
AJHS BAND ENTERS DIMMITT CONTEST

Abernathy Soldier Wounded In Vietnam

Abernathy has its third grim reminder that the United States is at war... a local soldier was wounded in Vietman!

Mr. and Mrs. Wayne R. Arthur, 511 First Street, Abernathy, received word from their soldier son, Pfc. Jerry D. Art-hur, that he sustained a stomach wound from a bullet March 31, while returning from pa-trol duty. They received a letter from him concerning the injury, than a telephone call from him. Jerry called from Clark Air Force Base, Manila, in the Philippines. When he called, Jerry did not know whether he would be hospitalized in Manila, sent to a hospital in Japan or be returned to a hospital in the States.

Pfc. Jerry D. Arthur, 20, graduated from AHS in 1965. He entered service August 24, 1966, and received training at Fort Bliss, El Paso, and at Fort Polk, La. He visited here during the 1966 Christmas holidays, and was back for a visit late in January, 1967. He went from here to San Francisco, leaving there Feb. 3, and arriving in

Vietnam Feb. 5. An earlier reminder that we are at war came in March of this year, when another Abernathy soldier was injured when his helicopter was cowned in action in Vietnam. He is SP4 David Fargier, 23, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Freeman. He was sent to a hospital in Japan. Mrs. Freeman reported Monday that they talked to David by telephone Sunday. He reported that he is doing fine and soon may leave the hospital in Japan. He did not know where he would go from Japan.

One Abernathy serviceman has lost his life in Vietnam. Marine Cpl. Stanley Joy was killed in battle action late in 1965, or early 1966, Word of his death was received here inearly January, 1966.
