Train Kills Teen-Agers

Father Is Former Policeman Here

Three Stratford teen-agers, all children of a former Abernathy policeman and his wife, were killed Sunday when a Rock Island freight train struck their car in that Texas Panhandle town. Their father is a policeman at Stratford, where he moved after leaving Abernathy five or six years ago.

The victims were Patricia, 16; Lewis Dan, 15, and Teddy Joe Blanchard, 14, all children of Mr. and Mrs. Dan Blanchard.

It was not determined which of the three youngsters was at the wheel of the car, dragged nearly one-third mile by the locomotive of the 70-car train.

"I saw it coming," said Jack D. Wilkinson, engineer of the train from Dalhart. "The kids apparently froze on the track."

Police said witnesses could not say whether the driver tried to stop before he got to the crossing or tried to pass in front of the locomotive.

The train was traveling about 25 miles an hour, Wilkinson said.

The crossing is guarded by a flashing red signal and bells.

TOBY TAYLOR HONORED AT N. M. M. I.

ROSWELL, N. M. - Headquarters New Mexico Military Institute has announced the names of the cadets who are being honored for achieving the Superintendent's List, Dean's List, and Commandant's List, for the fall semester, 1966-67 school year. The loss of pets is disturbing, but those who lost the dogs to poisoning were more concerned that a small child could have found the deadly bait before the dogs did.



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
