Rev. Ryan Is New Pastor Of First Methodist

After serving the past six years as pastor of the First Methodist Church in Ralls, the Rev. Conrad Ryan has been appointed to serve as pastor of the First Methodist Church at Abernathy.

The Rev. Mr. Ryan delivered his farewell sermon at Ralls Sunday, and the Ryans moved to Abernathy this week.

Appointed by the conference board to replace Brother Ryan at Ralls is the Rev. H. B. Coggin, who was serving as pastor of the First Methodist Church in Tulla. The Rev. Mr. Coggin served as pastor of the Tulla church four years. He moved from Abernathy to Tulla.

The Rev. Mr. Ryan assumed his duties as pastor in Ralls June 5, 1960. He has been preaching for 31 years, and has been a pastor for 24 of these years. He has served as secretary of the Conference Board of Evangelism for 10 years.

Brother Ryan and his wife, Geraldine, and their 14-year-old daughter, Anita, are moving to Abernathy. Anita will be a sophomore student this fall. Their son, Mel, 18, graduated last month from Ralls High School and has enrolled as a

student at McMurry College, Abilene. The Ryan's eldest daughter, Wanda, is married to Carroll Dean Powell and she and her husband are teaching at Boys Ranch near Amarillo.

The Rev. Mr. Ryan is to preach his first sermon as pastor here Sunday. He follows the Rev. Leland Spurrer, who moved to Lubbock as pastor of the Oakwood Methodist Church.

Area Farmer Fatally Shot

Dudley P. Wallace, 49, Cotton Center farmer, was pronounced dead upon arrival at Hi-Plains Hospital, Hale Center, Thursday night, by Justice of the Peace Delbert Beaton, Abernathy.

According to a report filed by investigating Sheriff's Deputy Al Duckworth, Wallace was found by his wife in the bedroom of his home about 10:45 p.m. Death was attributed to two bullet wounds in his chest. A .38 caliber pistol was found near the body.

Wallace said Mrs. Wallace was in the living room and heard two shots fired. A spokesman at Hale County Sheriff's office said it was understood Mr. Wallace had been in ill health.

Funeral rites were held Saturday in Cotton Center Methodist Church. Burial was in Resthaven Memorial Park, Lubbock.

Wind, Hail and Rain Storm Strikes Area

Tornadoic winds swept through the area late Friday afternoon, from south to north, smashing a barn on the Struve place about a mile and one-half east of town, hurting two men.

The twisting wind was flanked on both sides by near-hurricane force wind that swished through the east part of Abernathy, and at the airport 5 miles east of

town, where one RAFB T-41 plane was destroyed and another badly damaged. Reports said wind at the airport reached about 87 MPH at times during the storm.

Jimmy Waits, 18, and his uncle, Stanley Waits, were injured when a barn used as hatchery-brooder for geese and chickens blew down on them

during the twisting storm at the Struve farm. Jimmy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Monroe Waits, was treated here, then taken to a Lubbock hospital by Chambers. He sustained a broken ankle, abrasions and a possible back injury. Stanley was treated for head lacerations at Abernathy Medical Clinic and released.

The wind was accompanied by a heavy downpour of rain and hail, which damaged crops in areas southeast, east and northeast of Abernathy. A large number of smaller buildings in the path of the twisting portion of the storm were demolished.

The storm, spawned south of Lubbock, ripped through the Hub City, hit here and the east edge of Hale Center and the west part of Plainview. Damage in Lubbock and Plainview was heavy.

New Wheat Farm Acreage Applications Now Available

Farmers who wish to be considered for a "new farm" allotment for the 1967 crop of winter wheat on a farm which does not have a 1966 wheat allotment should get in touch with the ASCS county office during the next few weeks. E. J. Pope, Jr., Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, said today. Such farmers have until July 1 to file applications for such an allotment.

A producer eligible to file such an application is one with a farm for which no wheat allotment has been established and for which neither the owner nor the operator has an interest in the wheat allotment on any other farm, who has available land and adequate equipment and facilities for the successful production of a wheat crop on the farm, who during the last 5 years has had at least 2 years' experience in producing wheat, and who as an operator expects to receive 50 percent or more of the current year's income from the total production on the farm (not including the anticipated income from wheat produced on a "new farm" allotment).

Other factors are involved, and it is suggested that interested producers discuss the details with officials at the ASCS county office.

The Chairman said that formal application for a "new farm" wheat allotment may be made by filing a written application at the ASCS county office prior to the July 1 deadline.

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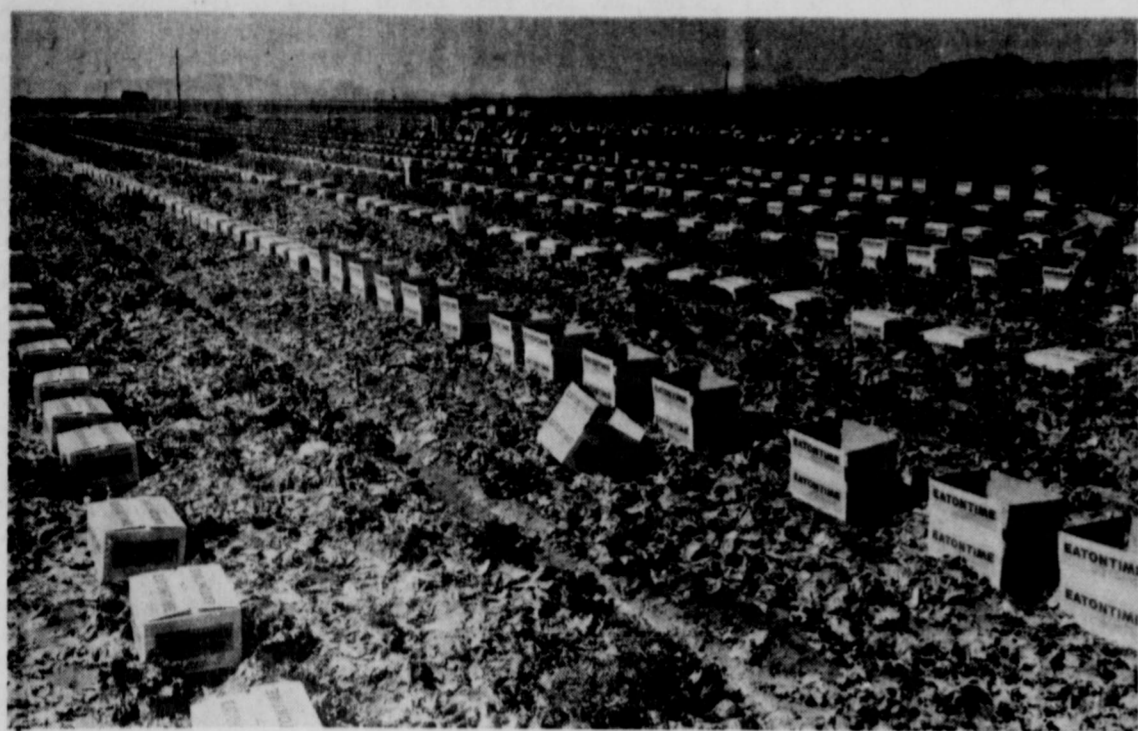

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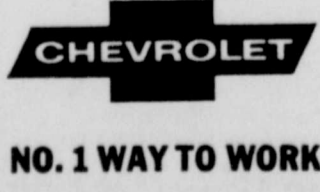
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
