Members of the Haskell Volunteer Fire Department decorated the rodeo grounds and the downtown section of the city on Monday night of this week for the sole purpose of providing a colorful background for the big western street parade which is scheduled to kick-off promptly at 5 p. m. today, Thursday, May 14th, under the direction of C. O. Holt and Dale Lawrence. The gala parade will officially introduce the annual Rice Springs Rodeo, sponsored by the Haskell Jaycees in conjunction with the Frontier Days celebration under the auspices of the Chamber of Commerce.

Downtown Haskell is expected to be crowded with visitors and local folks for the parade which will feature rodeo queens, visiting riding clubs and cowgirls' Poses, cowboys and cowgirls, old time vehicles and many other entries.

The music will be provided by both the High School and Junior High Bands under the direction of Wendell Gideon and also old time breakdown music furnished by Clarence Meier and his western entertainers.

Glenda Gayle Chapman, last year's rodeo queen, will have the spotlight in front of the horseback riders and will serve as hostess as reigning queen of the parade.

The parade will form at the rodeo grounds and will enter the square on the southeast corner by the Haskell Free Press, go down the south side and turn right at Jones & Cox, turn left at Sherman's Floor Co., then right at Biard's Cleaners and make another right in front of Dick's Super Market, then go south by Lane-Felkers and in front of the business establishments on the North side, then left at Oate's Drug, past the M-System Super Market where it will turn right again to hit the square for a trip down the east side before going back to the rodeo grounds where they will be the guests of the Chamber of Commerce for a chuckwagon supper prior to the grand entry and first rodeo performance scheduled for 8 p. m.

Other entries desiring to participate are urged to contact the Chamber of Commerce or Dale Lawrence at Perry Brothers, so they may be allotted ample space in the long and colorful parade.

Rotary Club Members Hear James Powell

James Powell, co-owner of the Haskell Livestock Auction, spoke to members of the Rotary Club at last Thursday's noon-day meeting at the City Cafe, Mayor H. V. Woodard was program chairman for the day and introduced the speaker.

Mr. Powell, referring to the full-page ad which appeared in the Frontier Days Celebration and Rice Springs Rodeo edition last week, presented facts and figures on the operation of the local sales barn under his and Pete Burkhalter's management.

Powell stated that they had begun their fourth year of operation in Haskell and that the first year they sold some 20,000 head of cattle, but that in 1969 over 52,000 head were sold. The sale barn is now employing on a weekly average 58 persons in the large scale operations with many of these employees being high school and college young men whom Mr. Powell said made the best hands.

Over seven million dollars gross receipts was experienced by the sale in 1969 and Powell stated they had set their goal on hopes for this year to reach 10,000 head as he stressed the fact that we are in the hog production area of the state.

"Major hog buyer is from Trenton, Missouri, and the chief purchaser of cattle last week was Mr. Cassidy from Illinois," Powell said.

Following Mr. Powell's talk, Mayor Woodard stressed the importance of the Haskell Livestock Auction's operation to both the city and county as well as for all business people.

Pearsey And Norton Have Polished A Lot of Leather Over Various Trails



In cowboy lingo, the two old-timers pictured above have polished a lot of saddle leather as they drove the longhorn cattle over the various trails of West Texas. They are "Iron" Pearsey, age 95, of Haskell, and R. E. Norton, age 82, of Quanah, Texas. Both were active in the cattle industry in the early days as drovers and as ranchers and many interesting and colorful stories of those days can be related by each as he recalls the past.

They are reminiscing of the last and perhaps only rodeo performance which both attended at the same time. That was the Texas Cowboy Reunion which was held in Haskell in July of 1898 about a mile southwest of town on what is now the Phippen Farm. R. L. (Spot) Lemmon (not pictured) was also on hand for the Texas Cowboy Reunion held here in 1898.

Mr. Norton's father settled in the Quanah area in 1856 after coming overland from Stephens County. A retired rancher, he is now the oldest living native of Hardeman County and recalls with vivid memory when he and his parents, a sister and an old maid, came by covered wagon from Quanah to Haskell especially to attend the rodeo in 1898. He said the trip took four days and they camped out and lived on 'cotton tail rabbits'.

Mr. Norton and a friend and associate rancher, J. T. Leese of Eldorado, Oklahoma and Texas, were in Haskell on Wednesday of last week looking over the town and the site where the first rodeo was held, along with Mr. Pearsey.

Norton said his parents came by covered wagon in 1886 and camped out on the Pease River. He laughingly tells about his mother who had a jug of buttermilk which froze that night in the early spring.

His father was the rider of "Old Hub", which they led behind the wagon to Haskell, and the winner of the first cutting horse contest ever held in America. His father was perhaps the last of the old-time trail drivers and drove herds of cattle numbering 1200 each year from Quanah to Wheeler County long after the other ranchers had resorted to the railroads. He was the first Pioneer rancher who started raising Hereford cattle, having purchased a bull in Kansas to stock his herds

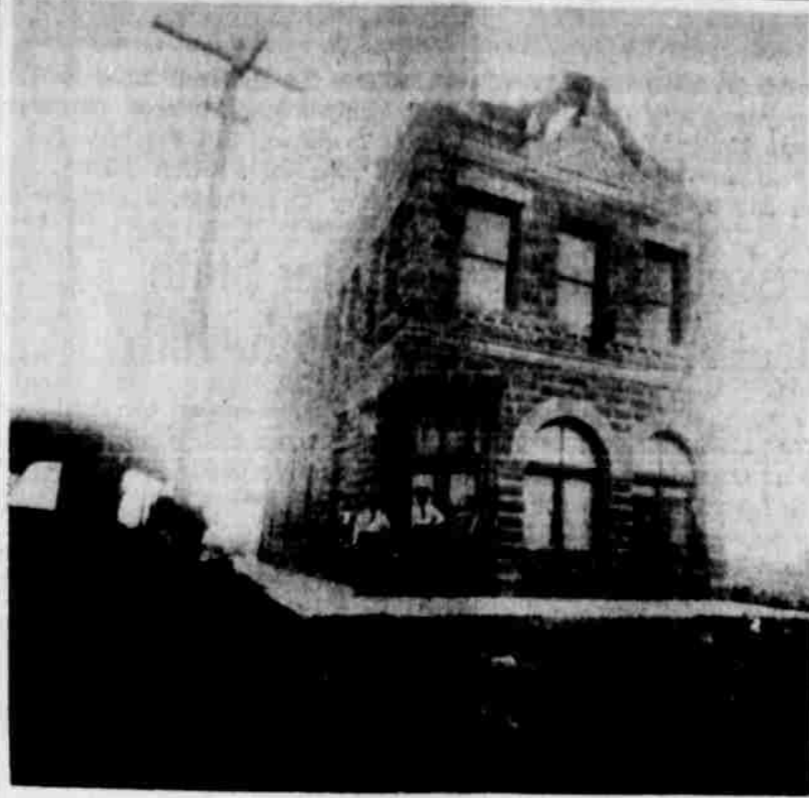

S. 277 in Haskell County from E.M. 2163 in Haskell to the Knox County line. The proposed highway project will bypass the city of Weinert.

The usual construction will consist of an additional roadway of 24 ft. pavement, a usual 76 ft. depressed median, and right-of-way widened to 260 ft. except (1) on the section from E.M. 2163 to 1.5 miles North where the present highway will be widened to a 32 ft. pavement for a four-lane undivided highway with a 4 ft. painted median on the existing usual 100 ft. right-of-way, and (2) in the vicinity of Weinert where a four-lane divided highway is proposed on a new location consisting of two 24 ft. pavements, a usual 76 ft. depressed median, and 260 ft. new right-of-way.

Maps and other drawings showing the proposed geometric design will be displayed at the public hearing and together with any other available information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the Resident Engineer's Office at 249 North Central Avenue in Hamlin.

Also, the drawings showing the proposed geometric design have been placed on file with the State's Relocation Assistance Program, the benefits and information concerning the relocation assistance office will be discussed.

Tentative schedules for right-of-way acquisition and construction will be discussed.

All interested citizens are invited to attend this public hearing. Written statements and other exhibits may be submitted to the Resident Engineer's Office, but must be received not later than 10 days after the public hearing.

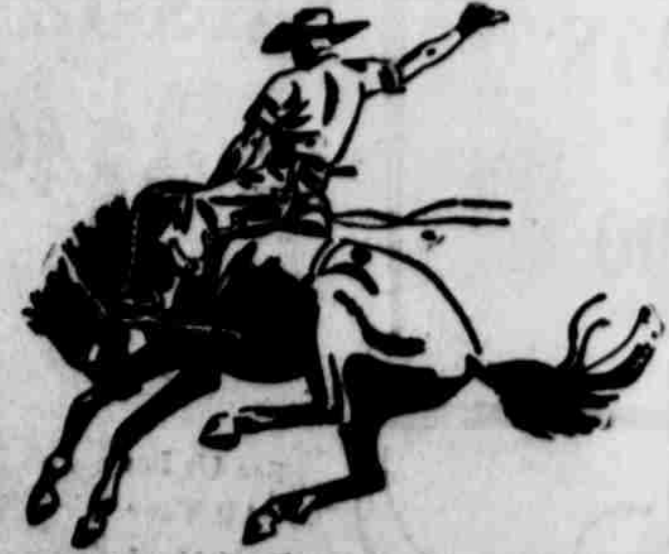
