# Jay Johnson Is Featured At Six Flags Over Texas

"You don't understand---you dummy!" says "idea man" Jay J. Jay to a male member of the mythical Gilchrist University student body in this year's Campus Revue staged at SIX FLAGS Over Texas. Titled "Let's Do It!" (Let's Find a Cause) the musical will run all summer at the historical-theme park which is located midway between Dallas and Fort Worth at Arlington.

The star of the musical production is "Squeaky," known to the Gilchrist student body as Mr. Jay. He is "controlled" and given a voice by Jay Johnson, 16-year-old senior at Richardson High School in Richardson. Jay is the grandson of Mrs. Oma Toler of Abernathy. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Noel Johnson of Richardson.

As part of the nightly performance in the SIX FLAGS Over Texas amphitheater, "the dummy" outsings its friend, Jay Johnson, in a show-stopping arrangement of "Supercalifragilisticexpialidocious." Jay displays a good singing voice for "the dummy" as well as his own singing technique.

Jay J. Jay, better known as "the Brain," is the Number One "thinker" for colleges and is hired to get Gilchrist University national fame. The production finds J. J. J. willing to duck out of the picture when the male population around Gilchrist finds out that "the dummy" plans to convert the

cause--to turning Gilchrist into a girls' school. The audience watches the little man take over Gilchrist as quick as a wink.

Dressed in a Gilchrist cheering outfit with a beany atop his head, Mr. Jay watches other entertainers perform in the "Glitters Revue." Besides trying to find a cause for Gilchrist, Mr. Jay has plenty of time to judge a campus beauty contest and get off with a couple of real live "dolls" for souvenirs. The only cause that Jay J. Jay seems to care about is---Girls! And Gilchrist has plenty of them.

It all started seven years

ago when a nine-year-old Abernathy child picked up a doll with a moveable mouth and began to "throw" his voice. Ever since then, Jay Johnson has been performing as a ventriloquist in one way or another. Jay explains between performances of the Campus Revue at SIX FLAGS that he has always been fascinated with things involving a mystery---such as ventriloquy. With seven years of experience behind him, Jay decided to try out for the Revue. He won a place in the musical and became the center of the production as well. Jay says that "Squeaky" had a difficult transition to make

before he became Mr. Jay. "Squeaky" is not the only performer in Jay's family. Among, "Squeaky's" pet boa constrictor, Captain Scuttiebutt, "Squeaky's" grandfather, and Ollie, the alligator, all take time to voice their opinions around the Johnson home. Performing at banquets and special occasions is Jay's specialty and he plans to continue as a ventriloquist as long as possible.

Jay's first performance was before a farmer's banquet in Abernathy about six years ago. He has done TV commercials and guest appearances. Jay believes that to be a good performer one should be completely relaxed and natural. Jay is the first to admit that his dummy sometimes seems to "think for himself" in an uncanny sort of way. "Squeaky" can insult everyone and get away with it. He was ordered from New York six years ago and is made of plastic, paper mache, and foam rubber.

Jay J. Jay and Jay Johnson will appear over 250 times in the summer-long engagement at SIX FLAGS Over Texas. Jay was selected from a group of more than 1,200 collegians who auditioned for the show earlier in the Spring when SIX FLAGS talent scouts toured college campuses in the Southwestern and Midwestern states.

Jay's paternal grandmother is Mrs. A. N. Johnson, Roswell, N.M., formerly of Abernathy. His father is a former superintendent of Abernathy Schools.



## J. C. Hurst Rites Held Friday

Mr. Hurst, a native of England, served in the British Navy before coming to the United States. He served in the US Navy Sea Bees during World War II.

He was discharged from the Sea Bees in late 1945. He liquidated all of his holdings here and in Hale Center, and in 1947, he and Mrs. Hurst moved to the state of Washington, where he was employed on a daily newspaper before going to San Francisco.
