

Revised Voting Requirements In Referendum

Producers of upland cotton who vote Dec. 5-9 to determine whether a research and promotion order should be issued for upland cotton have been allotted additional time in which to establish their production interest, the U.S. Department of Agriculture anno-

unced today. Officials of USDA'S Consumer and Marketing Service said a farmer with additional production in a county or State other than the county in which he is eligible to vote must establish that interest with his county ASCS office in order for that production to be considered. He now has until the expiration of the referendum, Dec. 9, to accomplish this. Before today's action he was required to establish his interest in other farms prior to the beginning of the referendum, Dec. 5.

than two-thirds but more than half of the producers voting approve the order, it will be ne cessary to calculate the volumn of production by voters to determine if that mahority accounts for two-thirds of the cotton represented in the referendum. County ASCS offices will make this calculation on the basis of their records of 1966 planted acreage and projected lint yield per

acre for each farm. This order was proposed by the National Cotton Council. The legislation authorizing it was designed to enable cotton producers to engage in a comprehensive self-help program to strengthen cotton's competitive position and to maintain and expand domestic and foreign markets and uses for U.S. Cotton.
