

March 17 DEADLINE FOR PARTICIPATION IN FARM CROP PROGRAM APPROACHES

Hale County farmers are warned that the last day to sign applications for participation in the 1967 wheat, upland cotton and feed grains program is March 17, according to E.J. Pope Jr., chairman of the Hale County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Commit-

Through Feb. 23, 1572 cotton growers in Hale County had signed up to divert 43,163 acres from upland cotton production and 1005 county farms with allotments totaling 51,480 acres had been signed up to partici-

pate in the wheat program. Explaining the provision of the program, Pope said national average price - support loan rate for 1967-crop wheat is \$1.25 per bushel, available on all the wheat produced on a participation farm. The marketing certificate will be based on 100 per cent of parity as of July 1, less the announced national average loan level of \$1.25 per bushel: the certificate will be available on 35 per cent of a

intention to do this. Pope said upland cotton program benefits include diversion payments and price - support payments in addition to the regular cotton price - support loan. But all program benefits, including the loan, will be available only to farmers who sign up and then carry out the intentions indicated in the appli-

If the the grower wishes, he may request half of the estimated diversion payment to be made in advance at the time of the signup or as soon thereafter as possible. The rest of the diversion payment and the price - support payment will be made later after program per-

formance has been determined. Reduce Plantings Cotton farmers on the larger farms take part in the program by reducing their cotton plantings by at least 12.5 per cent below the farm's effective allotment and meeting other program provisions. As much as

35 per cent of the allotment may be diverted as payment. Growers on small farms with allotments not over 10 acres or with a projected production of 3,600 pounds or less will receive payment without having to reduce plantings. If the operator chooses to reduce the acreage on such a farm, an additional diversion payment will be made ledge.

on the acres actually diverted at the level signed up. Pope points out that only growers who participate in the program will be eligible for price support is made available through loans, purchases, and price - support payments.

Except on small farms with

bases of 25 acres or less and some farms with larger bases where no feed grain is to be planted, no diversion payment is available under the 1967 feed grain program. Price - support payments of 30 cents per bushet and 53 cwt. for grain sorghum may be earned on the projected production from an acreage up to 50 per cent of the farm's total feed grain base by planting corn or grain sorghums, or by planting soybeans in lieu of these feed grains. The national average loan rates are \$1.05 per bushel for corn and

\$1.61 cwt. for grain sorghum. Farmers who participate in the 1967 upland cotton and feed grain programs are being cautioned about the kind of land they intend to divert under such

programs. Payments for a farm will be reduced where the county committee determines that the cropland set aside for diverted acres is less productive than the average cropland normally used to produce the crop.

In such a case, the farm operator will be given an opportunity and urged to designate other land of at least average productivity for diversion under the program. If this is not done, program payments will be reduced in proportion to the lower yields which could be expected from the acreage divert-

Any reduction indicated in the payment otherwise earned by the farmer would be substracted, as applicable, from the farm diversion, the price - support, and the certificate payments in that order. Diversion payments are available for upland cotton and some feed grain farms: price - support payments are available for upland cotton and feed grains; and certificate payments are available in con-
