coffield's Department Store on land now occupied by the Fieldan Motel.

And of course at Stamford, home of the Texas Cowboy Reunion, there have appeared some top horses, especially Candy Wagon, Dr. Blackwell and Sauerkraut, all three of which made some good cowboys "pull leather."

There will also be some late editions of famous bucking horses coming out of the chutes at Haskell on the dates of May 20, 21 and 22 as the Jaycees stage their annual Rice Springs Rodeo. The Campbell and Cordell Rodeo Company of Childress, Texas will have a top string of rodeo stock and some 200 cowboys and cowgirls will be here to provide plenty of a thrill and thrills and spills for the lovers of the great outdoor sport of rodeo.

The 18 counties above bring to 99 the number of counties under the drought program. The program is a continuation of the drought relief program authorized in 1956. The program provides for the purchase of feed grain at reduced prices and hay transportation assistance to eligible livestock owners in 18 additional counties in Texas, hard hit by drought. They are: Archer, Baylor, Burleson, Cottle, Denton, Fisher, Foard, Hamilton, Haskell, Kleberg, Knox, Madison, Robertson, Sterling, Scurry, Washington, Wichita and Wilbarger.
