Pioneer and Continental merged in April, 1955, retaining the Continental Airlines names. Continental transferred Charles from Dallas to Denver in 1956, as sales promotion manager.

In 1958, Continental named Charles passenger sales manager, and in 1959, he became Director of Sales. He was promoted to assistant vice president, sales, in 1960, and to Vice President, field sales, 1961. He was made Vice Presiden!, Sales, in 1962. Continental moved its General Offices from Denver to Los Angeles in 1932.

Charles is a trustee of the Continental Foundation. He is vice president of the One Shot Antelope Club, which has its annual hunt in September at Lander, Wyo.
