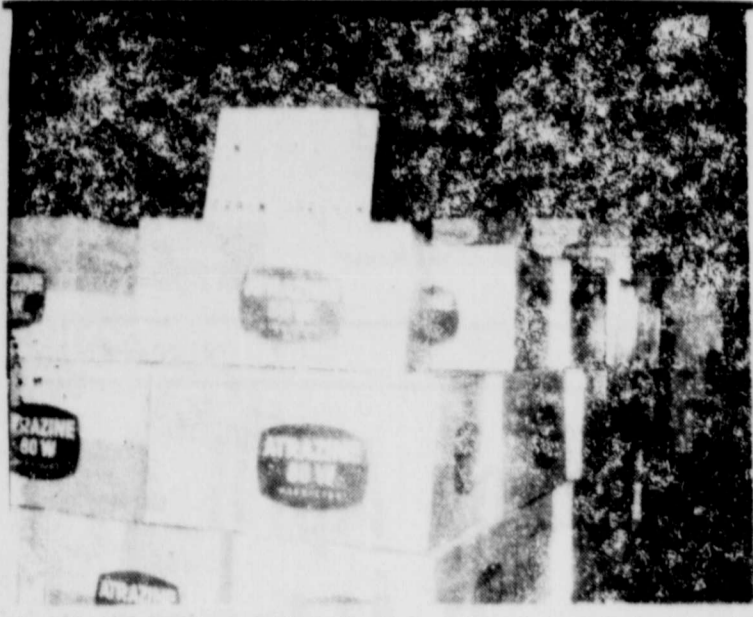

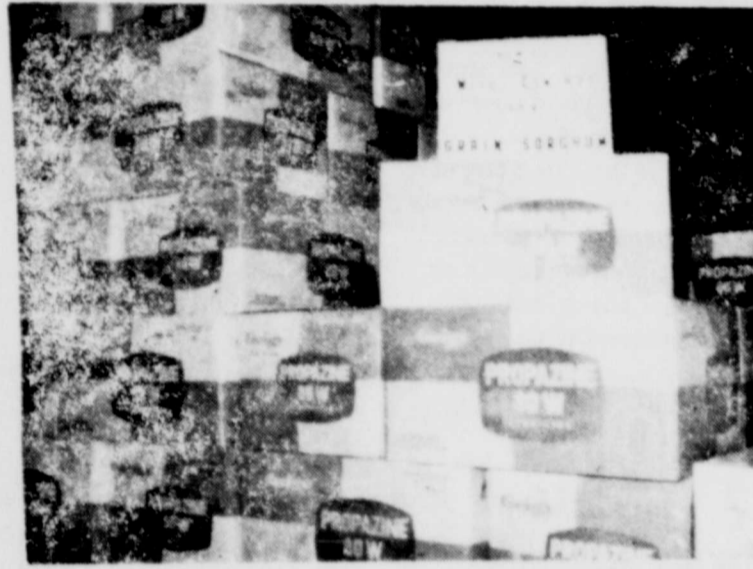

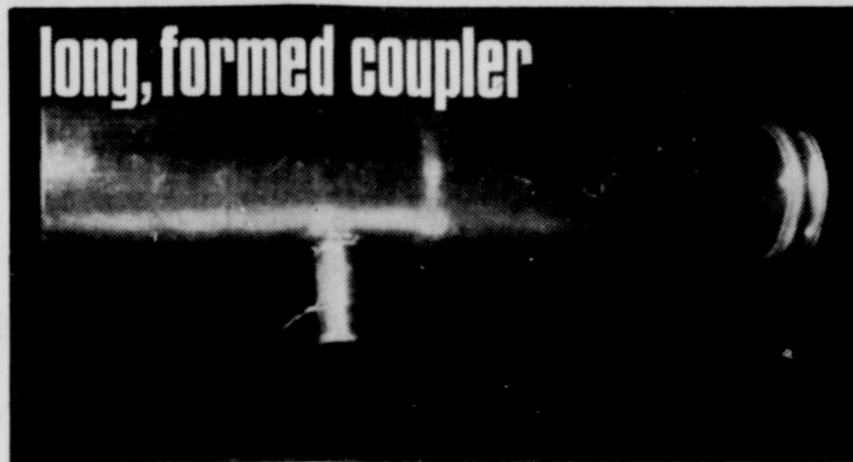

Castor Outlook Favorable

A favorable situation confronts Texas castor producers as planting time draws near.

The demand for castor seed is great, says Dr. Raymond D. Brigham, research agronomist at the South Plains Research and Extension Center in Lubbock.

Only 15 per cent of the 158 million pounds of castor oil consumed in the United States last country, Brigham points out.

With the recent breakthrough in the use of castor meal as an economical high protein livestock feed, increased demands for castor seed should result.

The price situation also presents a favorable front since oil prices were up in 1966 and appeared to be on the increase in early 1967.

Another enticing situation to growers is that this year they are allowed to plant castor on the 20 per cent mandatory diverted feed grain acreage, says the agronomist.

Furthermore, seed producers

have a good supply of high yielding castor planting seed available in the form of six hybrids and two varieties. Brigham points out that these firms also will contract with growers to purchase their castor production at a guaranteed price.

Last year's yields in the state's castor producing areas were reduced by 20 to 30 per cent due to unfavorable weather conditions, says the agronomist. The cool, wet weather in late August and early September killing frost in mid-October shortened the growing season.

Yields in the Kress area on the top five farms averaged 2,083 pounds per acre while the top four farms in the Plainview area yielded 1,982 pounds per acre. One of the top per acre yields of this area was the 2,368 pounds produced by Jack Rhine of Hale Center.

In the Lockney, Muleshoe, Hereford and Dumas areas, yields ranged from 1,800 to 2,000 pounds per acre, reports Brigham.

The state's top yield of 3,150 pounds per acre was produced by Preston Underhill of the Higginbotham Community, County. Near that mark was the 3,000 pounds per acre produced by Stanley Aincinec of Loop, also in Gaines County.

Brigham says the primary reason for the higher yields in this county was due to more favorable growing conditions.

According to the agronomist, the dwarf - internode hybrids produced higher yields than the open pollinated varieties.

Research is continuing at the South Plains Research and Extension Center to find high yielding, disease - resistant hybrids which will increase yields and thus make castors a more profitable crop.

Brigham says that yields could be increased by 10 to 15 per cent if capsule mold diseases were effectively controlled.

Castor Outlook Favorable

A favorable situation confronts Texas castor producers as planting time draws near.

The demand for castor seed is great, says Dr. Raymond D. Brigham, research agronomist at the South Plains Research and Extension Center in Lubbock.

Only 15 per cent of the 138 million pounds of castor oil consumed in the United States last country, Brigham points out.

With the recent breakthrough in the use of castor meal as an economical high protein livestock feed, increased demands for castor seed should result.

The price situation also presents a favorable front since oil prices were up in 1966 and appeared to be on the increase in early 1967.

Another enticing situation to growers is that this year they are allowed to plant castor on the 20 per cent mandatory diverted feed grain acreage, says the agronomist.

Furthermore, seed producers

have a good supply of high yielding castor planting seed available in the form of six hybrids and two varieties. Brigham points out that these firms also will contract with growers to purchase their castor production at a guaranteed price.

Last year's yields in the state's castor producing areas were reduced by 20 to 30 per cent due to unfavorable weather conditions, says the agronomist. The cool, wet weather in late August and early September killing frost in mid-October shortened the growing season.

Yields in the Kress area on the top five farms averaged 2,083 pounds per acre while the top four farms in the Plainview area yielded 1,982 pounds per acre. One of the top per acre yields of this area was the 2,368 pounds produced by Jack Rhine of Hale Center.

In the Lockney, Muleshoe, Hereford and Dumas areas, yields ranged from 1,800 to 2,

000 pounds per acre, reports Brigham.

The state's top yield of 3,150 pounds per acre was produced by Preston Underhill of the Higginbotham Community, County. Near that mark was the 3,000 pounds per acre produced by Stanley Ancinec of Loop, also in Gaines County.

Brigham says the primary reason for the higher yields in this county was due to more favorable growing conditions.

According to the agronomist, the dwarf - internode hybrids produced higher yields than the open pollinated varieties.

Research is continuing at the South Plains Research and Extension Center to find high-yielding, disease - resistant hybrids which will increase yields and thus make castors a more profitable crop.

Brigham says that yields could be increased by 10 to 15 per cent if capsule mold diseases were effectively controlled.

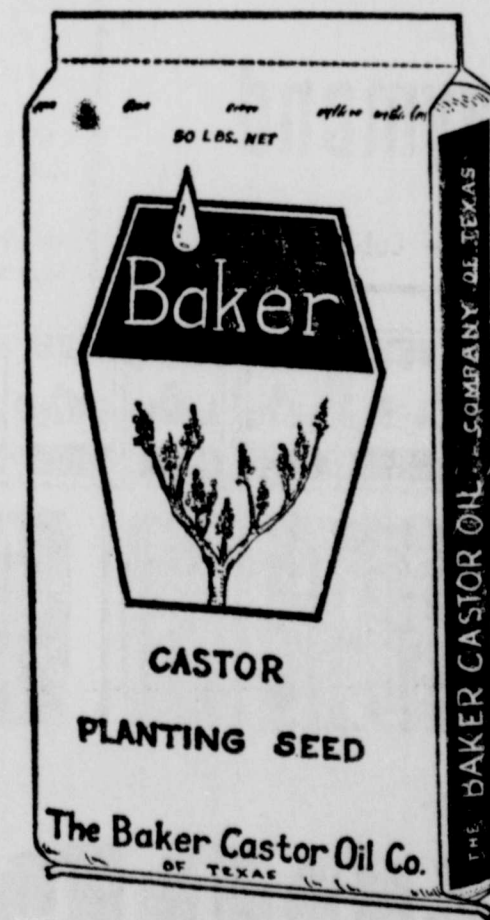
