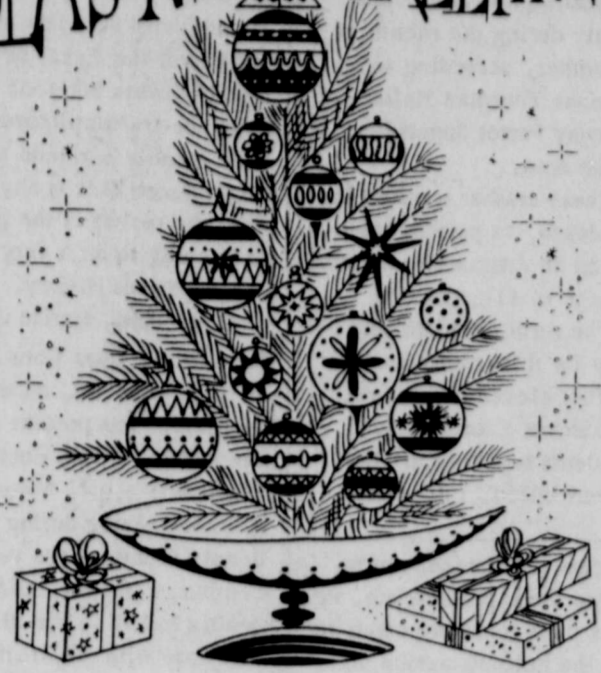

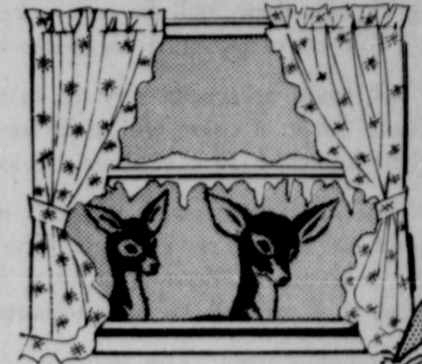

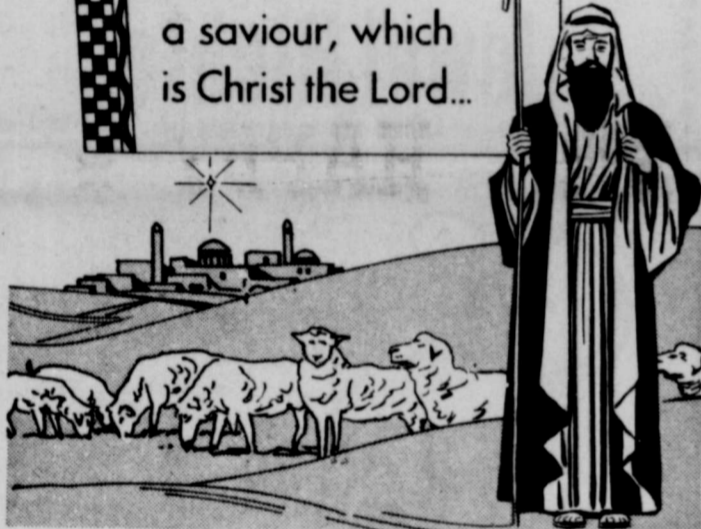

DPS SLATES YULE "DEATH WATCH"

"The DPS will be concentrating its efforts more than ever in an attempt to make sure that the indicated death toll of 47 persons is not reached," said Garrison. "This year has been the most terrible in Texas history in terms of lives lost and property damage, and we are working with other state agencies and organization interested in safety in order to hold down this toll as much as possible."

"We are issuing a personal invitation to each motorist, asking every individual to join the battle, and it must be considered a battle, for traffic has claimed more lives than have been lost in all the wars in which we have been engaged."

"Operation Deathwatch" will be conducted from 6 p.m. Friday, December 23 through 11:59 p.m., Monday, December 26, to focus attention on dangers involved in holiday travel. The present traffic trend indicates that 47 persons will die in traffic during this period.

The "Deathwatch" will resume for the New Year's weekend, beginning at 6 p.m., Friday, December 30, and continuing through 11:59 p.m. Monday, January 2. Indications for the New Year's period are that 36 persons will die in traffic accidents.

To supplement its enforcement activities, the DPS will place approximately 150 additional men from its other uniformed services on highway patrol duty. Every effort will be made to remove dangerous or irresponsible drivers from the highways for the safety of law-abiding motorists.

Traffic deaths will be tabulated at DPS headquarters in Austin, and reports will be issued to news media sources three times daily to show just how the "Countdown" stands. "Countdown boards" will be distributed to news media so

HOLIDAY SAFETY MESSAGE ISSUED

AUSTIN--Forty-seven persons in Texas will be the focus of one of the most intensive traffic safety efforts ever to be expended during the Christmas holiday weekend, according to Department of Public Safety Director Col. Homer Garrison, Jr.

Your Texas Highway Department works hard to make holiday travel as safe and convenient as possible. Construction areas, however, pose special driving hazards on the 67,000-mile Texas Highway system.

Here is a bulletin that pinpoints current construction projects in your area. There may be one or more of these projects in your area.

The Texas Highway Department urges you to let your

readers and listeners know where these projects are. Repeat their locations often during the holiday period and remind drivers to observe warning signs.

Above all, we hope you will urge safe driving everywhere to make this a happy, safe holiday season.

The Texas Highway Department appreciates your cooperation in rendering these important public services throughout the year.

The Texas Safety Association is distributing a kit of "Holiday Safety Materials" and is stressing the need for courtesy and caution during the holiday period.

The Texas Highway Department is distributing reminders on danger spots, construction areas, and information on signs and markers to help keep drivers informed and alert.

The Texas Association of Broadcasters and the Southern Baptist Radio and Television Commission are cooperating in the distribution and use of radio announcements concerning safe driving practices. And the Texas Motor Transportation Association and the Council of Safety Supervisors are working with members of the trucking industry to promote safe driving practices and alertness during the holiday period.

18 RURAL ACCIDENTS INVESTIGATED IN NOV.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 18 accidents on rural highways in Hale County during the month of November, according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one death, 13 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$13,570.00.

The rural accident summary for this county during the first eleven months of 1966 shows a total of 225 accidents resulting in eight persons killed, 136 persons

injured, and an estimated property damage of \$186,680

The 1966 December traffic cloud hangs very low and dark over the Texas streets and highways horizon. What does the traffic picture look like for this year-end holiday season? If it is anything like the repeat of the past it is going to be a very sad one for Texas History.

Since 1960, traffic deaths in Texas have risen from 2,254 to 3,028 in 1965. At the beginning of this present month, the traffic fatality count in Texas was 2,921. Motorists are now driving during the most deadly month of the year. December, 1965 was the most deadly month in the history of this state with 363 traffic fatalities.

What kind of picture could this year end with? The 2,921 traffic deaths already recorded plus 363 deaths similar to last December would give a total of 3,284 traffic deaths. The Sergeant stated it is estimated that this year's traffic death count will be about 15 per cent over 1965.

16 PERSONS ARE INJURED IN HALE COUNTY ACCIDENTS

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 27 accidents on rural highways in Hale County during the month of October, according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer, highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in 16 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$117,240.00.

The rural accident summary for this county during the first ten months of 1966, shows a total of 207 accidents resulting in 7 persons killed, 123 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$173,110.00.

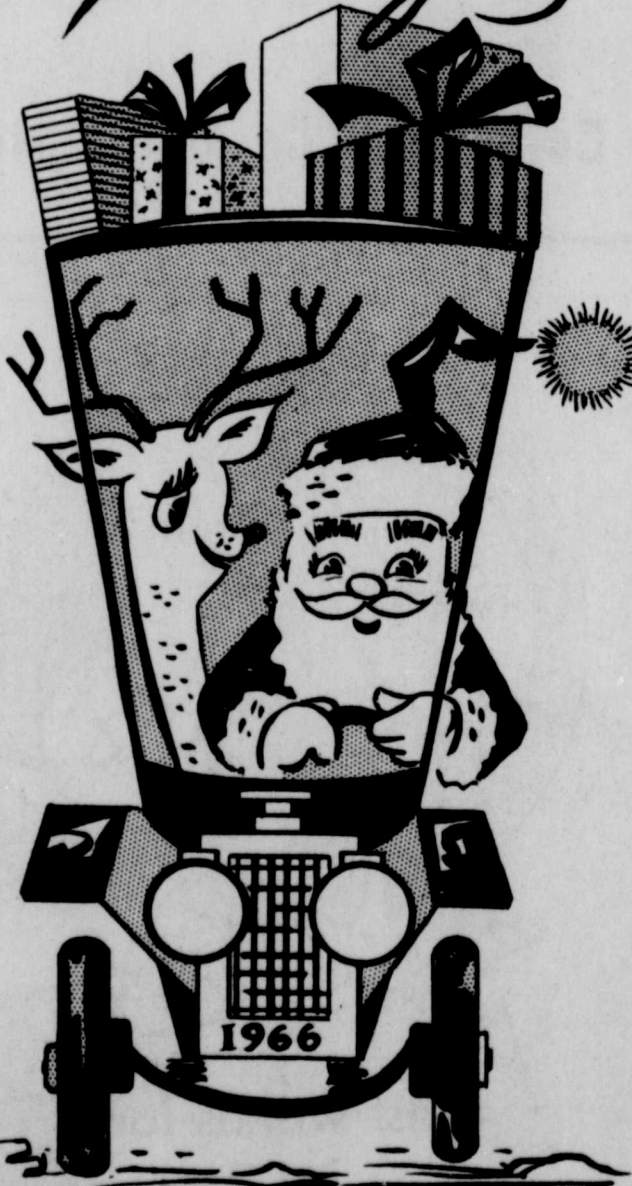

Mr. Babson has probably done more than any other man to create among his millions of newspaper readers an interest in simple business problems, and to instill a broader vision in businessmen, enabling them to meet the ups-and-downs of the business cycle.
