





## Allotment

Hale County's 1967 cotton allotment has been increased to 157,735 acres, according to fig-ures released by John Martin, Hale County Agricultural Sta-bilization and Conservation

Service. When compared to the 1966 base acreage allotment of 155,-873, the increase is substantial but actual acreage allotment in 1966 was 157,295, Martin pointed out. This was due to acres purchased from other parts of the state under the sale and lease provision of the Agricultural Act of 1965.

The 1967 allotment figure, however, includes purchased acreage, denoting an actual increase of 440 acres.

In a report by Plains Cotton Growers, Lubbock, the 1967 base allotment for 23 High Plains counties represented by PCG 1s 2,165,872 acres compared to 2,122,770 acres in 1966.

The state Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service said the increase of 43,102 acres probably comes from other counties purchased by High Plains growers.

Projected yield for the 23county area increased from 513 to 542 pounds per acre in 1967. According to Hale County ASCS, Hale County's projected yield increased from 641 pounds in 1966 to 687 pounds in 1967. PCG officials said producers were paid 9.42 cents per pound times their projected yield on each acre of their domestic allotment in 1966. In addition, a payment of 10.5 cents per pound
