Two Texas Firms To Offer MTD Training

DALLAS - Two manpower training projects in Texas were okayed this week with corporations in Abernathy and Fort Worth.

Approved by Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz under the Manpower Development and Training Act, were on-the-job training projects with Southwest Textiles, Inc., in Abernathy and General Dynamics Corporation in Fort Worth.

The first will offer training for 20 weeks to 30 workers to enable them to become loom fixers, doffers, winders, opener tender, and slubber tender. MDTA costs on the project will be \$8,450.

At Fort Worth, 650 workers will get training on the job for 14 weeks as aircraft structure assembler and sheet metal workers. MDTA costs there are listed at \$604,933.

Fred W. Erhard, Regional Director of the U. S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Apprenticeship and Training here, will execute the contract for Secretary of Labor W. Wirtz.

On-the-job training is given by private industry with Federal government reimbursement for job instructor fees and instructional materials only. The trainees receive wages, paid by the employer, during their period of training.

MDTA programs are directed toward helping the American worker develop to the fullest his skills and potentials to find his place as a contributor to the economy. They provide the underemployed with the opportunity to upgrade their skills, and they equip the unemployed with new skills required by a changing job market.

ilies and authorized U. S. civilians employed overseas who receive mail through an APO, New York, N. Y., San Francisco, Calif. or Seattle, Wash.; through Fleet Post Office, New York or San Francisco; or through Navy Post Office, Postmaster, Seattle.

Lambert also noted that gift parcels, weighing not more than five pounds and measuring not more than 60 inches in length and girth combined, and addressed to members of armed forces in Vietnam, will be provided air-lift service from San Francisco, even though only postage at the surface rate is paid.

Other mailing advice offered by the postmaster includes:

PACKAGING - All articles should be placed in boxes of wood, metal, solid fiberboard, or strong double-faced corrugated fiberboard. All fiberboard boxes should be securely wrapped in heavy paper which materially strengthens the package. Each box should be well tied with strong cord. Sufficient cushioning material should be used to prevent any loosening of articles within the package. Unless tightly filled, boxes are likely to be crushed. A slip showing list of contents and the name and address of the sender and the addressee should be enclosed in the parcel.

PROHIBITED ARTICLES - In addition to the articles normally prohibited in the mail, matches of all kinds and lighter fluid may not be mailed to overseas military addresses. Cigarettes, other tobacco products, coffee and various other items are prohibited in parcels addressed to some military post offices. Check on this with the post office before preparing your parcel for mailing.

POSTAGE - The domestic rates of postage are applicable and postage must be fully prepaid. When fourth class or air parcel post rates are applicable, the zone rate from the post office where mailed to the post office through which the parcel is addressed will be charged.

ADDRESSING - Addresses must be legible and complete and should be prepared by typewriter or pen and ink.

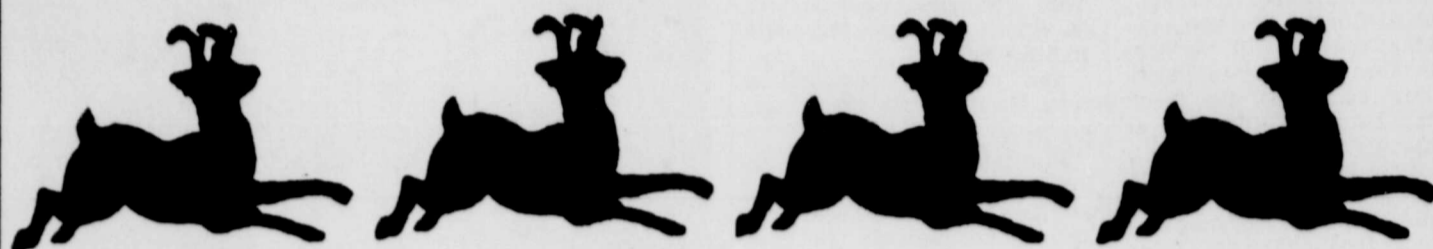

ANTELOPE FIELD

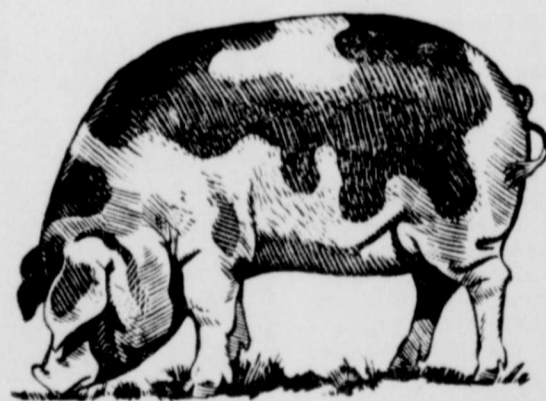

I too, felt the warmness of the people, as they surged against my bubble top Falcon Pickup, with their firebombs, and their playcards saying, "Go Home Charlie." I shall never forget the 21 gun salute I received.

All 21 guns pointed right at me. I could have been seriously injured if those bullets had of hit me anywhere except in the head. Marvin Winnford was so glad to see me he just kept jerking on my tie. Herman Reynolds was there also. He just kept patting me on the back; with a two by four. I'm just overwhelmed no end to see the enthusiasm of my people. Jimmie Davis was over there shouting, "let me at him." Just because he's a 32nd degree Mason and had the operation LBJ has had, he sure thinks he's something. He is something. He's a 32nd degree Mason with a hole in his stomach.

They all just begged me to come back, and sell them more gas on credit. There were a scattering of black arm bands still being wore and I noticed some of the taller buildings were still flying their flags at half mast, but as a rule everybody was getting back to normal. As I told the crowd of loyal supporters, "Old politicians never die, they just smell their way naturally." I thought I felt a tear come in my eyes as I was finishing up my speech, but then I realized someone had turned the fire hose in my face, so I left, the town I had made.

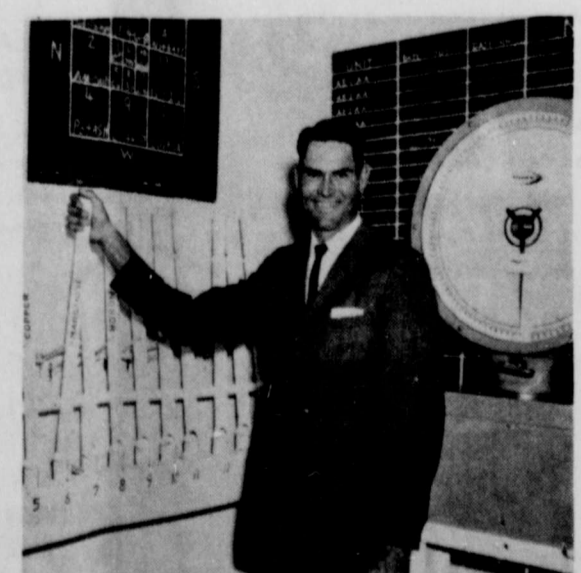
