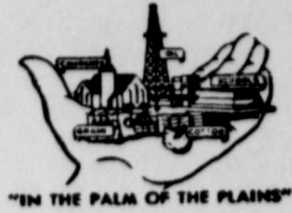

### Hale Cotton Allotment Increased

Hale County's 1967 cotton allotment has been increased to 157,735 acres, according to figures released by John Martin, Hale County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

When compared to the 1966 base acreage allotment of 155,873, the increase is substantial but actual acreage allotment in 1966 was 157,295, Martin pointed out. This was due to acres purchased from other parts of the state under the sale and lease provision of the Agricultural Act of 1965.

The 1967 allotment figure, however, includes purchased acreage, denoting an actual increase of 440 acres.

In a report by Plains Cotton Growers, Lubbock, the 1967 base allotment for 23 High Plains counties represented by PCG is 2,165,872 acres compared to 2,122,770 acres in 1966.

The state Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service said the increase of 43,102 acres probably comes from other counties purchased by High Plains growers.

Producers may buy or lease allotments from any of the 77 Texas counties that voted in 1965 or 1966 to permit out-of-county transfers.

**YIELD INCREASED**  
Projected yield for the 23-county area increased from 513 to 542 pounds per acre in 1967. According to Hale County ASCS, Hale County's projected yield increased from 641 pounds in 1966 to 687 pounds in 1967.

PCG officials said producers were paid 9.42 cents per pound times their projected yield on each acre of their domestic allotment in 1966. In addition, a payment of 10.5 cents per pound times their projected yield from diverted acreage was made.

The report continued that in 1966 Plains farmers signed up to plant 1,451,407 acres of cotton and are expected to sign up for about 1,457,600 acres in 1967.

### Important Election Set Nov. 8

Tuesday's general election looms as one of the most important voting days ever to occur in a so-called "off year" when the presidential race is not on the ballot.

Political observers, viewing the light turn-out in the Spring primaries, are justifiably alarmed about the prospects of a small vote.

Their concern is mirrored by statistics. Since 1936, the average turn-out in a non-presidential election has been a dismal 33.4 per cent of the eligible voters.

This should not be the case this year.

Next Tuesday, Nov. 8, the fate of 16 Congressional Amendments will be determined by you.

Next Tuesday, a spirited U.S. Senate race will end—a race in which your vote must last six years.

Next Tuesday, all of our State Senators will be selected—due to re-districting.

And next Tuesday, voters will determine their county's strength at the 1966 State political conventions. This fact too often is overlooked. As the election law now stands, our county will have one vote at the state political convention for every 300 votes cast in the governor's race. A heavy turn-out of voters Tuesday will give us a stronger voice two years from now.

Your vote is yours alone; no one else can cast it for you. If you don't use it, it is lost. Your voice in the future conduct of our state and nation is nullified.

Take time Tuesday to vote. And, if you are going to be out of the county Tuesday, remember that Friday, Nov. 4, is the last day you can cast your absentee vote.

and oilman C. W. Brown of McCamey. Other officers are Dr. Luther Kirk, Pampa District Superintendent of The Methodist Church, vice chairman; Bill Huffman, president of Universal Systems Inc. of Midland, secretary; and W. T. Johnson, vice-president of the Farmers and Merchants National Bank of Hamlin, treasurer.

Gene and Bobbie Moore have been singing in Methodist Churches for the past ten years. They have sung in revivals, preaching missions and gatherings of the church in 11 states.

They sang for the National Committee of The Twelve at Purdue University in 1962. They sang for the United Christian Ashrams and for the South Central Jurisdictional Conference on Evangelism in 1965.

They have two record albums on the Rodi label, and Gene is a song writer having written "Jesus Set My Heart to Singing" and "Do Unto Others."

City officials will be on hand to issue 1967 dog tags. Ordinance No. 85 provides that every dog owner or keeper residing within the City Limits shall pay an annual tax of \$2.00 for each dog and \$3.00 for each female dog. No dog tags can be issued until dogs have been vaccinated for rabies.

All dog owners are urged to bring their dogs in the City Hall to have them vaccinated and to purchase the required tags.

## Antelopes Meet Friona Here Friday In Final Home Game Of Season; Bobcats Tough

The AHS Antelope's last scheduled home football game of the 1966 season will be played Friday night, Nov. 4, when they meet Friona in a District 3-AA tilt on Antelope Field at

7:30. It will be the last time Senior members of the Antelope squad will play a regular high school football game on their home field.

The Antelopes go to Olton Nov. 11, to end regular season play.

The Abernathy Antelopes fell prey to a stubborn defense as the Dimmitt Bobcats carried home a 18-0 victory over the 'Lopes on Friday night, October 28. The Bobcats became the first team to hold the Antelopes scoreless since the outset of the 1966 grid season.

The Bobcats, who cashed in on several Abernathy mistakes, rallied in the second quarter to produce a 11 to 0 lead at intermission.

A touchback with nine minutes and forty-one seconds left in the first half put the first Dimmitt score on the board. Abernathy quarterback Darrell Johnson dropped back from the Abernathy four yard line to pass; however, Johnson, who couldn't seem to find any eligible receivers, was quickly swarmed in the end zone by Dimmitt players.

Dimmitt's second tabulation came on a one yard keeper run up the middle by quarterback John Hays. The kick for extras was good making the score 9 to 0. The touchdown termina-

ted a drive which began at mid-field.

Shortly before the initial stanza was to end, the Bobcats once again capitalized on an Abernathy miscue. Johnson again rolled back to pass only to find no receivers in the clear. He attempted to run but lost ground finding himself once again in the end zone.

Late in the third quarter with four minutes and twenty-two seconds left in that period, David Land shoved the pigskin over the double stripe for the 'Cats' second touchdown. Land received the ball on a pitch-out from the Abernathy three yard scooted into the end zone. The extra kick was good.

Abernathy was never able to penetrate within more than ten yards of the goal line throughout the game.

The loss, which was Abernathy's second, gives the Antelopes an identical district record as that of Dimmitt. Both teams have won three games and lost two in district play.

In the classes for farm and ranch youngsters who own registered Angus heifers the championship was won by Randy Beedy, a Hutchinson County 4-H Club member. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Charles Beedy of Borger, Texas. The heifer, Miss Blackcap 3 of LG, is a half-sister to the heifer Randy showed as the champion at Dallas in 1965. She was produced in the Angus herd of Lee Gibson at Borger.

Mike Farnsworth, an F.F.A. member from Cisco, Texas, showed the reserve champion Angus heifer. She is Barbara Bude of 4M.

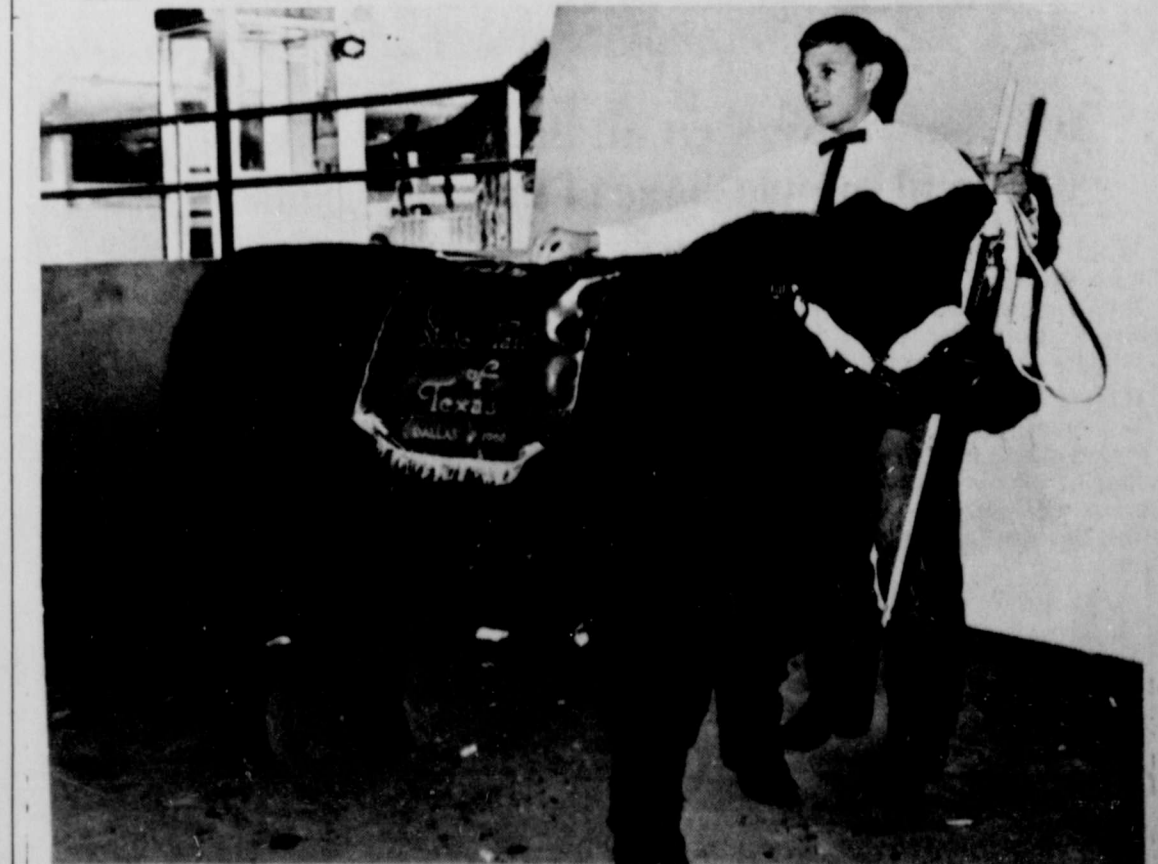
