TOPIC:Use Preaddressed Form 1040A

DALLAS, Texas -- Taxpayers who received a 1966 preaddressed Form 1040A are urged to file that form if it fits their needs and they are eligible to use it,


Ellis Campbell, Jr., District D'rector of Internal Revenue for northern Texas, said today that substantial savings will be realized if the form provid d is used because fewer key-punch operations are necessary top ocess the return. "It also helps us utilize the full capabilities for which the Automatice Data Processing system was designed," he said.

If yourname or address has changed make the necessary corrections and strike through lightly the preprinted information. If you have a refund due, this will help insure delivery of the check to the correct address.

Taxpayers should also verify that their correct socail security number is entered on the return they file.

The filing deadline for 1966 tax return is April 17. 1966.

(Dallas, Texas) -- The income tax instructions mailed to taxpayers do not tell the Possum Kingdom Lake last we- whole story for married taxpayers in Texas, Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of the Dallas District, points out that married couples in Texas must consider the Texas Com-



mining what they should report on their income tax return. They must distinguish between what is community property and income if they slan on filing seperate returns,

each spouse must take into account half of the community income and deductions, and all of his or her separate income and deductions, to determine the proper tax on separate returns, Each may claim only his won exemptions and deductions. A dependent supported with community funds may be claimed by either spouse -- however, an exemption may not be divided by the ta-

ble for filing an income tax return and paying the tax due on 1/2 of her working husband's income, unless they file a joint return that is signed by both husband and wife. Determining the amount of community income and deductions becomes especially important in divorce cases. The husband and wife are each liable for income tax on 1/2 of the income from the salaries of both and are each entitled to 1/2 of the deductions up to the date of divorce. Each is naturally liable for his or her own separate income after the date of divorce.

Mr. Campbell emphasizes three special areas affected by

(1) Extra Dividend Exclusion Since dividends are considered community property in Texas, the husband and wife may claim a \$200 dividend ext!usion rather than \$100, no matter which spouse owns the stock, An estimated 160, 531 Dallas District taxpayers filing joint returns report dividends on their tax return. Many of these taxpayers do not understand that the community property law gives them a double dividend exclusion. (2) Extra Capital Loss Deduc-

Welcome to our

Community property law makes it possible for Texas taxpayers with a capital loss of more than \$1000 on sale of community property, to file separate returns and claim as much as \$1000 capital loss on each teturn. Anestimated 22,462 Dallas District taxpayers file joint returns showing a capital loss each year. Some of these are eligible to file separate returns and claim an additional loss.

(3) Retirement Income Credit The community property law works both for and against Texas 1 xpayers in claiming retirement income credit. When one spouse retires and becomes eligible for retirement income on his tax return and the other spouse continues to work, the community property law can eliminate part or all of the retirement income credit that would be available to the retired taxpayer in other states. On the bene fit side, commun-

xpayers who need additional information to claim the proper dividend exclusion, cantal loss, or retirement income credit. Taxpayers who are concerned about the community property effect on their income tax return should call the Internal Revenue Service for help.






