Representatives of Lubbock County and the cities of Lubbock, Slaton, Shallowater, Idalou, Abernathy and Wolfforth are expected to attend.

The organization, which is a voluntary association of the cities and county with no taxing powers, is expected to become eral-state-local projects ranging from highways to sewage disposal plants.

To Conduct Studies It will conduct studies and make recommendations on future development of the county and the cities within it.


authorities.




