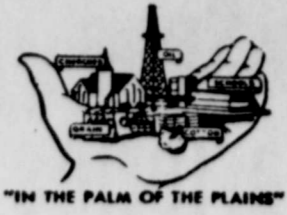

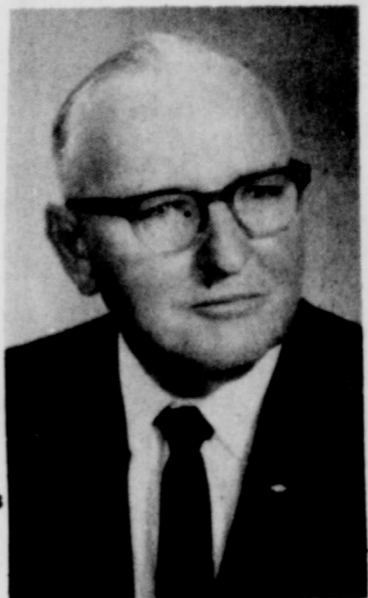
A highlight of the recognition portion of the program was the naming of two new Honorary Members of the YF Chapter, Rudolph Struve and Joe Thompson.

DALTON L. JAMES To Retire From School Post AT NEW DEAL

Longtime Area School Official To Leave Post

Longtime educator Dalton L. James, superintendent of the New Deal schools, has announced his retirement effective July 1.

James' resignation marks the end of a 39-year career in public education. He has spent the last 14 of those years at the helm of the New Deal schools, where he has been the third superintendent to serve in the schools' 32-year history.

Started in 1927 at Princeton High School in Collin County. He served as principal at Josephine where he and his 13 brothers and sisters attended school.

He later became superintendent at Fairlee in Hunt County. Among his students there was former Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr.

James spent 12 years as head of three schools in Dallas County before moving to New Deal in 1943 as high school principal.

Served Area Schools James was superintendent at Lorenzo for five years, beginning in 1945, then served as high school principal at Shallowater and Whiteface.

He returned to New Deal as superintendent in 1953. The New Deal district, nine miles north of Lubbock, completed a new \$450,000 high school in September 1966.

James holds a bachelor's degree from East Texas State University and a master of education degree from Texas Tech. He also attended North Texas State University.

His wife, also a longtime teacher, will also retire this summer from her position with the New Deal schools.

The Jameses were married in 1929. They have one son, Wayne, executive director of the Texas Tech Ex - Student Association. Asked about his plans after retirement, James answered: "I am going fishing."

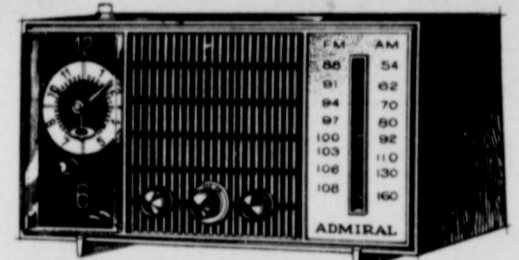

Rapeseed Project Meeting Is Planned For Thursday

Plains farmers interested in making trial plantings of Rapeseed are invited to attend a meeting in Plainview or Floydada Thursday according to M. A. Elms, Jr., Paymaster Oil Mills, chairman of the New Oilseed Development Committee of the Texas Cottonseed Crushers' Association, sponsor of the meetings.

Elms points out that Rapeseed contain about 400 per cent edible vegetable oil and the rest is protein meal. But, the big reason all Plains Crushing Mills are encouraging rapeseed production is the crop's low moisture requirements. He says the Association has enough faith in the future of the crop to furnish planting seed and buy the seed produced at a reasonable price. The crop is spring planted, around April 1, and is grown and handled a lot like wheat.

Even though Rapeseed is new to Plains growers it is no "Johnny-come-lately," Elms said. It ranks fifth in the world as an edible vegetable oilseed crop; just behind cottonseed. Rapeseed are grown extensively in Europe, Asia, North Africa, South America and Canada. There has been

a big increase in acreage in Canada due to the development of new high-yielding varieties with better quality oil and meal. Seed from their latest and best variety, Certified Target, will be used for trial plantings on the Plains.

A complete explanation of the Rapeseed Project will be presented and questions answered at the meetings. The Plainview Meeting will be held in the Plainview Chamber of Commerce at 2:30 p.m., Thursday, and the Floydada Meeting in the Floydada Chamber of Commerce at 7:30 p.m.
