## Public Hearing Set On Plumbing Code

The Abernathy City Council has been considering a Plumbing Code now for the past three years. On July 11, 1966, a Plumbing Board was appointed by the City Council to study Abernathy's need of a Code of this type. At the January 9th Council Meeting it was reported that the Plumbing Board had concluded its study, and it was their recommendation that a Plumbing Code be adopted in Abernathy.

After discussing this matter for some time, the Council decided that it would give the citizens a chance to voice their opinions before any further action was taken. A Public Hearing has been called specifically for this purpose. The Hearing was set for the next Regular Council Meeting, which will be at 7:30 P. M. on Monday, February 13th. Any citizen that has an interest in a Plumbing Code, whether it be for or against is urged to be at this Hearing.

The basic purpose of a Plumbing Code of this type is to protect the property owner. It would not only make sure that all future plumbing work in Abernathy is done right, but also that all the materials used meet certain specifications. This Code would require all plumbers doing work in Abernathy to have a State Master or Journeyman's License and have a surety bond on file with the City to guarantee his work. Permits would have to be obtained by the Plumber at City Hall before any plumbing work is done. All plumbing work would be required to be inspected by the City Plumbing Inspector. A permit would not be required on minor repairs such as maintenance or the replacement of yard hydrants, sill cocks, flush valves and float-balls in water closets.

It should be noted that a Plumbing Code is not something new. Almost all cities and towns of Abernathy's size have a Code of this type to regulate plumbing work, as well as having Electrical and Building Codes to make sure the work is done to certain minimum specifications. The primary purpose of any Code of this type is for the benefit of the citizen.

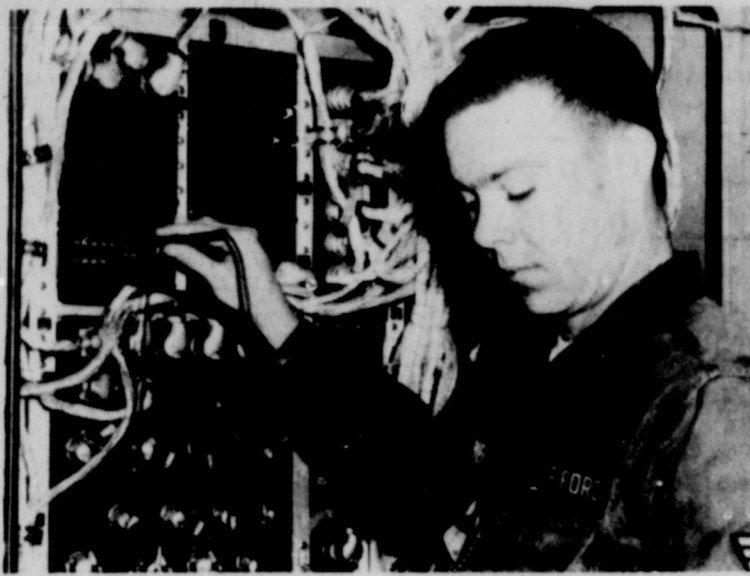

### PO CUSTOMER'S BILL OF RIGHTS

Postmaster Herman Lambert today called attention of Abernathy mailers to the new "Postal Customer's Bill of Rights" to help meet President Johnson's government-wide goal of improving the quality of federal services to the public.

Directed at post office window services, Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien has ordered the Customer's Bill of Rights implemented by two immediate steps at Abernathy.

1. Posters will be displayed in the post office lobby and service counters containing 10 points which specify the kind of treatment customers have a right to expect.

2. Instructions from Mr. O'Brien call for careful observance of all points in the "Postal Customer's Bill of Rights." The instructions also provide directions for the most efficient management of window services.

The posters tell customers they are entitled to:

1. A neat, clean counter on which to transact business.
2. Service by a well-groomed neat window employee.
3. A friendly greeting that expresses a desire to assist.
4. Knowledgeable, well-informed, interested window personnel to help with postal needs.
5. Prompt, alert and efficient service.
6. Competent and correct information on inquiries.
7. An attitude that reflects helpfulness, patience and congeniality.
8. The courtesy and tact that would be expected from a friend.
9. Polite referral to another window or individual, when necessary, to give the appropriate service.
10. A feeling, upon leaving, that the post office is glad to serve and help at all times.

Instructions for fulfilling "The Postal Customer's Bill of Rights" are being distributed to all window personnel by Postmaster Lambert.

Mr. O'Brien stated in connection with the new postal service improvement effort:

"President Johnson insisted that every federal employee give added attention to providing the American people with the very best service possible... Since your daily duties bring you in direct and continuing contact with our customers, I would like to tell you what I consider the type of service the American people have a right to expect when dealing with the largest business operation in the world."

In addition to improving relations with customers, Postmaster Lambert said, the "Customer's Bill of Rights" can expedite handling of transactions at the windows and make the service more efficient.

He urged Abernathy residents to assist in this effort, by stating their needs clearly, and having money and any necessary filled-out forms ready for transactions.

The Postmaster explained that demands on window personnel, who must deal with a wide variety of information, forms and varying services, are usually very heavy, and postal customers can assist them in meeting the new service goals by being as brief and business-like as possible.

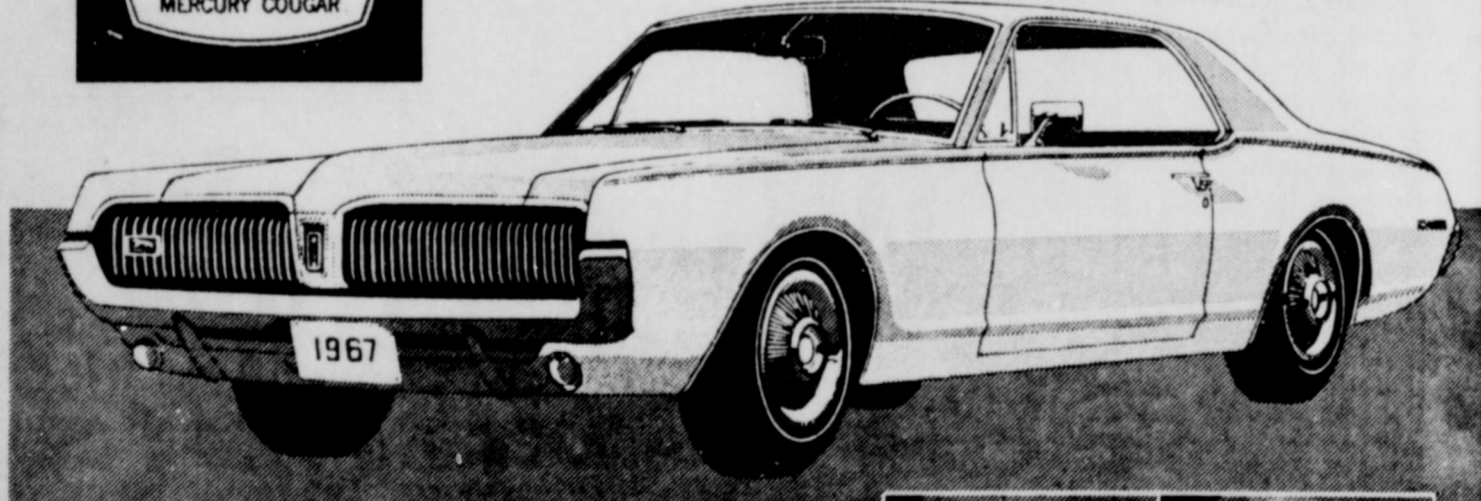
