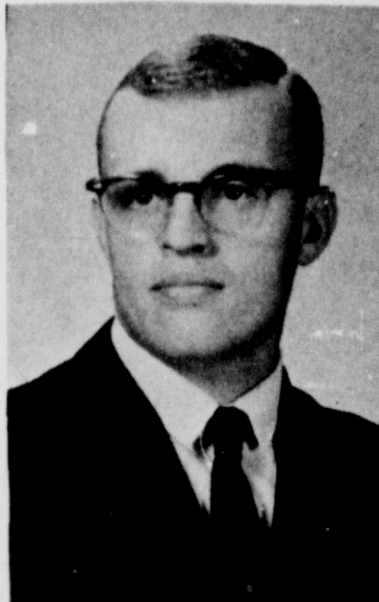

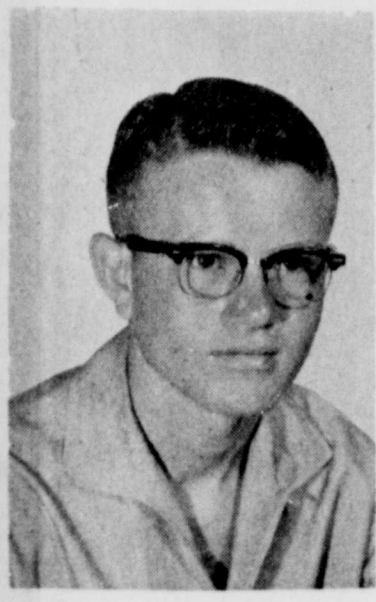

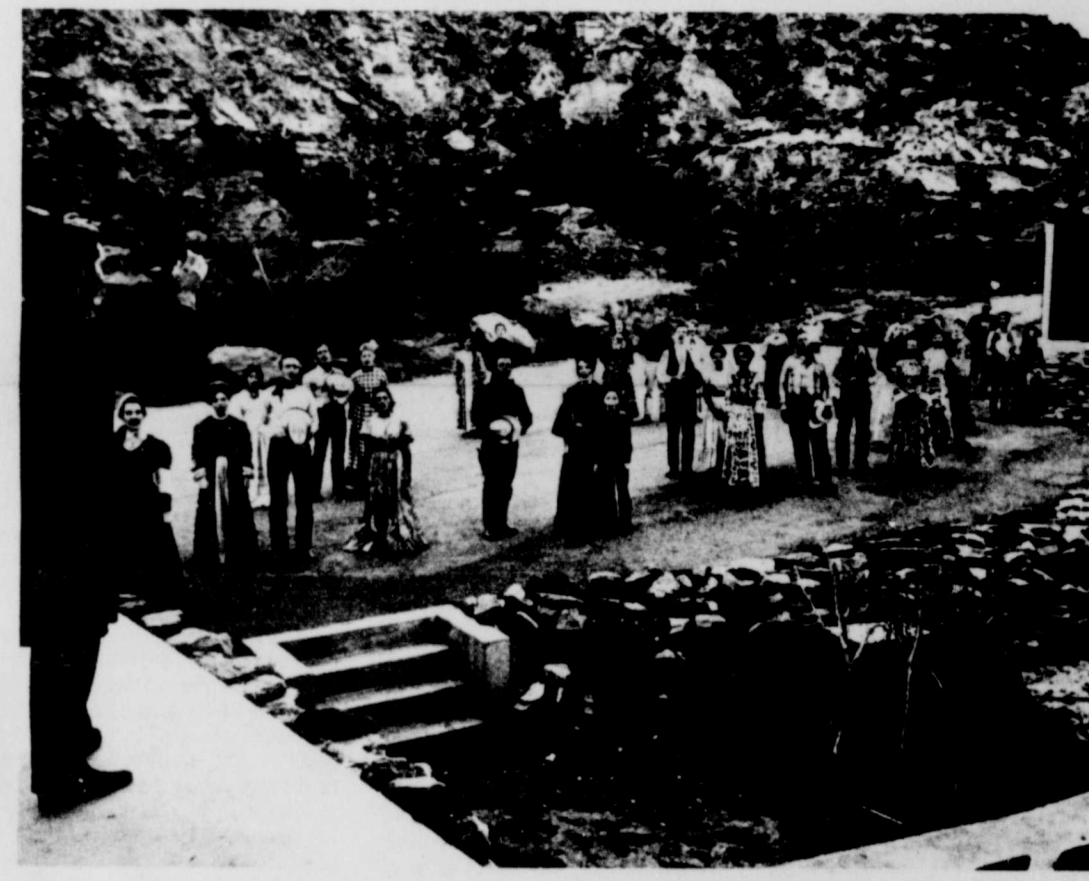
Anyone wishing to make the trip may purchase tickets from Hoppy Toler at Struve Hardware & Dry Goods; from Melvin

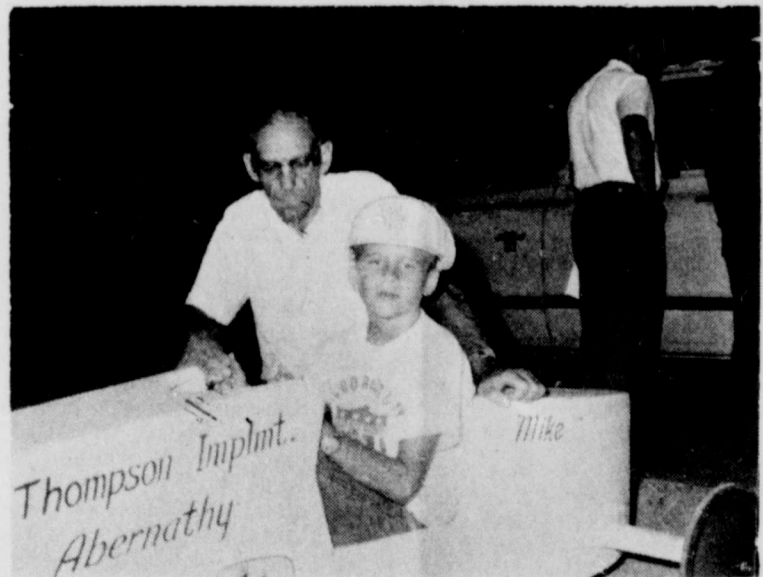
Abernathy's pony team took second place in a marathon, one day, Tri-County Baseball Tournament. It all started Friday night when the ponies, showing their best form, started a game with Cotton Center that was called at the bottom of the second inning because of rain. Catcher Don Snodgrass got things off to a good start his first time up with a home run with one runner on. In the second inning eight of nine batters reached base for Abernathy and short stop Teeter got an in the park home run. The ponies had Cotton Center 7 to 0 when the game was stopped by rain. Saturday it all had to be done again. At 10 o'clock the ponies started a day of baseball that was to end 21 innings and over eight baseball hours later, Cotton Center had come back ready to play a better game of ball than they had on Friday. And they did as they made the ponies fight for 14 innings before losing it to Abernathy 9 to 8. Abernathy scored first in the second with two runs on two hits. They scored one in the third and three in the fifth for a 6 to 3 lead going into the seventh. In the bottom of the seventh with two out and two on DeLeon of Cotton Center set one over the fence to tie it up and put the game in extra innings.

In the ninth Harrison got a home run and Teeter scored on a single by Danny Cuevas. Also in the ninth Cotton Center scored two runs and the game was tied again. After four scoreless innings Abernathy finally won in the 14th inning when Snodgrass and Cannon got on with walks and were brought in by Teeter. All the ponies were hitting the ball well as Huffaker got two singles, Rogers got three singles, Cuevas got two singles and a double, Snodgrass got one single and a triple, Harrison got two singles and a homerun, Teeter had two triples and a hit that scored the winning run. In all Abernathy had 16 hits to 15 for Cotton Center.

It was a long ballgame and the boys were tired but proud of their victory, but, all was not finished for the day as the ponies had to go against Idalou that night after only a few hours rest. Abernathy coaches failed in an attempt to get the ballgame postponed until Monday so their charges could rest. The Idalou coach would not agree to the postponement and it was his decision to make. He made the decision to give his team every advantage he could and fair or not that's baseball.

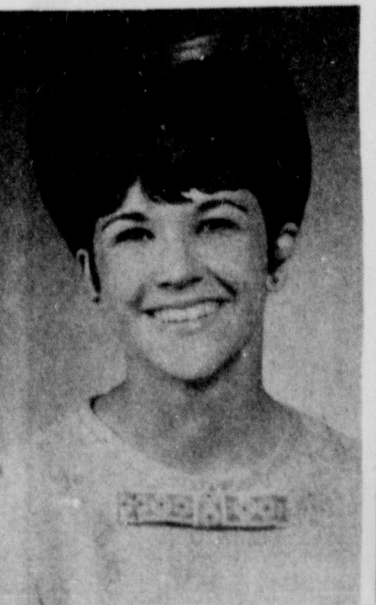
### New Deal Sets Tax Hearings

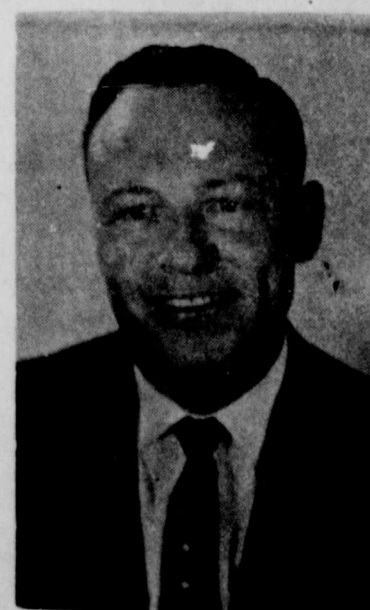

Dear Mother,

It's a lazy day here. Everyone is tired from the first week's work I guess. This is the most wonderful place. The students and faculty here are really great. My main job here is to speak English to the students and get them to speak English. We don't go to the classroom very often but hold class under the trees or taking a hike, or playing volleyball or going fishing, or having coffee and we can talk about anything, so it's really pretty great for me. The students also take art classes in the afternoon—painting, weaving, music, or cinema. They are making a movie in which the students write the story, do the acting, filming, directing, editing, and will even write the background music for it. It is really great to watch them operate. In weaving class they design and make material for their own clothes. Some of it is absolutely beautiful. I am trying to make a Finnish rug but I'm all thumbs, so it is slow.

The country here is so beautiful with lots of pine trees and lakes. One tenth of the whole country is water, so they have plenty. In some ways, it reminds me of East Texas—it is so green and wildflowers are everywhere.

I really enjoyed meeting the Ripatti family that I used to write to. They met me in Helsinki and we had 3 hours together. If none of us knew the proper words we used sign language and got along very well. I will spend two or three days with them before I go home. They have a son in San Francisco now and he came to see me before I left home.

I will be here until July 28 then go to live with a Finnish family for a couple of weeks, then I hope to go to Leningrad, Russia for five days to meet some teachers, visit schools and see the sights, and then spend several days in Helsinki, Sweden and Denmark before flying home. I will be home around September 1 but don't know for sure yet. I want to see as much as possible now because one doesn't have very many opportunities like this. I really get to know the people and live with them, so it is very different from just traveling through a country.

The sun shines for 20 hours a day here and never gets very far below the horizon so it is never really dark. At midnight it is still light enough to read outside and the sun comes up about 2:30. In the winter it's the opposite and they rarely see the sun, so in summer everyone stays outside as much as possible and sleeps very little. The staff gets together at 11:00 or so each night for coffee, or a hike or a swim or just for a talk and these sometimes last to 3:00 a. m. The students are up at all hours. All got up one morning at 4:00 to go fishing and two students were just coming in from a swim and hadn't been to bed yet.

The bath here is called a sauna and it is a delightful institution. You go into a hot room and stay until you almost pass out from the heat, then run and jump in the ice cold lake. Repeat several times, then scrub with a stiff brush and soap and the dead skin comes off in layers. It takes 1 to 2 hours but can last much longer. Your body is so hot you can't feel the cold water. In winter, they run and jump in the snow or chip a hole in the ice and jump in that. After the bath, you drink hot tea and feel like you have just dissolved into the air. It really makes you sleep.

July 11—Today, we all go to Savonlinna, a town about 20 miles away. There is a show of Finnish textiles which I want to see, and old castle, and a musical program to night in which our music teacher sings. It must be a very picturesque city from all I hear about it. The Finns are quite an expert at designing textiles with bright colors and also famous for their glass vases and crystal. But it is very expensive.

I did my washing in the lake yesterday. We have a modern washing machine, but the students wash their clothes in the lake so I do too. It was fun and the water is so soft. The clothes really came clean.

I am pleased to find that the Finns are no different from us. We have a great deal in common and I feel right at home here. They are interested in the same things I am, so we have lots to talk about. And since they study English, German and Swedish for eight years in school, it is easy to talk to almost every young person all teachers.

The students dress and act exactly like my students in Pomona and listen to the same songs. They know all the words in English.

Pass this letter around to everyone. I will get a few cards out, but I'm sure I won't have time for long letters to everyone.

Mrs. H. H. Selke received the following interesting letter from her son, Billy Wayne Selke from Helsinki, Finland. Billy Wayne and his family live in Claremont, California and he teaches in Pomona, California. He went to Finland on the S. S. Ryndam, and taught a group of U. S. Students on the trip over, who were traveling to Russia. He will return by plane September 1st.

Dear Mother,

It's a lazy day here. Everyone is tired from the first week's work I guess. This is the most wonderful place. The students and faculty here are really great. My main job here is to speak English to the students and get them to speak English. We don't go to the classroom very often but hold class under the trees or taking a hike, or playing volleyball or going fishing, or having coffee and we can talk about anything, so it's really pretty great for me. The students also take art classes in the afternoon—painting, weaving, music, or cinema. They are making a movie in which the students write the story, do the acting, filming, directing, editing, and will even write the background music for it. It is really great to watch them operate. In weaving class they design and make material for their own clothes. Some of it is absolutely beautiful. I am trying to make a Finnish rug but I'm all thumbs, so it is slow.

The country here is so beautiful with lots of pine trees and lakes. One tenth of the whole country is water, so they have plenty. In some ways, it reminds me of East Texas—it is so green and wildflowers are everywhere.

I really enjoyed meeting the Ripatti family that I used to write to. They met me in Helsinki and we had 3 hours together. If none of us knew the proper words we used sign language and got along very well. I will spend two or three days with them before I go home. They have a son in San Francisco now and he came to see me before I left home.

I will be here until July 28 then go to live with a Finnish family for a couple of weeks, then I hope to go to Leningrad, Russia, for five days to meet some teachers, visit schools and see the sights, and then spend several days in Helsinki, Sweden and Denmark before flying home. I will be home around September 1 but don't know for sure yet. I want to see and so much as possible now because one doesn't have very many opportunities like this. I really get to know the people and live with them, so it's very different from just traveling through a country.

The sun shines for 20 hours a day here and never gets very far below the horizon so it is never really dark. At midnight it is still light enough to read outside and the sun comes up about 2:30. In the winter it's the opposite and they rarely see the sun, so in summer everyone stays outside as much as possible and sleeps very little. The staff gets together at 1:00 or so each night for coffee, or a hike or a swim or just for a talk and these sometimes last to 3:00 a.m. The students are up at all hours. All got up one morning at 4:00 to go fishing and two students were just coming in from a swim and hadn't been to bed yet.

The bath here is called a sauna and it is a delightful institution. You go into a hot room and stay until you almost pass out from the heat, then run and jump in the ice cold lake. Repeat several times, then scrub with a stiff brush and soap and the dead skin comes off in layers. It takes 1 to 2 hours but can last much longer. Your body is so hot you can't feel the cold water. In winter, they run and jump in the snow or chip a hole in the ice and jump in that. After the bath, you drink hot tea and feel like you have just dissolved into the air. It really makes you sleep.

July 11—Today, we all go to Savonlinna, a town about 20 miles away. There is a show of Finnish textiles which I want to see, and old castle, and a musical program to night in which our music teacher sings. It must be a very picturesque city from all I hear about it. The Finns are quite an expert at designing textiles with bright colors and also famous for their glass vases and crystal. But it is very expensive.

I did my washing in the lake yesterday. We have a modern washing machine, but the students wash their clothes in the lake so I do too. It was fun and the water is so soft. The clothes really came clean.

I am pleased to find that the Finns are no different from us. We have a great deal in common and I feel right at home here. They are interested in the same things I am, so we have lots to talk about. And since they study English, German and Swedish for eight years in school, it is easy to talk to almost every young person all teachers.

The students dress and act exactly like my students in Pomona and listen to the same songs. They know all the words in English.

Pass this letter around to everyone. I will get a few cards out, but I'm sure I won't have time for long letters to everyone.
