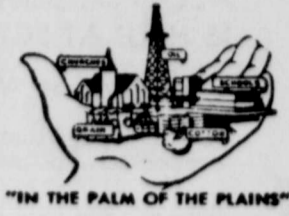


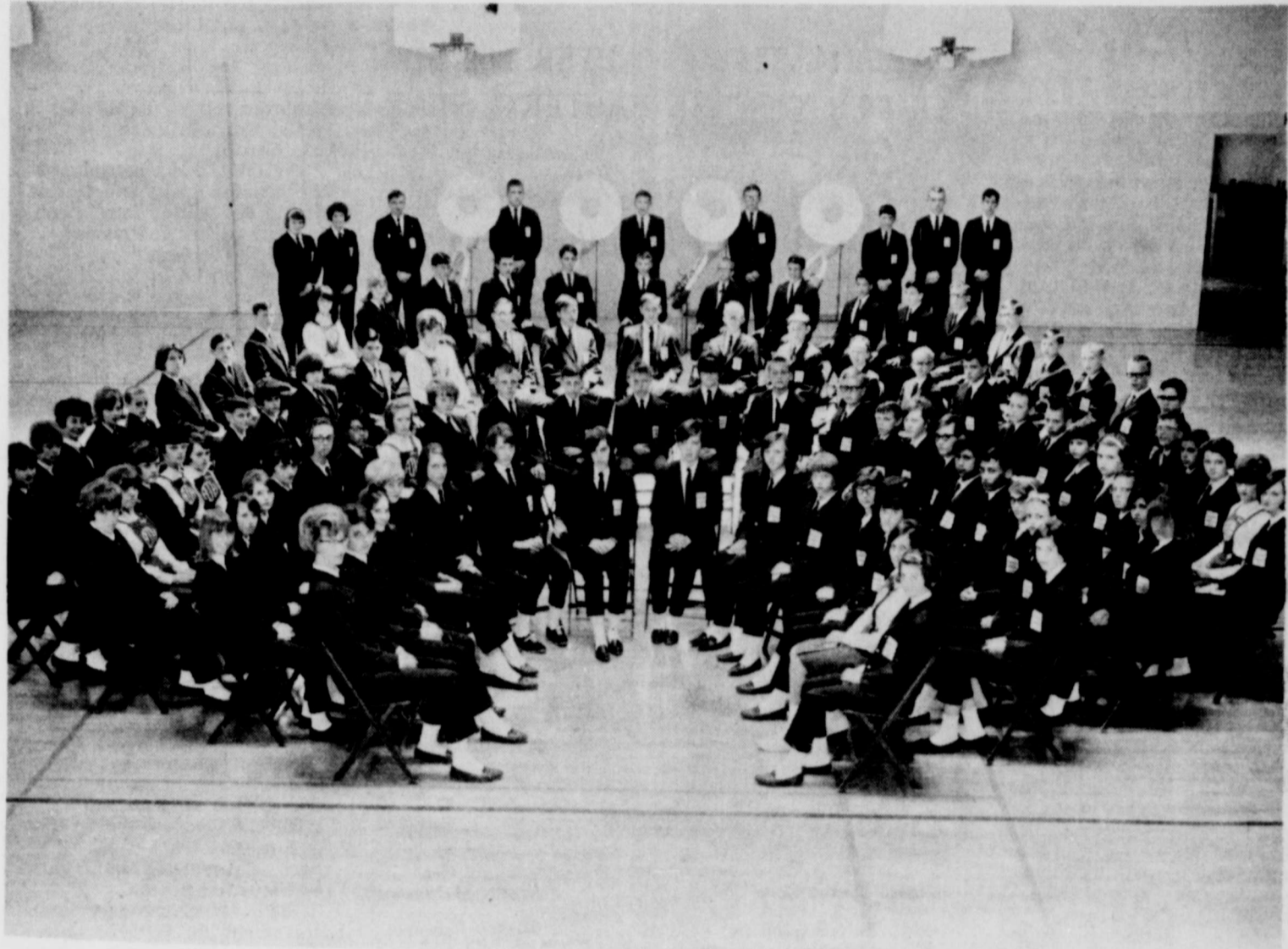

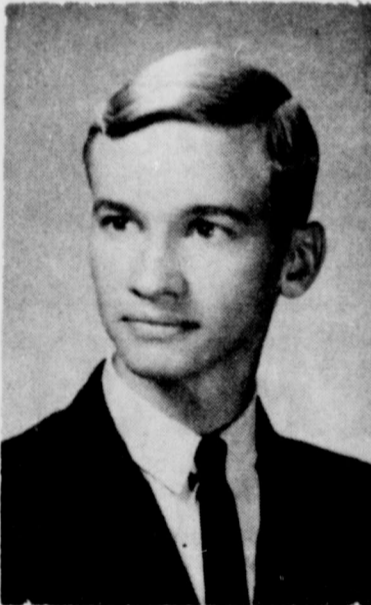

SAIGON, VIETNAM--Samuel J. Williams, former Civil Defense director of Abernathy, Texas, arrived here recently for his American Red Cross assignment as assistant field director.

Williams, who has had a long association with the Boy Scouts of America, is the former district executive of the Boy Scouts in Dallas.

In his new position Williams works closely with U. S. serv-

icemen in this area to help them solve the personal and family problems that develop here and at home during their assignment in Vietnam. Through the world-wide Red Cross emergency communications network, Williams can aid in problem solving by keeping servicemen in close touch with their families in the United States.

Red Cross volunteers and staff are on call 24 hours a day at 3100 chapters located throughout the U. S. to relay messages and information to and from families in the largest city or smallest community.

### GUERRANT HAS SCHOLARSHIP OFFERS

COLLEGE STATION-----William Stephen Guerrant, son of Mr. and Mrs. William E. Guerrant, Box 477, Abernathy, is an Opportunity Award Scholarship winner for 1967-68 at Texas A&M University.

The scholarships, ranging from \$200 to \$800 a year for four years, explained Robert M. Logan, Student Aid director, are awarded on the basis of academic record, test scores, initiative, leadership, character and need for assistance.

Logan said 266 applicants will receive renewable scholarships which total \$350,000 for four years.

Funds are provided for Opportunity Awards by the Association of Former Students of Texas A&M, the University Development Fund, and by interested citizens and organizations. Educational Opportunity funds are provided by the federal government.

Guerrant will receive \$1,600 advanced to him in installments of \$400 per year for four years.

## Council Of Area Towns To Organize

An organizational meeting of the Lubbock Metropolitan Council of Governments has been set for 2 p.m. June 7. It was announced by Lubbock Mayor W. D. Rogers, Jr.

Representatives of Lubbock County and the cities of Lubbock, Slaton, Shallowater, Idalou, Abernathy and Wolforth are expected to attend.

The organization, which is a voluntary association of the cities and county with no taxing powers, is expected to become a vehicle for cooperative federal-state-local projects ranging from highways to sewage disposal plants.

To Conduct Studies It will conduct studies and make recommendations on future development of the county and the cities within it.

It is expected to become an effective instrument for coordinating the growth of the metropolitan area and the towns within, officials have agreed.

By-Laws Ratified Mayor Rogers said that various governments in Lubbock County, city councils of the six cities and the Lubbock County Commissioners' Court, have ratified the bylaws of the council of governments.

By-laws were drafted at a Dec. 12 meeting here.

Formal organization and getting LMCOG into operation will be on the agenda at the next meeting, which will be in the City Hall Training Room.

The electronic machines can compute hundreds of items on thousands of taxpayers returns before you can say "Send me my refund." But the machine can't work on the return until the humans open the mail, check the information on the return, prepare the punch cards, and give the electronic monster a crack at it. Internal Revenue reports excellent progress on sending out refunds, but advises patience.

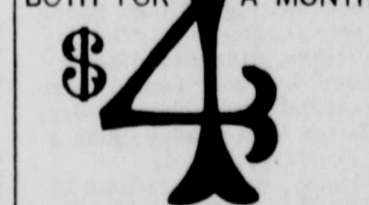

**Two Local Boys To Attend Salvation Army Camp June 4-11**

A swimming pool, gymnasium and a well equipped recreation area is used for supervised sports activities.

The camper will be housed in attractive cabins with a common dining hall where expert cooks and kitchen personnel prepare balanced nutritious meals designed for the needs of growing youngsters.

The camp is operated by the Salvation Army for the benefit of Texas Youth who, without benefit of the Salvation Army, would not have the opportunity to enjoy camp life.

**State 4-H Roundup Set**

Texas has long been famous for its roundups and its 4-H Roundup is no exception. This annual event to be held on the campus of Texas A&M University, June 6-7, is one of the nation's oldest statewide annual 4-H events. Originally, it was a part of the Farmers Short Course.

The number of 4-H members in attendance this year will be down since only the first place winning teams from the 12 Extension districts are eligible to attend. Winners in the State 4-H Food Show will be determined on June 6 and those in 31 other judging and demonstration contests on June 7.

Wheat of Dallas. He added that future plans will be developed to provide greater opportunities for Texas 4-H Club members and their adult leaders.

Wheat said the Foundation has two immediate goals: finding sponsors for eight projects now developed and completing plans for establishing one of the nation's largest endowment funds for the 4-H youth of Texas.

4-H is the youth phase of the educational programs carried on by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, a part of the Texas A&M University System. Local county Extension agents can supply detailed in-

formation on 4-H programs and activities of the Texas 4-H Youth Development Foundation.
