VETERANS DAY

With American troops once more locked in combat, defending the cause of freedom, Veterans Day - November 11 - takes on added significance this year. A new generation of war veterans is in the mold as the nation pauses to honor the men and women who have honorably served in the uniform of their country.

This day - which was once known as Armistice Day - was originally the anniversary of the ceasefire of World War I. From that war came The American Legion. But this year's observance of Veterans Day is in no way a consecration of the memory of any past armed conflict. Instead, it is a time to express the esteem and prestige with which Americans regard the role of the veteran.

While Veterans Day is meant to honor the 20 million men and women who have performed the highest obligation of their citizenship, the day is also dedicated to the cause of world peace with honor.

No one hates war more than the war veteran. No one strives more ardently for an honorable world peace than the veteran who has known war in all its brutality. But that same veteran knows that the lofty goals of an honorable world peace and recognition of individual dignity cannot be attained while there are forces in the world seeking its domination through acts of aggression.

This year, Veterans Day calls for an expression of national unity in support of the gallant men and women who are serving our nation's exalted purpose. They are writing inspiring pages of history with their sacrifices in the struggle against a godless ideology which seeks to subjugate mankind. Once again, they are proving the willingness and capability of ordinary citizens in meeting the challenge to champion the cause of freedom anywhere in the world.

The citizens of Abernathy area can contribute much to the meaning of Veterans Day by active participation in this year's observance. By our actions on this special day let's add strength to an expression of national unity at a time when the forces of aggression seek signs of internal weakness. As we honor our veterans - our champions of freedom - let us resolve to preserve what they have won and to persevere in our defense of freedom's cause until that day dawns on a world blessed with an honorable peace.

Voter Signup Is Under Way

The Hale County Tax Collector's office was busy with more than 1,000 persons signing up since Oct. 1, in the first days of registration for 1967 voting. The registration will continue until Jan. 31, 1967. County Tax Collector Bill Hollars said all persons who were mailed statements on the first of the month also were sent two applications for voter registration certificates and that these applications may be either mailed in or brought to the tax office.

Due to last year's ruling on the poll tax, there is no longer need for exemption certificates, with all registration being free.

Hollars also stated that if a person is over 60 years of age and he or she lives outside of the city limits of a city with 10,000 or more population, they need not register, but those either living in the city limits of any town, or outside the city limits of a city with less than 10,000 population do not need to register. These and all other requirements which were in effect under the old poll tax laws are still in effect under the free registration.

There are three full time substations of the Hale County Tax Collector's office located in Hale Center at Struve Dry Goods, in Abernathy at Abernathy Insurance Agency, and in Petersburg at Kelly-Suits Agency.

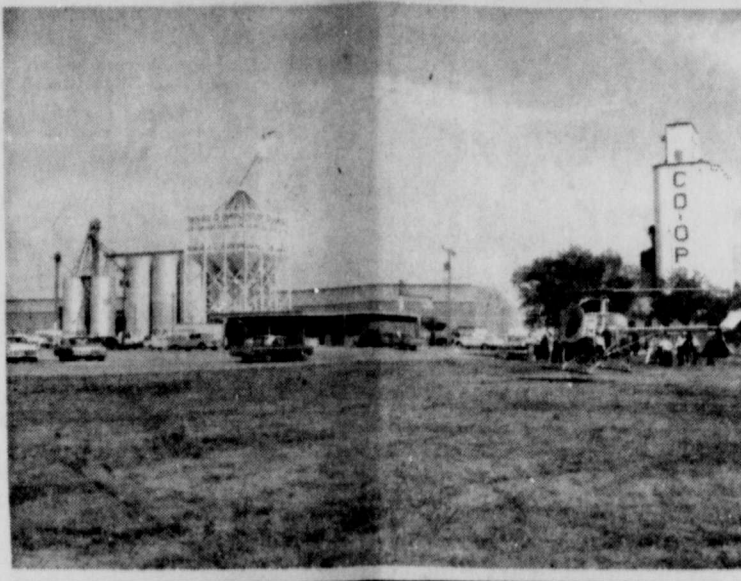

Abernathy Included In Lubbock County Civil Defense Shelter Survey

Bob Sokoll, City Manager, has announced that Abernathy is to be included in a Lubbock County Civilian Shelter Plan Survey, that is being sponsored by the Department of Defense. This will be a part of a nationwide survey that is now being made. The City of Lubbock Planning Department will be conducting the actual survey. All costs for this survey will be paid by the Federal Government.

Included in this survey will be qualified fallout shelters, buildings that do not qualify as fallout shelters, but ones that would offer persons a considerable amount of shelter during a major disaster, aerial photographs of the County, street and road capacity studies, and many other related studies.

The actual physical survey of Abernathy will probably be made within the next two weeks. Sokoll is requesting the help of the Abernathy businessmen, that might have buildings that would qualify as possible shelters, to cooperate with the men making this survey. Once this survey is completed, all pertinent information will be made available to all Lubbock County and Abernathy residents.

Antelopes Go To Olton To End Football Season

The AHS Antelopes will round out an interesting football season Friday night when they go to Olton for a District 3-AA game. Kick-off is at 7:30. Local fans are urged to follow the Antelopes and boost them to win their final football game of 1966.

(By Claudy Williams, Jr. School Correspondent) The Abernathy Antelopes returned to life in the second half of the Abernathy versus Friona ballgame to hand the Chieftains a 36 to 27 loss in the

District 3-AA contest. The ball game was the Antelopes' final home game of the regular season.

After a scoreless first quarter, Friona's defensive crew recovered an Abernathy fumble on the Abernathy three yard line with nine minutes left in the second period to set up the Chieftains first touchdown. Two plays later with slightly less than eight-and-a-half minutes left in the half, Eddie Barker powered across the double stripe for the first six points. The extra-point kick was wide to the right.

After an unsuccessful Abernathy drive, Friona took a tottering Abernathy punt at midfield and drove to the Abernathy eleven yard line. Tony Perea pushed through Abernathy's defensive wall for the remainder of the yardage. Ted Renner's extra-point kick hit the goal post rim making the score 13 to 0.

Another faulty Abernathy drive followed, and Friona once again took the ball at midfield. The following drive took the Chieftains to the Abernathy six yard line where Renner pushed over the TD. The extra point kick was good.

Harry Mathis returned the Friona kick-off eighty-five yards with forty-seven seconds left in the half to put Abernathy on the scoreboard. The extra-point kick went wide making the score 20 to 6.

On the ensuing kick-off, Renner returned the ball eighty yards for the Chieftains final touchdown and the final touchdown of the first half. The PAT was good.

The second half was all Abernathy's with the Antelopes never being threatened. Mathis added the 'Lopes' second touchdown midway through the third quarter from three yards out. A running conversion attempt failed.

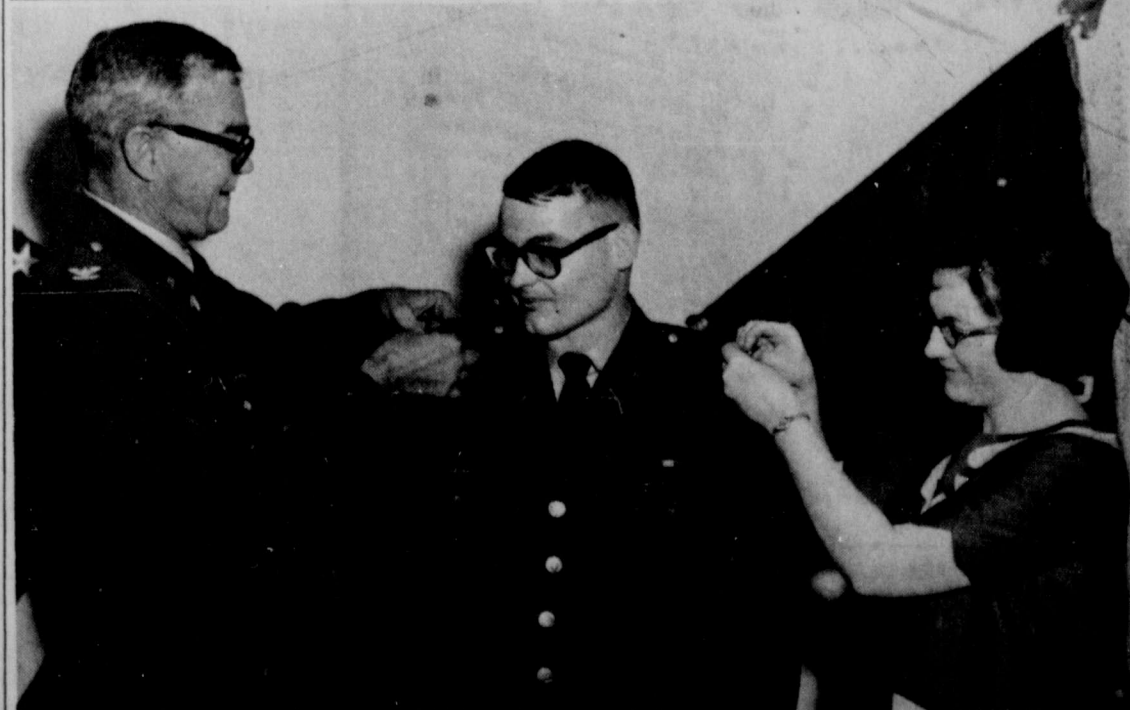

During his guerrilla training, he lived under simulated Vietnam conditions for five days, fighting off night attacks and conducting raids on "enemy" villages. He was taught methods of removing booby traps, setting ambushes, and avoiding enemy ambushes.

Other specialized training included small unit tactics, map reading, land mine warfare, communications, and firing the M-14 rifle, M-60 machinegun and 3.5-inch rocket launcher.

Soil Moisture Tested by Atomic Energy -- Agricultural scientists at Texas A&M University's Livestock and Forage Research Center, McGregor, are using a neutron scattering rig to test soil moisture. It sends neutrons out into the soil and captures them as they bounce back. The number of neutrons bouncing back gives an indication of soil moisture, A&M researchers say.
