A Lubbock man was killed when his car crashed into the rear of a semi-trailer truck about 10 miles north of Lamesa on U.S. 87 about 2:30 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 10.

Dead on arrival at Medical Arts Hospital in Lamesa was James Scott Hooneyham, 25, 2702 68th St.

Highway Patrolman Stone reported Mooneyham's car struck the rear of a truck driven by Huldric Alfred Davis of Midland as Davis attempted a left turn off U.S. 87. Stone said Davis was in the left turn lane, but had swung his truck into the right lane to get more room for the turn, blocking Mooneyham as he attempted to pass.

His body was taken to Branon-Phillips Funeral Home and later transferred to Chambers

Funeral Home in Abernathy. Funeral rites were held Thursday in Abernathy First Baptist Church, with the Rev. Hubert Long, pastor officiating.


The first game of the night saw the Abernathy girls leap into the lead at the outset of the game, and by the end of first quarter, the Antelopes had built up a 17 to 12 lead, Early in the second quarter the Friona girls were able to tie up the contest 17 to 17; however, Abernathy quickly broke the tie to take a 29 to 27 advantage to the dressing room at the half.

Midway through the third quarter the Friona team once again tied up the game; this time to 33 to 33. Abernathy mac good its next attempt at scoring; then Friona did likewise, making the score 35 to 35. Friona than took a 36 to 35 lead on a free throw to place themselves at the helm for the remainder of the game. The 59 to 50 final score was the widest margin of the game.

High scorers for the game were Friona's Hazel Fallwell with 30 points and Abernathy's Mary Davis with 28. Other girls in double figures from Frions were Cindy Ingram and Susan Neill with 15 and 10 points respectively. Margaret Davis and Gerry Rodgers each had II points for Abernathy.

Abernathy got off to a slow start in the boys' contest as Friona took a 5 to o lead before Abernathy was able to score. However, once Abernathy got their forces organized they were able to surmount Friona's lead to produce a 15 to 14 advantage of their own at the end of the first quarter. COTTON STAPLE IS IMPROVED

The 1966 South Plains cotton crop showed a slight improvement in staple over the 1965 crop, according to W. K. Palmer, in charge of the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office of the USDA.

Final harvesting figures of this season's crop have not been completed, but estimates indicate that approximately 1,225,000 bales will be classed. The three South Plains approximately 2, 118, 000 bales of the 1965 crop.

Only 8 per cent of the South Plains cotton this season was classed in the White grades. Fifty-five per cent was classed in the Light Spotted grades and 37 per cent in the Spotted and Tinged grades. This represented a much high-



Average scaple length improved this season and averaged 30. 0/32nds inch, or sling ghtly better than 15/16 of an inch. Average staple of the 1965 crop was 30.0/32nds of an inch, or 15/16 of an inch. Twelve per cent of this season's crop was 1-inch and longer and 2 per cent was an 1-1/8 and longer. This represented a significant improvement over the 1965

Micronaire of this season's crop was lower than the 1965 crop. Only 27 per cent of this season's crop was in the premium category of 3.5 and better, compared to 35 per cent of the 1965 crop. Eleven per cent of this season's crop was 2.6 and below, compared to 8 per cent of the 1965 crop. The early freeze in October halted the maturing process of the cotton in the northern two-thirds of the area, thereby causing a low micronaire crop. Micronaire declinded rapidly after October 19th and during the week, ending December 7th only 9 s per cent of the cotton classed [in the Lubbock office had a g micronaire reading of 3.5 5 w and better.

Before the freeze during the middle of October, prospects appeared excellent for a high quality crop due to efforts made to plant better quality cotton.

Vehicle Inspection Deadline April 15

AUSTIN -- Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety. reminded Texas motorists today that most vehicles have not yet been inspected for their 1967 vehicle inspection sticker.

"The inspection period is two-thirds over and only about one-third of the vehicles have been inspected," said Garrison, This means that during the 14 weeks remaining before the April 15 deadline for inspections, more than twice as many persons each week must have their car inspected to avoid long lines forming at the end of the period."

In urging motorists to have their vehicle inspected at an early date, Garrison pointed out that official inspection stations are easily identifi ed by the standard sign displayed at or near the service entrance

of the garage. He advised that inspection stations are being urged to request permission to inspect any vehicle brought into the garage for repairs or regular service.

INCOME TAX

FARMER'S FILING REQUIRE-**MENTS**

Dallas, Texas -- Farmers who earned at least two-thirds of thier 1966 gross income from farming should file their declaration of estimated Federal income tax for 1966 on or before Monday, January 16, 1967. Form 1040Es should be used for this purpose.

However, Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue in northern Texas. said that farmers need not file an estimate if they file thier 1966 Federal income tax return, Form 1040, and pay in full any tax due by February 15, 1967.
