MRS. WEBB INJURED IN WRECK AT N. D.

Mrs. Lindsey Webb, 19, of Abernathy, an employee of Litton Industries of Lubbock, was injured in a three-vehicle crash at New Deal about 7 a. m. Wednesday. Highway patrolmen said she was starting to pass another car, which pulled to the left. The two cars collided and then struck a parked truck, investigators noted. The woman was admitted to Lubbock Osteopathic Hospital where her condition was described as good.

INCREASE IN INTERNATIONAL POSTAGE RATES

An increase in international surface and airmail rates went into effect Monday, May 1, Postmaster Herman Lambert announced.

The new international rates, he said, will not apply to mailings for members of the Armed Forces overseas. Domestic postage rates are applicable to mail addressed through APO's and FPO's.

The rate increases for both surface and airmail—averaging 13%—were first proposed on January 14 and publicly confirmed on March 1. The Department explained at that time that they were needed to help offset a deficit of about \$16 million in international mail operations.

Specific information on the new international rates can be obtained from the service window at the post office, Postmaster Lambert said. This was the first general increase in international rates since July, 1961.

The increases are:
1. Airmail letters to Central America and Caribbean area from 1 1/2¢ a half ounce to 15¢.
2. Airmail to the rest of the Western Hemisphere remains 15¢ a half ounce, except for Canada and Mexico.
3. Airmail to Europe and Mediterranean Africa from 15¢ a half ounce to 20¢.
4. Airmail letter rates to the world remain unchanged at 25¢ a half ounce.

5. Aerogrammes and air post cards increased 2¢ each from 11¢ to 13¢.
6. Items sent by air, other than letters and parcels, such as small packages, books, periodicals and other printed matter increased 10¢ per piece to all countries except Canada.
7. Most letters going by surface transportation to all nations (excluding Canada and Mexico) increased from 11¢ to 13¢. Post cards raised from 7¢ to 8¢.

8. Most printed matter, including publications, increased one cent a piece. For 2nd class publications to Canada only, the one cent increase will be deferred for six months to become effective November 1, 1967. Also, the present bundling rate which permits postage to be computed on the bulk weight of packages of publications addressed to Canadian post offices will remain in effect until November 1, 1968, at which time it will be discontinued.

9. Surface parcel post rates to all nations increased 20¢ a parcel, an average of 7%.

"Postage rates for surface first class letters and air letters and surface 3rd class type printed matter to Canada and Mexico correspond to U.S. Domestic rates, which are set by the Congress, and are not being changed at this time," Postmaster Lambert said.

Wayland Offers High Schoolers College Credit

High School students who have completed their junior year can gain up to 14 hours toward a college degree at Wayland before they finish their senior studies.

Dr. Roy C. McClung, Wayland college president, said the college this summer will initiate the special study program for students who will be classified as high school seniors this fall.

TO BE ELIGIBLE for enrollment, Dr. McClung pointed out, a student must be in the top 25 percent of his junior class and must have approval of parents and his high school principal.

The high school students will take the same courses as college students enrolled in the summer session and may complete a maximum of seven hours in each of the two terms in the summer session. Credits will be awarded the student upon his completion of his high school senior studies.

THE PLAN has the approval of the Texas Association of Colleges, Dr. McClung said. Under the plan which has proved successful in other colleges it would be possible for a student to get off a year's college work before he became of draft age.

The Wayland College summer session will extend from June 5 to Aug. 25, with the first term extending from June 5 to July 15 and the second term starting July 17.

Antelope Band Scores First Division Rating In Corpus Christi Meet

With air-horns blasting and students yelling, the Antelope Band arrived back in town from Corpus Christi near midnight Saturday on three buses, celebrating the First Division Concert award won at the Buccanoe Music Festival. This marks the first honor of this nature won by the Abernathy High School Band at a post-season music contest.

One hundred seventeen students and nine sponsors made up the Abernathy group. Sponsors included: Mr. and Mrs. Curtis Davenport, Mr. and Mrs. Everett Maxwell, Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Adams, Mr. and Mrs. Cliff Martin, and Mrs. Ruth Fulton.

Abernathy was the only Texas band in Class AA to receive the coveted First Division award. On Friday, only two other AA bands, Kirby-

ville and Santa Fe High from Alta Loma, both from southeast Texas, were given an equal rating. Seventy-five bands participated in the festival. Dimmitt, the only other AA Sweepstakes winner in this U. S. region, was rated Second Division.

Selections played were: Ojo De Aguila and The Good Daughter Overture. Judges were Karl Holvik, Iowa State College; Gerald Hemphill, Phillips University, Enid, Oklahoma; and Don McCathren, Duquesne University, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Judging comments were mostly complimentary, but all three judges were critical of the Antelope Band for not playing with greater volume (the Cassium was very "dead" acoustically.) As one judge put it: "You have a beautiful sound generally

well in tune and cleanly done but the sound from the 119 people never really convinces me. It's always so quiet and reserved. With this magnificent assortment of players and instruments it seems to me that the sound can be considerably more exciting. You have nice rhythm and clarity and generally well-conceived musical ideas. Beautiful blend and balance."

Antelope band members can take pride in their year's work and competition in that no judge in any event this school year has rated them below First Division, marching, concert, and sight-reading, and their First Place win in the Fair Parade.

Final program of the year will be the annual spring concert Monday evening, May 15.

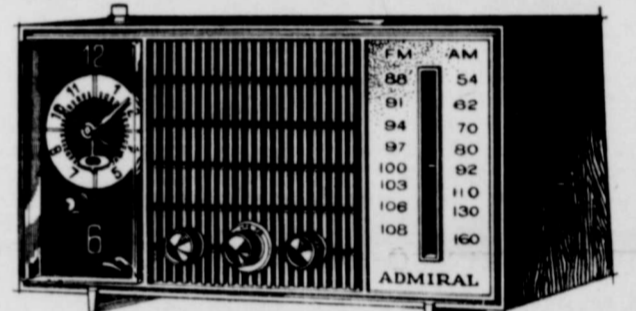

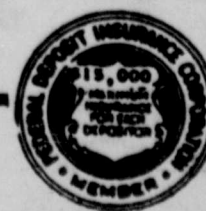
