The Hale County Tax Collector's office was busy with more than 600 persons signing up since Oct. 1, in the first days of registration for 1967 voting. The registration will continue until Jan. 31, 1967. Hollars said all persons who

County Tax Collector Bill were mailed statements on the first of the month also were sent two applications for voter registration certificates and that these applications may be either mailed in or brought to

the tax office. Due to last year's ruling on the poll tax, there is no longer need for exemption certificates, with all registration being free.

Hollars also stated that if a person is over 60 years of age and he or she lives outside of the city limits of a city with 10,000 or more population, they need not register, but those either living in the city limits of any town, or outside the city limits of a city with less than 10,000 population do need to register. These and all other requirements which were in effect under the old poll tax laws are still in effect under the free registration.

## Two Texas Firms To Offer MID Training

DALLAS - Two manpower training projects in Texas were okayed this week with corporations in Abernathy and Fort

Approved by Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz under the Manpower Development and Training Act, were on-the-job training projects with Southwest Textiles, Inc., in Abernathy and General Dynamics Corporation in Fort Worth.

The first will offer training for 20 weeks to 30 workers to enable them to become loom fixers, doffers, winders, opener tender, and slubber tender. MDTA costs on the project \$250. will be \$6,450.

At Fort Worth, 650 workers will get training on the job for 14 weeks as aircraft structure assembler and sheet metal workers. MDTA costs there are listed at \$604,933.

Fred W. Erhard, Regional Director of the U. S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Apprenticeship and Training here, will execute the contract for Secretary of Labor W.

On-the-job training is given by private industry with Federal government reimbursement for job instructor fees and instructional materials only. The trainees receive wages, paid by the employer, dur-

ing their period of training. MDTA programs are direc-ted toward helping the American worker develop to the fullest his skills and potentials to find his place as a contributor to the economy. They provide the underemployed with the opportunity to upgrade their skills, and they equip the unemployed with new skills required by a changing job mar-

#### Bindweed Control Is Urged

Hale County Noxious Weed Control District again is soliciting cooperation of Hale County citizens in a drive to eradicate bindweed, according to W. R. Churchwell, supervisor of the weed control dictrict.

"Noxious weeds can be killed during the cold winter months as successfully as in the sum-mer months," Churchwell said. It is important that non-crop areas be sprayed during winter months, a slack period for the weed control district, he said. During late spring and summer months, spraying is concentrated on larger areas of bind weed, it was reported.

Churchwell pointed out that bindweed is one of the country's most serious noxious weeds and anyone moving any machinery carrying noxious weed seed is in violation of a state law supporting a penalty not to exceed

SPOT CHECKS Members of the district are and should be prepared by typenow making spot checks for writer or pen and ink. noxious weed seeds in machinery, especially combines and other harvest equipment, moving within the county, Church-

well said. All operators should have their machinery cleaned of weed seed by pressure washing and land owners should refuse entrance to all unclean machines and machines should be cleaned before moving from one farm or from one portion of a farm to another, Churchwell

said. The weed district's program is designed to help protect Hale County farms against noxious weeds and to help eradicate existing infestations, the supervisor said. He stressed cooperation between farmers and the weed district could hasten noxious weed eradication in Hale County.

Farmers having problems with noxious weeds are invited to bring their problems to the district office in Hale County Agriculture Building in Plain-

Each box should be well tied with strong cord. Sufficient cushioning material should be used to prevent any loosening of articles within the package. Unless tightly filled, boxes are likely to be crushed. A slip showing list of contents and the name and address of the sender and the addressee should be enclosed in the par-

PROHIBITED ARTICLES-In addition to the articles normally prohibited in the mail, matches of all kinds and lighter fluid may not be mailed to overseas military addresses. Cigarettes, other tobacco products, coffee and various other items are prohibited in parcels addressed to some military post offices. Check on this with the post office before preparing your parcel for mailing.
