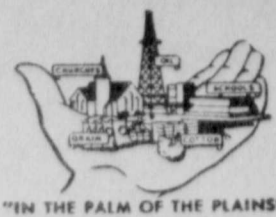

## Local People Honored By SWPS

## First Bale

### At Irish's

### Cotton Gin

The first bale of 1966 cotton ginned at J.L. Irish's Abernathy Gin Co. was brought in by Cran and Billy Pittman, who farm the Mason place on the draw north-west of Abernathy. It was processed Sept. 21.

The 1,920 pounds of seed cotton produced 520 pounds of lint and 900 pounds of seed, for a 27.8 pct. turnout. Ellis Turner, gin manager, paid the Pittmans a premium price of 50¢ per pound for lint and \$70 per ton basis for seed, and ginned the bale free of charge.

The lint graded middling 15/16ths with a mic of 4.2.

## Train Cars

### Derail Here

Seven cars of a 105-car freight train were derailed and two of them overturned at the Abernathy train depot about 5:30 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 20. No injuries were reported, but traffic had to be routed around Abernathy until midnight.

Abernathy station agent C. L. Adams said that two loaded boxcars carrying aluminum foil and plaster overturned. The other five cars of the Santa Fe Extra 249, enroute from Slaton to Amarillo, remained upright, but had to be placed back on the tracks.

Involved in the overall wreckage, near the rear of the train, were three boxcars, three flatcars and a coalcar.

Adams said the derailment happened after a piece of metal from the train's pile driver wheel fell off the train and lodged at a switch point, separating the last nine cars on the train. The caboose and one other car stayed on the track.

Adams said the train was moving about 30 miles per hour at the time and that the wreckage blocked both the main tracks and the siding.

## 11 Injured In

### Rural Accidents

The Texas High Patrol investigated 21 accidents on rural highways in Hale County during the month of August, according to Sergeant Thurman Kefter, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in 11 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$15,-845.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first eight months of 1966 shows a total of 157 accidents resulting in 6 persons killed, 91 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$140,-345.00.

September first marked the beginning of the 1967 motor vehicle inspection period. As in previous years, the period will end on April 15, 1967. Motorists are urged to have their vehicles inspected in the routine visits to garages and thereby eliminate the necessity of having to wait in line at a later date for an inspection sticker.

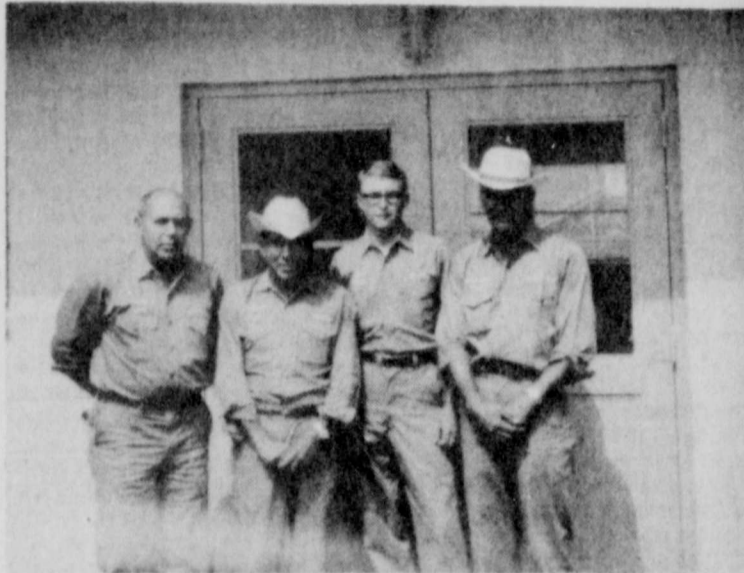
The Sergeant stated, "With the hard summer driving coming to an end, fall is an excellent time to have vehicles safety checked for the winter months ahead."

## Winners Announced In Hale 4-H Fair

Nearly 50 4-H exhibitors from Hale County Saturday convened at Hillcrest Elementary School here for the judging of 600 entries in the sixth annual county 4-H Exhibit Fair according to Tim McCarty, Ass't. Co. Agricultural Agent and Marcheta Wood, Ass't. Co. Home Demonstration Agent.

Four overall high-point winners were named, one boy and one girl from the junior and senior divisions. In addition Southwestern Public Service Company presented two entrants in each of the two age divisions a plaque for first place in electrical projects. It was the first year electrical division awards had been made.

First place overall senior division winners were Theresa Marshall, 15, with 445 points and Louis Pinkerton, 16, with 195 points. Junior division winners were Vanessa Brittan, 10, with 525 points and Gary Ellison, 10, with 125 points.

Electric project senior division winners were Larry Hogge, 14, and Theresa Marshall. Junior winners were Terry Terrell, 11, and Kirk Cobb, 10.

Entries for the fair were due at 9:30 a.m. Saturday and winners were announced by 2 p.m. The fair had been scheduled at Hale County Agriculture Center, but due to mud at the center, the program was moved to Hillcrest Elementary Cafeteria.

The tractor driving contest division of the fair was postponed due to weather. Assistant County Agent Tim McCarty said the date of the contest would be announced later.

This year's 600 entry fair was approximately the same size as last year's 4-H fair. It is open to any of Hale County's 305 4-H members, ages 9-19.

Awards were presented by Mrs. James Miller, chairman of the Hale County Home Demonstration Council. Electrical project awards were presented by Mrs. Agnes Braly of Southwestern Public Service Company here.

Each of the eight winners received a plaque. Entrants in each division received blue, red or white tags which represented point values of 15, 10 and 5, respectively, toward the total which decided overall fair winners.

Lloyd Langford, assistant agronomist at High Plains Research Foundation, served as judge for the agricultural division. National average loan level for 1967-crop wheat is \$1.25 per bushel; the domestic marketing certificates level will be based on 100 per cent of parity as of July 1, 1967, less the announced \$1.25 per bushel loan value. The certificate value for the 1966 wheat crop is \$1.32 per bushel Pope said. If the parity figure is the same next July the certificates would bring returns of \$886 million to 1967-crop wheat producers he added.

Pope stressed there is no wheat acreage diversion program for 1967, so land formerly diverted will be available for wheat or other crops. Farmers with small wheat allotments who in recent years have diverted wheat acreage for payment - from the minimum up to their entire acreage - will not be able to do the same in 1967.

## Antelopes Blast Indians, 55-8; To Meet Floydada In District Opener Here Friday

Following three non-conference football games, Coach Don Williams' AHS Antelopes will be host to the Floydada Whirlwinds Friday night, Sept. 30, for our first game of District 3-AA competition this season. Action gets under way on Antelope Field with kick-off at 7:30 p.m. Please note that kick-off time is one-half hour earlier than for the previous three games.

The Abernathy Antelopes, looking forward to opening conference play in their next outing, posted their third consecutive win of the '66 football

season as they clobbered their host - the Morton Indians - 55 to 8.

An Abernathy scoring explosion occurred in the second quarter just moments after the Indians had taken an eight-to-six lead. Morton gained this lead within the first minute of the second quarter as their fullback, Jimmy Waters, barreled through the line for a four yard play which netted them their only touchdown of the night. The conversion attempt ran by John St. Clair also made its way to the scoreboard. Abernathy's six points were made early in the first quarter on the first drive of the game. It carried the Antelopes sixty-four long yards and gained them five first downs before quarterback Darrell Johnson finally scooted an option play across the Abernathy goal on a fourth-and-twelve situation.

With nine minutes and nine seconds left in the second quarter, James Byars, Antelope fullback, lit the fuse of the second quarter attack as he sprinted forty-four yards for the second tally. Roland Murray ran up the middle for two more quick points on the conversion attempt giving the Antelopes a 14 to 8 lead.

Morton, who was forced to take the pig skin on the twenty yard line because of an extra long kick by Harry Mathis, was halted by the Antelope defense on the Indians' own thirty-nine yard line where the Abernathy offense took up play. Five plays

later Roland Murray shoved his way across the zero yard line to add six more points to the Abernathy side of the scoreboard. Murray again took the ball on the conversion attempt to up the Abernathy score to 22.

Morton once again was forced to take possession of the ball on the twenty. After picking up nine yards, the Morton offense miscued and the ball fell into the hands of the Antelopes. The following play saw Harry Mathis scamper the entire twenty-nine yards for another Abernathy tabulation. Darrell Selke ran wide for the extra points.

Abernathy once again capitalized on a Morton fumble as Darrell Johnson went twenty-two yards to give the 'Lopes a 36 to 8 advantage at intermission.

Whenever play resumed, many substitutes were in the Abernathy ranks. However, it hampered the Antelopes scoring ability very little with Murray ending a sixty-five yard march with a four yard TD. Burl Fuller kicked the extra point. With thirteen seconds left in the third quarter, Fuller who was at quarterback, raced an option sixty-one yards on a third-and-eight situation. The conversion attempt failed leaving the 49 to 8 score as it was.

Early in the fourth quarter, Andy Oliver scooted in from the three yard line to end the Antelopes lengthy scoring. Oliver's point-making run was set up by Fuller on a thirty-nine yard keeper.

## Antelopes Win Petersburg

### Tilt, 28-6

Coach Don Williams' Antelopes unwilling to accept defeat came alive in the last seven-and-a-half minutes of the Abernathy versus Petersburg football game to rout the Buffaloes 28-6. The September sixteenth game was the first home contest of the 1966 season.

Abernathy was plagued with harsh penalties the entire first half. Early in the first quarter, with little more than three minutes gone, Roland Murray scampered sixty-one yards for what appeared to be an Abernathy TD. But because of a fracture of the rules, the ball was brought back to the line of scrimmage.

Petersburg's lone tally came on the first play of the second quarter. The Petersburg offense had moved the ball all the way to the Abernathy three-yard line where it now rested. The scoring play saw Terry Groce, the Buffaloes' quarterback, run a keeper. The extra point kick fell short of its goal.

Although the Antelopes were unable to score in the second quarter, they came very near it in the latter moments of the first half with their final play bringing them within three yards of pay dirt.

The third quarter was a defensive battle with neither the Antelopes nor the Buffaloes scoring.

Fourth quarter action was completely dominated by the Antelopes who made up for the scoring in their first three quarters. The first score which was an eighteen yard job by Harry Mathis came with seven minutes and thirty-three seconds left in the ball game. One minute later defensive tackle Richard Montgomery grabbed an unguided Buffalo pitch-out and raced to the goal line fourteen yards away for the second Abernathy tally. The extra point kick was unfruitful, but because of an offsideline penalty assessed the Buffaloes, it was counted.

Burl Fuller intercepted a Buffalo pass on the Petersburg forty yard line and dashed for the goal line where he returned the Buffalo error into an Abernathy score. The successful extra point kick which followed made the score 20 to 6 in Abernathy's favor.

The final score set up by a ten yard pass completion came with one minute and ten seconds left in the game. It was an option run by Fuller from the three yard line. Fuller also ran on the conversion attempt to add two more points to the Abernathy score.

## Farmers Receive

### Over \$22 Million In Hale County

Hale County farmers are receiving final payments for 1966 feed grains, wheat and cotton programs, according to John Martin of the Hale County Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service office.

Total payments for Hale County will reach a mark between \$22-23 million, Martin said. Of this amount, payments for the cotton allotment alone will be from \$10-11 million, including advance payments made earlier.

Martin said these are diversion payments and additional price support subsidies for Hale County farmers idling up to 35 per cent of their crop allotments.

An estimated 200,000 acres were diverted by county farmers this year Martin said. This figure is almost half of the 499,000 feed grain, wheat and cotton allotments for Hale County, Martin's figures show.

Cotton farmers participating in the program had to divert 12.5 per cent of their allotment and could divert as much as 35 per cent, while 50 per cent of feed grain allotments could be diverted and 45 per cent of the wheat allotment could be diverted.

Diversion payments were figured at 10.5 cents per pound on projected yield of acreages diverted and price support payments amounted to 9.42 cents per pound on projected yield of acres planted within the farm's domestic allotment which is 65 per cent of the effective allotment.

DEBBIE FERGUSON WINS MANY HONORS

Debbie Ferguson, 13 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Ferguson of Becton has become an expert barrel racing enthusiast, is turning "a way with horses" into a college fund, a room full of trophies, many saddles and a regular statewide summer tour with her family.

Debbie has won 60 belt buckles, 10 saddles, 40 trophies and a gold watch since she began barrel racing competition at a rodeo in Plainview in 1962. Her money and winnings for 1966 alone stand over \$3,200.

Debbie won saddles for placing first in junior division competition of the West Texas Barrel Racing Association the past two years. She's leading the race, which is kept according to money winnings again this year.

She won the championship of the American Junior Racing Association in barrel racing, all around racing and optional racing last month in Odessa. She was runner up both in overall performance and barrel

racing last year.

Debbie joined the Texas Barrel Racing Association last year and ranked eighth, statewide, for money winning in that organization when the finals were held in August at Marshall. Debbie's father was unable to make the trip and she didn't compete in that final rodeo.

Debbie has trained her own horse, an eight year old quarterhorse named Jim Ned, but he's been called "Lucky" ever since she won her first event.

The Ferguson family is almost 100 percent rodeo. J. W., Debbie's father, competes in calf roping at rodeos, her brother, Mike, 14, specializes in bull riding and sister Ann also competes in barrel racing. When little brother Eddie gets a little bigger he'll probably chalk up some rodeo wins. As for Debbie's mother, Mary, I'm sure she contributes much to her family's participation and success.

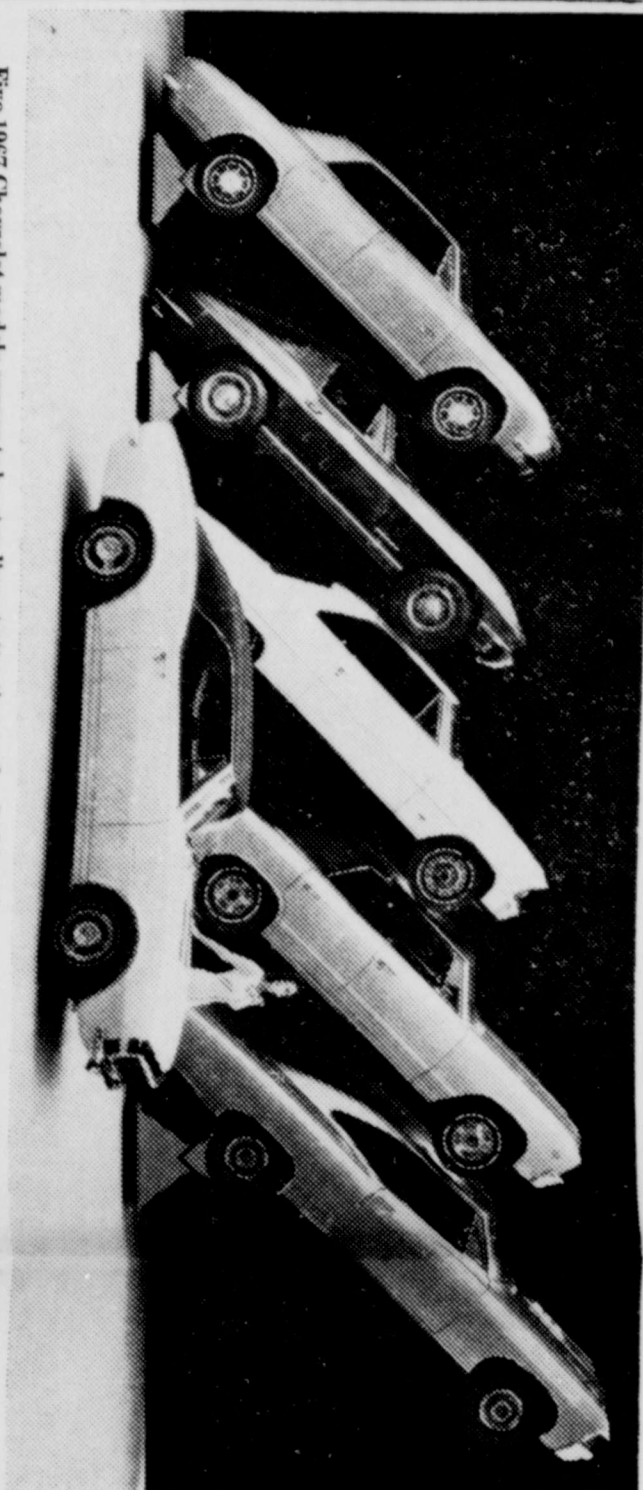

**ANOTHER DEVELOPMENT IN CROSSBREEDING**--Texas A&M University researchers at the Livestock and Forage Research Center, McGregor, have added additional weight to calves at weaning time by breeding crossbred cows to a bull of a third breed. Straightbred calves at the station have averaged 392 pounds over the past 11 years at weaning time. Average 180-day weaning weight of the three-breed cross has been 460 pounds, says Walter Kruse. Reason for the increased weight, he says, is the boost in hybrid vigor brought in by the bull of the third breed.

The so-called "forgotten years" in the medical profession might well be the teen years, says Mrs. Patsy R. Yates, Extension family life education specialist at Texas A&M University. This does not mean that the teen-ager doesn't need medical attention, however, says the specialist. The adolescent period is one of rapid growth spurts, both physically and emotionally. A friendly, competent family physician is one of the people every teenager should know well. Frequent physical check-ups can reassure both the young person and the parents that all is well.

Tew, Austin electrical contractor, vice president; Crumley as secretary and general manager. Other new stockholders including George Mabry, Austin insurance broker; Barton Hayes, Lenoir, N. C., owner of textile mills there; and Jack Karo, Charlotte, N. C., yarn broker.

Among sellers in the transaction were all former officers, Dr. H. E. Cone, president; Raymond Tapp, vice president; Chauncey Trout, secretary; and Roy Whit, general manager.

Other original owners were never publicly announced.

Crumley, the 39-year-old new manager, has been associated with Texas Tech since 1959 as associate director of the Textile Research Laboratories. He announced his resignation from the college connection, effective Thursday, to de-operation.

Arrowhead Yarn Mills was incorporated in May 1965, and has grown from a 15-man, one-shift operation, to one now employing about 45 persons in three shifts, operating around the clock six days a week.

Crumley said plans are for immediate expansion to double the capacity here.

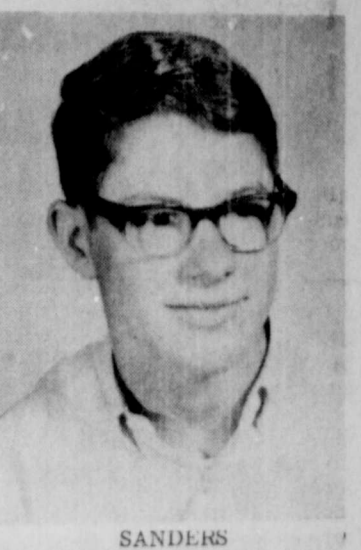

Cost of surplus commodities for Hale County's general assistance program was set at \$56,019.08, according to figures released by state officials.

The report read by County Judge C. L. Abernathy to Hale County Commissioners in a meeting said the figure was for fiscal year beginning July 1, 1965 through June 30, 1966. Clifton Martin, general assistance officer, said the amount was about the same as last year. "There has been little change in the program for the past three years," Martin said.

A cooperative effort between the City of Plainview and Hale County, Auditor Larry Beckham said the cost of the program to the City-County Welfare Department was \$10,885.20.

In other business, two representatives of Plainview Kennel Club met with the court to arrange lease of Hale County Agriculture Center for a dog show scheduled Oct. 2. The representatives, D. Angus Wood and Carroll Foster, told members of the court that gate receipts for the show would be donated to Plainview High School cheerleaders and concession receipts would be donated to High Plains Children's Training Center.

The clubs want to lease the south barn, show room and kitchen facilities. Commissioners approved the lease. In previous years, the dog show has been conducted in the National Guard Armory.

Roy McClung, Associate county agent, told commissioners of his decision to remain in Plainview. McClung told the group he had been offered an opportunity to continue his studies at Texas A&M but had decided to turn it down. "I have enjoyed working in Hale County and have some extension projects going which would like to see through," he said.

Commissioners outlined plans to begin work putting a caliche base to roads and parking spaces around the Hale County Agriculture Center.

Work on the project was expected to begin this month, it was said.

In other action, Commissioners agreed to increase the salary of two secretaries in the Hale County Child Welfare Office in accordance with a state pay raise effective Sept. 1.

Secretaries involved include Virginia Carroll, raise from \$251 per month to \$259 and Connie Dominguez, raise from \$277 to \$286.

Jerry Matthews, acting child welfare supervisor, said these raises were in accordance with an agreement last year by the county to make pay raises in county-state supported offices in compliance with state increases.
