

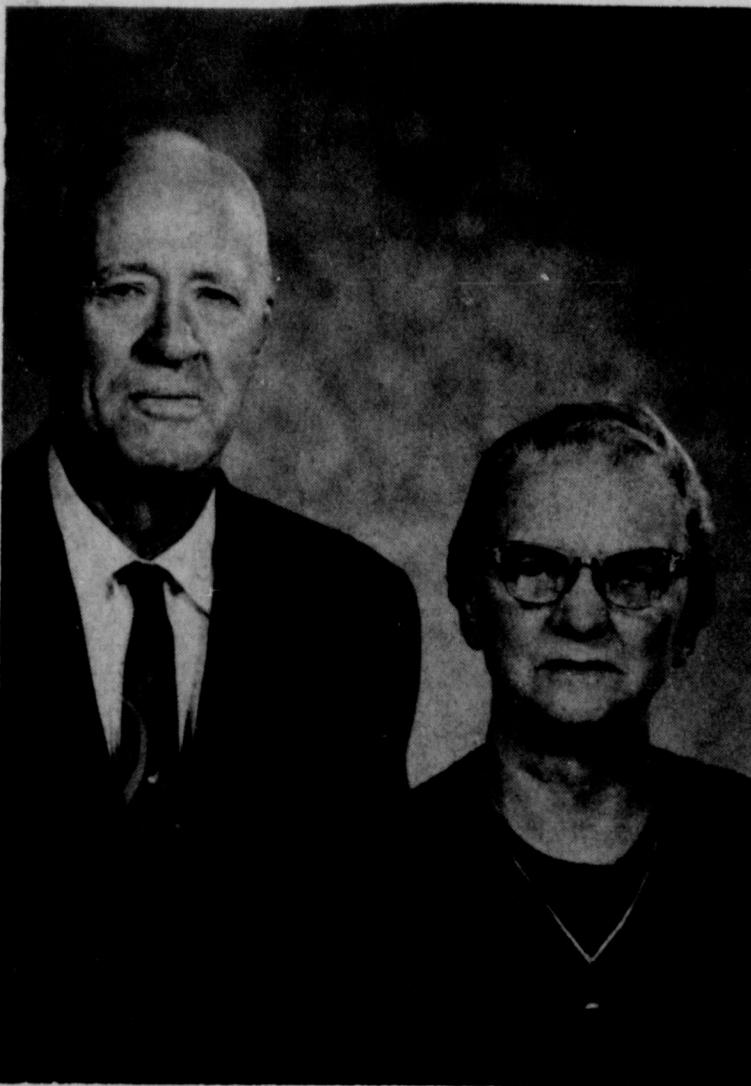

Milton Oscar Hood was born Dec. 7, 1886, in Ethridge, Tenn., and moved with his parents to Manor, Travis County, Texas, in 1895.

Chloe Lee Morton was born April 21, 1894, at Dublin, Texas.

Milton Oscar Hood and Chloe Lee Morton were married June 1, 1916, in Ellasville, Texas. The Rev. O. A. Morton, brother of the bride, officiated.

Mr. and Mrs. Hood and their two children, Jimmie Lee and Thomas Milton, moved to Abernathy in June of 1937, from Afton, Texas, where Mr. Hood was vocational agriculture teacher in the Patton Springs High School. Mr. Hood was vocational

agriculture teacher in Abernathy High School from 1937 until he retired in 1948. He has served as United States Weather Observer in Abernathy the past 25 years.

Prior to coming to Abernathy, Hood taught school 10 years in Erath County and three years in McLennan County. His career as a school teacher covered a span of 33 years.

Mr. and Mrs. Hood's daughter and son both were graduated from Abernathy High School.

Following high school, Miss Jimmie Lee Hood attended the college for women at Denton, and entered the teaching profession. She was born while her parents resided in Dublin.

The Hoods' son, Thomas Milton, was born May 7, 1924, at Speegleville. After graduating from AHS May 16, 1941, he attended college at Stephenville and A & M College before enlisting in the U. S. Marine Corps in June, 1944.

Thomas Milton Hood was killed in action on Iwo Jima in March, 1945.

Abernathy's American Legion Post No. 500, organized after World War II, was named for Joe Barton, who gave his life for his country in World War I and for Thomas Milton Hood, who paid the supreme sacrifice for freedom in the world during WW II. Barton was a brother of Jack Barton of this community. Lee Echols is Commander of Barton-Hood Post No. 500, American Legion.

LUBBOCK - More than 1,500 students received degrees at Texas Tech's commencement exercises May 28.

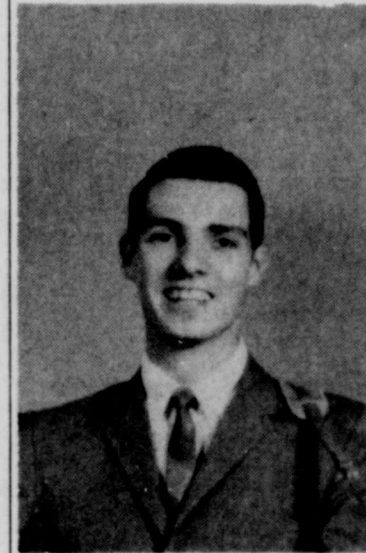

## Hale Grain Yield High

Hale County's grain sorghum production for 1965 was 15,709,000 bushels according to final figures released by Grain Sorghum Producers Association.

This was a gain of 2,833,000 bushels, or a 10.8% increase over the 1964 crop which was 12,876,000 bushels.

This ranked it 2 in grain sorghum production among all counties in Texas according to Y. F. Snodgrass, South Plains, Rep. GSPA. Parmer County again led the state and nation in grain sorghum production with 18,683,500 bushels this past year. The trend for the past several years has been increased grain sorghum production in this county and in Texas.

Texas, the number one grain sorghum producing state, had a production of 285,740,000 bushels in 1965 which was 43% of the total grain sorghum produced in the nation. All Panhandle Counties had increased grain sorghum production in 1965.

The 1965 grain sorghum crop was the largest ever in Texas and the Nation. National production was 666,062,000 bushels, 35% above last year and 21% above the five-year average.

The biggest production shift came in the 13-county North Plains of Texas area which produced 81,111,600 bushels of grain sorghum in 1965 which was 12% of the national production and 21% of the Texas production.

The Coastal Bend area around Corpus Christi also registered increases in grain sorghum production. Nueces County moved up to the 4th place producer in the State with 12,784,000 bushels. Even in the heart of the traditional cotton area of the South Plains, grain sorghum showed gains. Lubbock County itself leaped from 4,715,000 bushels in 1964 to 6,104,000 bushels in 1965.

It is expected that the increasing grain sorghum production trend will continue this year, particularly in the North Plains, Coastal Bend and South Plains.

Along with these production increases, utilization of grain sorghum has steadily increased at home and abroad through intensive promotion program by Grain Sorghum Producers Association. When such programs were started in 1956, livestock use of sorghum was 179 million bushels, now it is 479 million. Exports in the same period have moved from 22 million bushels to over 200 million in 1965. The other major uses of grain sorghum, commercial and industrial, now

Suttle of Abernathy; treasurer, Mrs. Dick Dye and legislative director, Ralph Wayne. The business session of the meeting was presided over by Dye, outgoing club president.

Other business included both a brief discussion of the Hale County Young Democrats Club and a vote of thanks to the work of outgoing county officers. A covered-dish supper preceded the meeting.

Don Appling, Hockley County Democratic Chairman, introduced George, who spoke on the history and present accomplishments of the Democratic Party.

George stated that the meeting was well-timed, dated on the 174th birthday of the Democratic Party. He said, "The birth of the Democratic Party is usually given as May 23, 1792, the date of a letter from Thomas Jefferson to President Washington giving the name of the party Jefferson led."

"A Democrat looks into his party and learns that he belongs to the oldest political party in the world," George stated. He said the longevity could be traced to "turbulence, disorder, adventure, imagination and hopes, but not fears."

The legislator closed his speech with comments that Texas has launched itself into a new economic boost through the Democratic Party and that the political aspirations of the people have been sought for an overall better life.

## Highway 87 Improvement Scheduled

A road construction contract which when finished will complete the gap of a four-lane highway from Lubbock to Amarillo, was awarded last week in Austin.

The contract, totaling \$1,704,604 was awarded jointly to Boswell and Crafton, Inc. of Lubbock and Sira and Payne Inc. and Ben Sira, Dallas.

Lubbock District highway engineer Oscar Crain said the project a bypass of New Deal, will be 8.4 miles in length and will include three overpasses on Highway 87.

Main part of the construction will be in the New Deal area, where the three overpasses will be erected, all three being just west of there.

Crain explained the project was to bypass downtown New Deal, its present route, because "we couldn't build an adequate facility through town because there isn't sufficient right-of-way."

He said included in the work was the addition of two lanes and reconstruction of some parts of the existing roadway. The project will commence at the Monroe Overpass just north of the Lubbock Experimental Farm and will end one mile south of Abernathy, where it will join an existing four-lane bypass of that town.

An overpass, four lanes wide, will cross Farm Road 1729 just west of New Deal, while two other four-lane overpasses are planned for just north and south of the town, "to allow traffic to move freely to and from New Deal without crossing the highway."

The widening of the roadway is expected to get underway "within the next 30 to 60 days and is hoped to be finished in about a year."

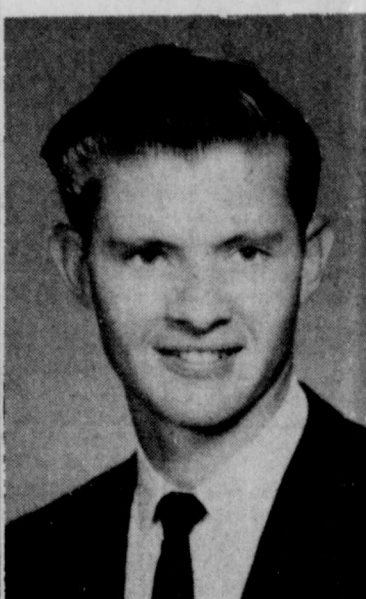

An organization meeting of the Abernathy Citizens Band Radio Club will be held in the City Hall Thursday, June 2nd at 8:00 p.m.

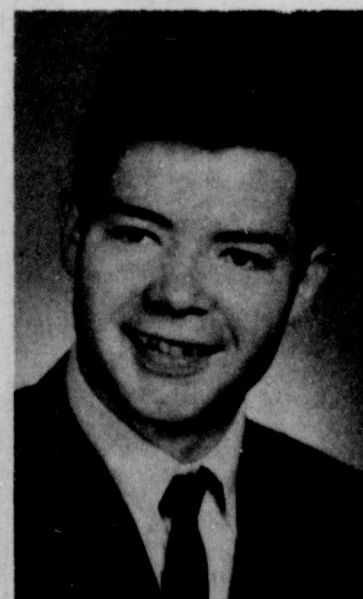
One of the purposes of the Club would be to help in Civil Defense matters. Anyone interested in CB Radios or in Civil Defense are invited to attend this meeting.

Smitty Covey, treasurer, reported that the club had a balance of \$265.90.

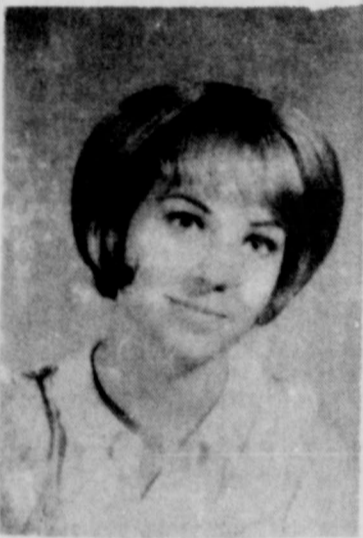
