



The fire in the garage housing the rolling home was discovered about 10:20 p.m. Friday by the Pinsons' next door neighbor north. Mrs. Fred Boone saw the blaze when she went to her kitchen sink for a glass of water before retiring. She called the fire department and her daughter, Joy, rushed to the Pinson home to warn them. "We were watching the news when Joy came in, " Pinson said. Some of the Pinsons' five children were in bed but none were asleep. In addition to the Pinsons, an overnight guest was in the house, Johnny Rantz, son of Mr. and Mrs. Hilbert Rantz. And, one of the Pinsons daughters, Kim, was an overnight guest of the Curtis Davenports' daughter that night.

Cause of the fire was believed to have been a heat lamp in an enclosed "breezeway" between the residence and the 2-story garage. The lamp was there to keep the Pinsons' dog warm. "The lamp either exploded or was knocked over by the dog."
