Music played was the Triumphal March from Quo Vadis, and the Braura March. Spectators were very complimentary of the straightness of the ranks and diagonals, and the way the Antelope band members stepped.

Professor Wiley seemed to be really impressed with the band's playing as he rated the band 99 points in playing and 97 in marching out of a possible 100 in each category.

The band marched 120 strong led by drum majors Lanny Newton and Sharon Albers. Augmenting the usual marching group of 104 were ten members of the varsity football squad and the cheerleaders who are also a part of the band.

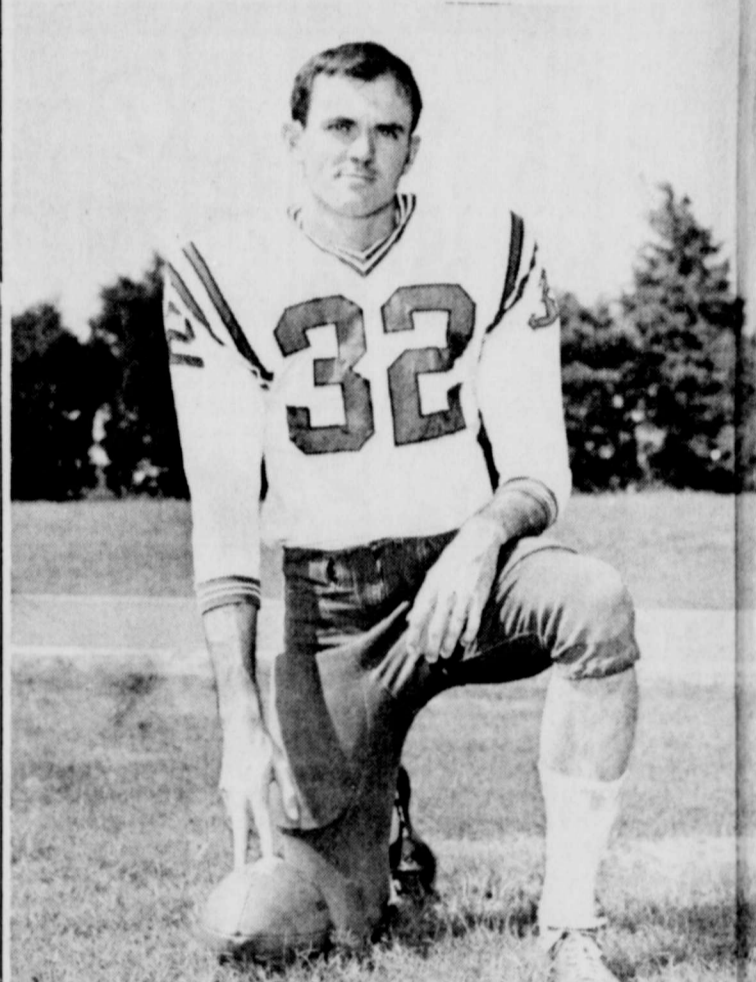
Gridmen Win Two Games

The Abernathy Antelopes chalked up their first conference win for 1966 as they handed the Floydada Whirlwinds a 14 to 0 defeat here, Friday night, September 30.

Abernathy not only had the higher score, but also the better game by statistics. The Antelopes posted twenty-one first downs and picked up 252 yards on offense while Floydada only gained seven first downs with 188 yards accounted to them on offense.

Roland Murray, who was a prominent player in the Abernathy attack, pushed the ball across the goal line on both touchdowns.

His first touchdown was scored at the end of a sixty-five yard march which took nineteen plays to complete and netted five first downs. The key play of the drive was an eighty-yard keeper by quarterback Darrell Johnson which brought the ball to rest on the Floydada seven yard line. Three plays later Murray tallied from the one yard line with nine minutes left in the half.

Both teams penetrated deep within the remainder of the half; however, neither team's offense could buck their opponents' defense. Abernathy's last movement of the half was terminated fourteen yards away from the goal line when an alert Whirlwind picked off an Abernathy pass.

Third quarter action was again characterized by deep penetrations, but once again they were unfruitful.

Murray scampered around left end with three minutes and sixteen seconds left in the contest to add his second touchdown to the scoreboard. The parade which this touchdown ended was begun on the 'Winds' forty yard line when the 'Lopes blocked a Floydada punt. Murray scored from eleven yards out, and James Byers ran on the conversion to complete the scoring.

Murray and Byers shared honors for gaining yardage. Byers picked up sixty-eight yards on eighteen carries, and Murray picked up sixty-five yards on fifteen carries.

Under present Internal Revenue Service regulations government payments under the new cotton program must be reported in the year for which such payments were made. This means that a farmer for the year 1966 must report not only his carry-over from 1965, but also cotton payments made under the new cotton program for 1966, Johnson said.

PCG is requesting that IRS grant relief by ruling that the provisions of Revenue Procedure 64-16 are applicable to cash payments received by cotton producers in 1966 for both diverted acreage and domestic price support.

Under this procedure, farmers could pro-rate 1966 direct payments over a 10-year period and would not be saddled with taxes on more than actual earnings during that year, he reported.

A similar procedure was allowed by IRS in reporting of income by farmers under the 1963 program for wheat and feed grains. Johnson said such relief for cotton payments is equally justified.

Residents in Abernathy area will be offered an opportunity to ZIP Code their mailing lists during October, Postmaster Herman Lambert announced. Letter carriers will deliver "no postage needed" cards to each of the city's post office boxes and to rural mailboxes.

Water District Hearing Is Set For October 18

A public hearing to determine possibilities of Hale County joining the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District, Number One, has been called for 9 a.m. Oct. 18 in the district courtroom of Hale County Courthouse, Plainview.

According to Berwin Tilson, chairman of a steering committee composed of James Taylor and John Joe Kirchoff named for the purpose of entering the district, the hearing, called by the water district's five-member board of directors, will feature testimony of Hale County citizens who are for or against the proposal.

Tilson said the hearing is the first action taken by the district in answer to ten petitions containing signatures of more than 50 Hale County landowners requesting entrance into the district. The petitions were presented to the water district office in Lubbock Aug. 11.

Following the hearing, the directors will vote whether to accept Hale County into the water district. If district acceptance is favorable, Hale County Commissioners Court will be petitioned to call a county election, Tilson stated.

According to County Judge C. L. Abernethy, the county election, if called, would be conducted and paid for by the water district.

If the county vote passes, members of the water district will vote in regular January elections whether to accept or reject Hale County's entry bid.

If Hale County joins the district, a tax, presently five cents per hundred-dollar evaluation, will be levied against property owners.

Many Hale County farmers' concern for entering the water district stems from farmers' inability to receive water depletion tax refunds received by farmers in the water district, Tilson said.

Tilson said the water district also offers "a water control program members can regulate."

The water district is composed of Lubbock, Parmer and portions of Lynn, Cochran, Hockley, Lamb, Armstrong, Deaf Smith, Bailey, Castro, Floyd, Potter and Randall counties.

Because of an original organizational concept of five four-county sub-divisions from which the five members of the board of directors are chosen, Hale County would join the sub-division with Floyd County from which one director would be chosen, it was said.

Present director for Floyd County is Chester Mitchell of Lockney.

As a member of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District, Hale County Farmers would receive water depletion information needed to establish a rate of tax refund, Tilson said.

Opposition which has existed in past years to entry in the District has centered on fears of water controls and the additional tax.

beginning October 10, the postmaster said. The cards will have blanks for addresses used most often, but for which individuals do not know the proper ZIP Codes.

The project will be a feature of "ZIP Code Week", to be celebrated locally October 10-15. Throughout the nation 95,000,000 of the cards will be delivered. In cities with more than one ZIP Code, there will be two cards for each household, one for local addresses, the other card for out-of-town.

In rural areas and cities with one ZIP Code assigned, only an out-of-town card will be delivered since all local addresses will have the same ZIP Code.

"This is a good time to get the ZIP Codes missing from your lists," Postmaster Lambert noted. "This Christmas, ZIP Code will be as important as shopping and mailing early for the efficient and on-time delivery of the record-breaking avalanche of mail expected in the pre-holiday weeks."

After filling in the street number, city and state, the cards are to be mailed back to the postmaster. Post Office personnel will add the proper ZIP Codes and return the cards to the sender.

Postmaster Johnson has proclaimed October 10-15 as "ZIP Code Week" to promote greater usage of ZIP Code.

Postmaster General O'Brien announced May 19 that steps were being taken to make ZIP Codes more accessible to the mailing public. The present program resulted from a search for the most effective method to get the codes in the hands of private mailers. A poll conducted by Elmo Roper and Associates earlier this year found that about half the population is using ZIP Code. Of the remaining half who are not, 80 per cent said the reason was they did not know the ZIP Codes for the people to whom they write.

Previously, the Post Office Department has embarked upon an extensive effort to help volume mailers convert their lists of ZIP Code.

"The Roper poll strengthened our conviction that the public generally is ready and willing to cooperate with business mailers who will be presenting their second and third-class mail after January 1, 1967," Mr. O'Brien said. "I am convinced that the 'ZIP-A-LIST' project will go a long way toward accomplishing our goal of ready availability of the proper ZIP Codes in the home."

Local cards will be printed with blue ink and out-of-town cards in red.

Addresses which cannot be ZIP Coded because of insufficient or improper addresses will be forwarded to the city indicated on the card, if legible, and the codes will be added there.

Only addresses, not names of correspondents, would be listed on the cards, the postmaster said. ZIP Codes represent delivery areas for the postal service, not individuals.

During the summer, a "dry run" of the ZIP-A-LIST project was conducted in Columbus, Ohio and Richmond, Virginia. Information gained from these tests is being incorporated in the national program.

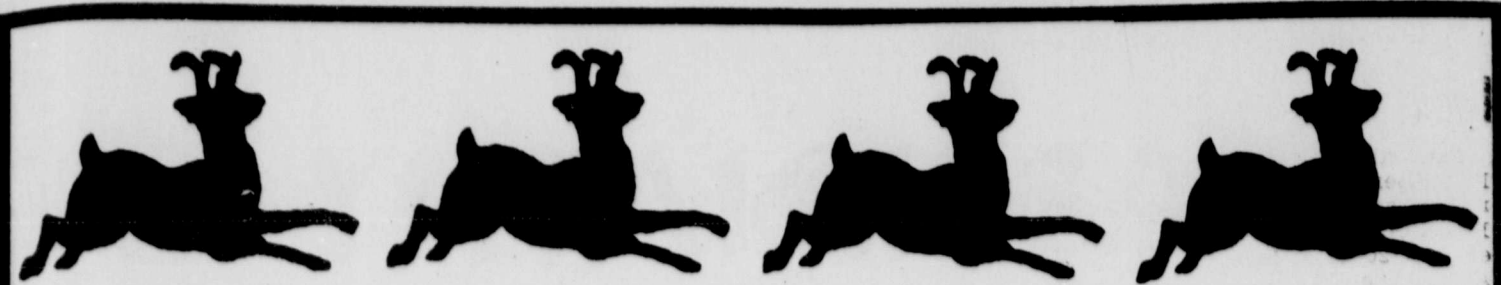

Hi-Plains Cotton Festival Scheduled

National Maid of Cotton, Miss Nancy Bernard of Lubbock will make guest appearances at Hi-Plains Cotton Festival scheduled Oct. 20-22 at Hale County Agriculture Center, Plainview, it was announced in a planning

meeting by Garland Lott, chairman of the festival. Confirmation of the guest appearance was made by Paul Leach, a representative of the three Plainview Banks, Plainview Savings and Loan Association and Production Credit Association, who are sponsoring the Maid of Cotton's Plainview appearance. "We have a definite commitment from the Maid of Cotton to appear at

the festival Oct. 20 and 21," Leach said. Attending the planning meeting included Lott, general chairman, Clyde Mace, chairman of the booth sales committee and Harold Chowning, vice-chairman of booth sales; Mrs. Gena Linder and Mrs. Doyleene Meadors, chairmen of the Miss Cotton contest committee; Mrs. M. P. Kimbrow, chairman of the Prince Bolls - Princess Blossom committee and Charlene Young manager of Plainview Chamber of Commerce.

No major changes of festival shows appeared likely. Rules for the Miss Cotton contest will remain the same. Entrants must be 14 through 17 years old, parents must farm cotton producing land, and former winners are not eligible to enter. Miss Cotton will be selected in an informal contest with no talent requirements. Selection will be made on points scored in poise and personality. Required wearing apparel for the contestants will be a street length cotton party dress.

Entries must be made through a sponsoring organization. Miss Cotton will receive a gift, crown and memento of appreciation from the Plainview Chamber of Commerce. Lott said more than 50 girls entered the contest last year. Organization sponsoring the winner receives \$25. The contest is open to girls in the High Plains region. Deadline for entries is noon Oct. 13.

Prince Bolls and Princess Blossom contest is open to pre-school children three to six years of age whose parents farm cotton producing land. The only change planned for this year is elimination judging. Field of contestants will be narrowed to five semi-finalists from which a winner will be selected. Entrants in the Prince Bolls and Princess Blossom contest do not have to be sponsored by organizations.

The National Cotton Wardrobe will be available again this year for the Cotton Style Show, Lott said. The Plainview Junior Service League will sponsor and conduct the style show, it was announced. Lott said in previous shows merchants were asked to participate in the showing and find their own models.

"We believe this year the show can be assembled easier and operate faster and smoother than previously," Lott said. Booth sales for the show has met with excellent response according to Young. "The way the booth sales are going, there is no reason to expect less than another successful year," Lott said.

Lott said to date 30 small booths and one industrial booth already are taken. This leaves 55 small booths and 18 industrial booths still to be sold, he said.

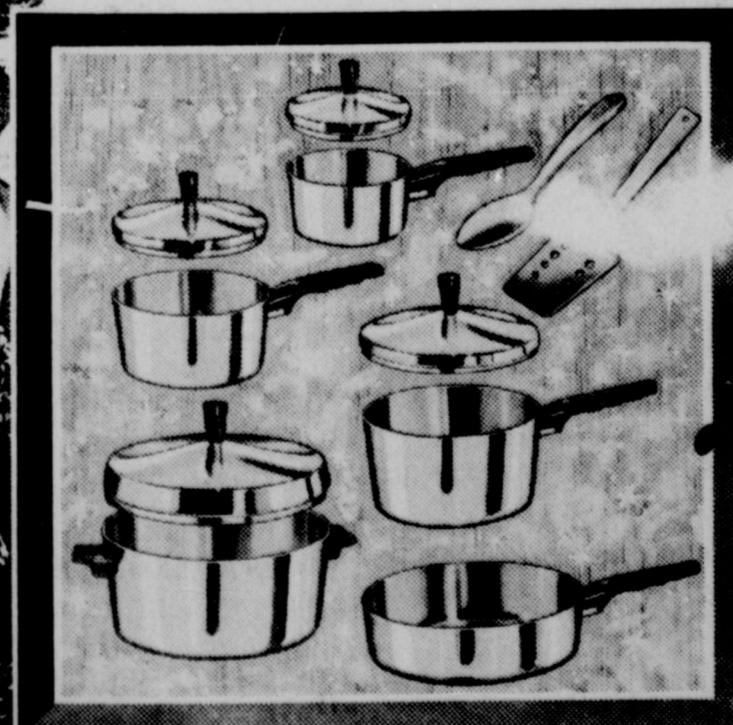
