## 41 Marked For Death In Traffic

AUSTIN - Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety reported today that DPS estimates indicate that 41 persons will die in traffic accidents during the three-day Labor Day weekend.

"The current traffic trend indicates that Texas is headed for its third straight record high in terms of fatal accidents," Garrison said. "At the present time we are approximately 15 per cent ahead of the same time in 1965. . . and we are still faced with the four months of the year which generally produce the most deaths."

"More people are killed in Texas each year in traffic than are killed in all the United States by murder and homicide," Garrison continued, "and the deaths are just as senseless, as needless and as tragic, but not nearly as well publicized."

"Psychologists say that one reason the general public fails to take positive action in matters of traffic safety is due to a lack of personal identification with the problem. It might behoove each driver in our state to stop and consider that he has less than a 50-50 chance to go through his driving career without being involved in a traffic mishap, or without incurring injury to himself or one of his family. The 41 persons expected to die in traffic during the Labor Day weekend.

In an attempt to offset dangers caused by the increased traffic on the highways during the holiday period, the Department of Public Safety will conduct "Operation Motorcade."

Approximately 150 uniformed officers from other DPS services will be on the road to supplement the Highway Patrol enforcement action. Also, to call public attention to highway dangers, each traffic death will be tabulated and the totals will be announced three times daily from DPS headquarters in Austin.

Several other state agencies and organizations interested in traffic safety are cooperating with the DPS in calling attention to safe driving practices during the Labor Day weekend.

The Texas Highway Department is advising the public on proper freeway driving habits and the need for caution in and around construction areas.

The Texas Safety Association is carrying on a program stressing the need for courtesy and caution on the highway and is coordinating the efforts of the Texas Jaycees in sponsoring rest stops with free coffee for fatigued drivers.

And the Texas Council of Safety Supervisors and the Texas Motor Transportation Association is sponsoring a "Holiday Road Patrol" to assist stranded motorists, thereby relieving highway patrolmen for enforcement work.

## A-J Sports Writer Visits Antelopes

 ABERNATHY - Success, it would seem, easily sways the experts' opinion. Or, says Abernathy head coach Don Williams, such was the case when a District 3-AA favorite was picked recently.

Last season the Antelopes came on strong under the serious faced Texas Tech-ex's leadership last year, posting a surprising 7-3 record. If things were so good last year, then they're gonna get better this year, it's generally figured.

"We've only got four offensive and four defensive starters back," says Williams. "That's hardly ammunition enough to be rated as the team to beat."

He is hesitant, however, to count his squad out of the title picture. "The district's pretty evenly matched on paper - could be that any of five teams could win it. You never know."

"We're pretty optimistic, don't get me wrong," he continues. "The kids are working real hard and the attitude has been good. These kids want to win."

While the speed that dominated the Antelope backfield won't be present this fall, the running attack appears to be solid with starters Doyle Fuller at fullback and Roland Murray at halfback likely to deal the opposition headaches aplenty.

The quarterback picture looks equally impressive with a starter yet to be chosen from the likes of Derryl Johnson, Burt Fuller and Billy Rhodes.

All three, according to Williams, are capable of doing the job.

In the forward wall, things will be built around tackle returnees Adrian Harkey and Bert Montgomery, a pair of beefy youngsters who played key roles in the 1965 picture.

Defensively, linebackers Andy Oliver and Fuller are back as are tackles Harkey and Gary Lovelace.

In addition to the loss of 13 lettersmen via the graduation route, two youngsters who were figured in this year's plans have moved from Abernathy. Dale Allenberg, a fullback-linebacker off last year's team, now resides in Tucumcari, N. M., and end Dennis Chapman has moved to Corsicana.

"It's just like any other year," observed Williams. "There are some good things and some bad things. . ."

His philosophy is not unique - but it is rather admirable.

**September Payments Set For Grain, Wheat Program**

Growers who have participated in the 1966 feed grain and wheat diversion programs will begin getting final program payments soon after September 1st, E. H. Pope, Jr., Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, said. The payments will cover both diversion and price-support payments for feed grains, and both diversion and certificate payments for wheat. Growers had the opportunity to request that half the estimated feed grain diversion payment be made in advance at sign-up time in the spring, and where this was done the pay-

ment now available for feed grains represents the balance of the diversion payment due and all of the price-support payment earned under the feed grain program. In total, these payments are estimated at about \$8,006,335 for the expected 1900 county participants in the 1966 programs. The payments will raise returns from the 1966 feed grain and wheat crops substantially. Farmers participating in these programs are also eligible for loans on their entire 1966 crops of corn, barley, grain sorghum and/or wheat. The diversion payment for shifting part of the farm's feed grain base to a conserving use does not apply to the first 20-percent diversion from feed grain or the first 15-percent diversion from wheat except on farms with small feed grain bases. The feed grain price-support payments are earned on the projected production from the acreage scheduled for planting up to 50-percent of the farm's total feed grain base for the farm; one or more of the feed grains -- corn, grain sorghums, or barley -- could be planted on the acreage, or

soybeans could be planted in lieu of a feed grain. The wheat certificate payments are earned on the projected production from the acreage scheduled for planting up to 45-percent of the farm's total wheat allotment. These price-support and certificate payments are assured no matter what disposition is made of the crops. Farmers were also reminded by the Chairman that, even though program payments are to be made in the near future, the approved conserving practices are expected to be carried out on designated diverted acreage throughout the remainder of the year.

**H-SU Classes Begin Sept. 7**

ABILENE - Between 1700 and 1800 students are expected to enroll for the fall term at Hardin-Simmons University which begins Tuesday, Sept. 6 with registration. Classes will begin Wednesday, Sept. 7. Faculty conferences will get underway Sept. 2, while freshman orientation will begin Sept. 5. Dormitories open Sept. 3. Students seeking one of the seven degrees offered by the university will have a wide choice of courses to choose from this fall. For example, science students may choose such courses as microbiology, analytical chemistry, biochemistry, structural geology, heat and thermodynamics. Business-oriented students may select courses such as data processing, auditing, CPA problems, business cycles

and policies, or a secretarial science. Speech students may choose such courses as public speaking, oral argumentation, play production, or a theatrical or debate workshop, while a music major might prefer a course in theory, composition, or applied music. Over 300 different courses in 34 distinct categories are being offered by H-SU to its fall students. The last date to enroll for credit will be Friday, Sept. 16, according to Mrs. Madge Grba, H-SU registrar. "The Embellishments," a popular singing group from Fort Worth, will be featured at the annual All-Church Fellowship on Sept. 8. The annual Faculty-Student Reception has been scheduled tentatively for either Sept. 20 or 27, with the Davis Lectures to be held Oct. 10-14. Dr. Elwin L. Skiles will be

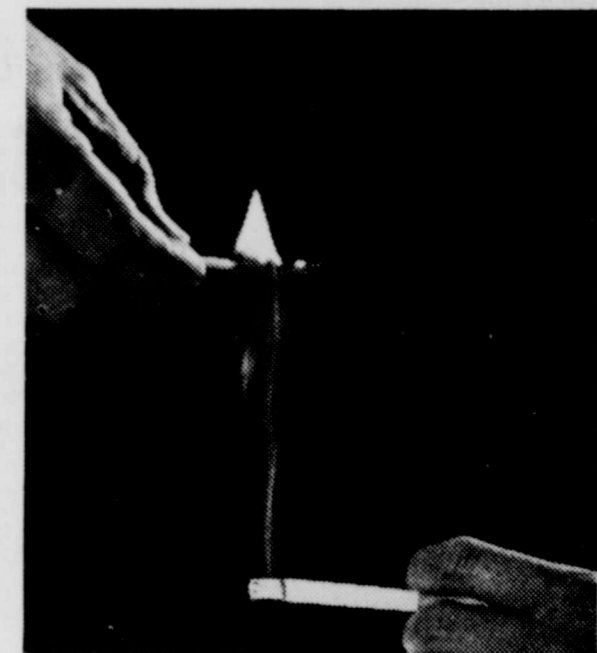
