PIT WORK BEING DONE AT FM 597, US 87 INTERSECTION

South Abernathy is buzzing with giant dirt moving and packing machines with two projects under way. Tie-in work is being done on U.S. Highway 87 south of the FM 597 overpass as well as work on service streets parallel to the 87 Highway.

Starting last week, reclamation and beautification work is being done on the four bar pit "lakes" at the intersection of US 87 and FM 597. The pit work went to Contractor Roy Lee Garrett on a low bid of \$31,955.30.

The US Highway 87 construction is the north end of a huge project of making the highway 4-lane divided from Abernathy to the overpass south of New Deal.

New Auditorium Planned For Baptist Encampment

Construction of a new auditorium with a seating capacity of 1,000 persons is expected to be completed for the summer camp program this year at Plains Baptist Assembly near Floydada, according to assembly trustees.

Some special features of the \$60,000 auditorium include a kitchenette, small conference rooms, and a year-round heating and cooling system. Building materials will be pre-fabricated steel and brick.

Completion of the structure, will make available a facility for year-round use at the encampment, which serves 180 Southern Baptist churches and

missions in the Lubbock and Caprock Plains areas. In addition to the summer camping program, which attracts some 6,000 persons annually, many state and area denominational conferences and seminars are held at the assembly grounds.

Charlotte Susan Maddox, a student at Wayland Baptist College, is the first entry, according to Charles Woodall, president of the Plainview Jaycees who are sponsoring the Pageant.

Miss Maddox, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Maddox of Miami, Texas, is a member of Delta Chi Delta sorority and has studied piano and voice. She is minoring in music at Wayland.

She was fourth runner-up in the 1965 Wayland Beauty Pageant and was a nominee for both Homecoming Queen and Senior Favorite this year. She has been president of the Treble Tones at WBC and been both a junior and senior senator. As her special talent, she lists piano.

During the week, other celebration plans also moved ahead. The Plainview Chamber of Commerce announced that bumper stickers promoting the 60th Anniversary Celebration and 39th Pioneer Roundup soon would be available. 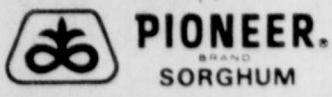

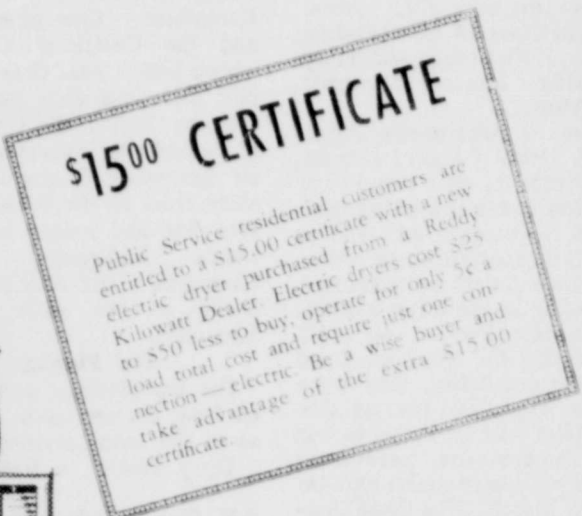

Q. I stopped my social security checks in January of last year because I thought I would earn a lot of money, but I earned less than I thought I would.

How can I get my social security checks for last year?

A. You should file an "Annual Report" with social security by April 17, giving your total earnings and the months you did little or no work, if any. The report form is available at your social security office, 1401-B West 5th St., Plainview, telephone CA3-4371.

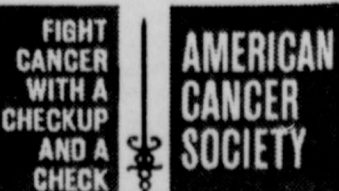

Deadline Nears For Homestead Exemption Filing

April 20 will be the last day for property owners to render their property for taxation and apply for a residence homestead exemption for 1967 at the county tax office.

Under provisions of the Texas Constitution, a property owner may claim up to \$3,000 of the valuation for tax purposes of a residence homestead as an exemption from state and valuation property taxes. The exemption does not apply to county or special water district taxes, according to Russell S. Hardin, county tax assessor-collector.

Applies For Year
The rendition for taxation and the application for the homestead exemption must be made each year by the property owner himself.

This applies to persons who pay their taxes as part of their monthly payments to a loan agency or bank on a mortgage as well as to persons whose property is clear of debt.

"Banks or loan agencies can pay the taxes on a piece of property on which they hold a mortgage and add the taxes to the monthly payments, but they cannot render the property for taxation or make an application for a homestead exemption. Only the owner can do that," Hardin said.

Hardin also pointed out that, if the state maintains its present property tax rate of 47 cents on each \$100 of valuation for 1967, a property owner, by applying for the homestead exemption, can save up to \$14.10 in state taxes on the \$3,000 exemption.

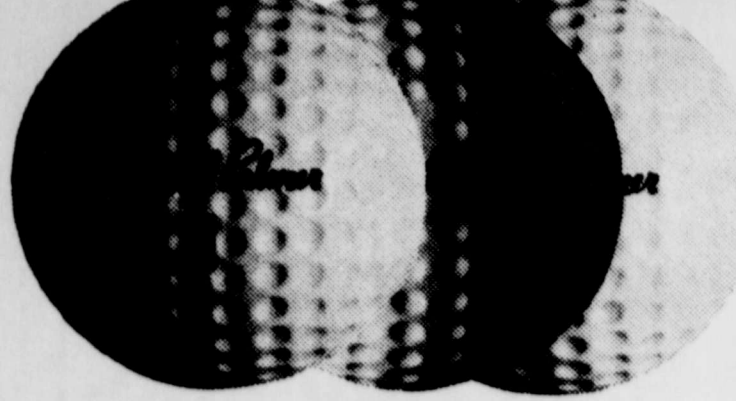

TORNADO Safety Rules

TO KNOW WHAT TO DO WHEN A TORNADO IS APPROACHING MAY MEAN THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN LIFE AND DEATH!

I If you are near a tornado cellar:

When time permits, go to a tornado cellar, cave or underground excavation which should have an air outlet to help equalize the air pressure. It should be kept fit for use, free from water, gas or debris; and preferably equipped with pick and shovel. THERE IS NO UNIVERSAL PROTECTION AGAINST TORNADOES EXCEPT UNDERGROUND EXCAVATIONS.

II If you are in open country:

1. Move at right angles to the tornado's path. Tornadoes usually move ahead at about 25 to 40 miles per hour.
2. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine.

III If in a city or town.

1. Seek inside shelter, preferably in a strongly reinforced building. STAY AWAY FROM WINDOWS!
2. In homes: The corner of the basement toward the tornado usually offers greatest safety, particularly in frame houses. People in houses without basements can sometimes be protected by taking cover under heavy furniture against inside walls. Doors and windows on the sides of the house away from the tornado may be opened to help reduce damage to the building.
3. Standing against the inside wall on a lower floor of an office building offers some protection.

IV If in schools:

1. In city areas: If school building is of strongly reinforced construction, stay inside, away from windows, remain near an inside wall on the lower floors when possible. AVOID AUDITORIUMS AND GYMNASIUMS with large, poorly-supported roofs!
2. In rural schools that do not have strongly reinforced construction, remove children and teachers to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.

V If in factories and industrial plants:

On receiving a tornado warning, a lookout should be posted to keep safety officials advised of the tornado's approach. Advance preparation should be made for moving workers to sections of the plant offering the greatest protection.

VI Keep calm. It will not help to get excited. People have been killed by running out into streets and by turning back into the path of a tornado. Even though a warning is issued, chances of a tornado striking one's home or location are very slight. Tornadoes cover such a small zone, as a rule, that relatively only a few places in a warned area are directly affected. You should know about tornadoes though, "just in case."

VII Keep tuned to your radio or television station for latest tornado advisory information. Do not call the Weather Bureau, except to report a tornado, as your individual request may tie up telephone lines urgently needed to receive special reports or to relay advisories to radio and television stations for dissemination to thousands in the critical area.

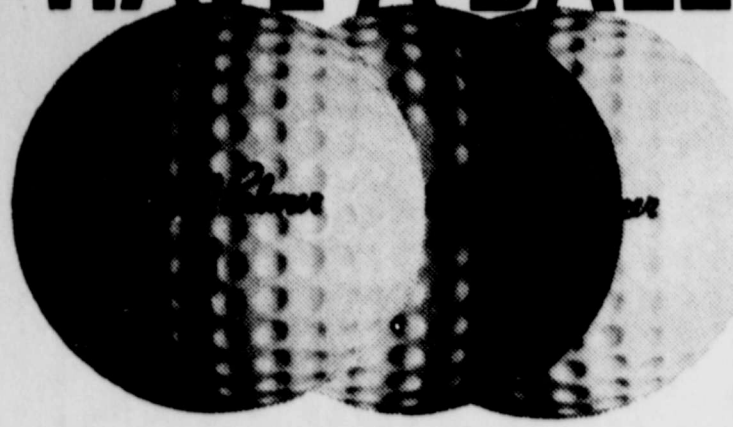

IV If in schools:

1. In city areas: If school building is of strongly reinforced construction, stay inside, away from windows, remain near an inside wall on the lower floors when possible. AVOID AUDITORIUMS AND GYMNASIUMS with large, poorly-supported roofs!
2. In rural schools that do not have strongly reinforced construction, remove children and teachers to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.

V If in factories and industrial plants:

On receiving a tornado warning, a lookout should be posted to keep safety officials advised of the tornado's approach. Advance preparation should be made for moving workers to sections of the plant offering the greatest protection.

VI Keep calm. It will not help to get excited. People have been killed by running out into streets and by turning back into the path of a tornado. Even though a warning is issued, chances of a tornado striking one's home or location are very slight. Tornadoes cover such a small zone, as a rule, that relatively only a few places in a warned area are directly affected. You should know about tornadoes though, "just in case."

VII Keep tuned to your radio or television station for latest tornado advisory information. Do not call the Weather Bureau, except to report a tornado, as your individual request may tie up telephone lines urgently needed to receive special reports or to relay advisories to radio and television stations for dissemination to thousands in the critical area.
