





Thirty-five Cents (35¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation; and no county, city (\$100) valuation in any one road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes; provided further that at the time the Commissioners Court meets to levy the annual tax rate for each county it shall levy whatever tax rate may be needed for the four (4) constitutional poses; namely, general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund so long as the Court does not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations and so long as the total of the foregoing tax levies does not exceed Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year. Once the Court has levied the annual tax rate, the same shall remain in force and effect during that taxable year; and the Legislature may also author-

LEGISLATURE OF THE
STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 9,
Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:
"Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed property subject to taxation in free schools, shall never exceed property subject to taxation in such county. Any county may put all tax money collected by the county into one general or town shall levy a tax rate in excess of Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars And the Legislature may pass local laws for the mainte (1) year for general fund, of the public roads and highpermanent improvement fund, ways, without the local notice required for special or local laws. This Section shall not be construed as a limitation of powers delegated to counties, cities or towns by any other Section or Sections of this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:
