REPORT ON CITY COUNCIL MEETING

Highlights of the Regular City Council Meeting held Tuesday, August 15th, at 8:00 p.m. were consideration of a long-term lease with Aberna-Recreation Center, consolidation of insurance policies, designation of auditors, reveiw of a proposed sanitation ordinance that would set standards for garbage pick-up and would increase the collection rate.

Representatives of the Abernathy Recreation Center met with the Council to discuss a long-term lease that is presently being sought by the ARC. The purpose of the proposed long-term lease is that the ARC is presently planning on applying for a Federal loan to make necessary capital improvements on its leased airport land, and one requirement is that the term of the loan and the lease be concurrent. Mayor Jones explained that the Council would take action on the proposal as soon as the Federal Aviation Administration offers

its recommendation. Billy Shipman met with the Council in regard to a proposal of combining all of the insurance policies on the buildings The Abernathy Country Club and automobiles and equip ment into two consolidated ship Golf Tournament, Friday, policies. consolidation. The next item of business was the review of the proposed 1967-68 Budget. In reviewing the Budget, it was explained by the City Manager that the Sanitation Department had been losing over \$3,000 an-nually, and that to balance the Budget additional revenue

would be required.

The Council, after studying proposed garbage collection rates, authorized the City Manager to prepare an ordi-nance for the next Regular Council Meeting, that would set certain standards for garbage collection.

The ordinance, if adopted, would increase the monthly rate for residents from \$1.00

Some Business and Commercial rates will not be increased where it was found that a sufficient rate was already being charged. Others received an average increase of about \$1.00 per month. The ordinance, if adopted, would make the new rates effective on the City utility statements mailed out October

It should be noted that this is the only rate increase in the proposed 1967-68 Budget. Sanitation charges were last increased May 13, 1963. The City property taxes have not increased since 1956, in fact the City tax rate was lowered in 1960 from \$1.40 to the present \$1.38 per hundred dollar valuation. "With the everincreasing cost of supplies, labor and services, the City has been forced to seek additional revenue," stated City Manager Robert Sokoll.

In other action the Council employed Bollinger, Segars and Company to conduct the audit for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1967, tabled a proposal for a street light on North Drive, authorized the City Manager to send \$25.00 to Water Incorporated for a City membership and listened to City Manager Reports on Civil Defense, Financial Statement and the Airport.



PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section in Article III to be known as Section 52e, reading as fol-

"Section 52e. Each county in the State of Texas is hereby authorized to pay all medical expenses, all doctor bills and all hospital bills for Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law en-forcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that while said Sheriff, Deputy Sheriff, Constable, Deputy Constable or other county or pre-cinct law enforcement official hospitalized or incapacitated that the county shall continue to pay his maximum salproviding, however, that said payment of salary shall cease on the expiration of the term of office to which such official was elected or appointed. Provided, however that no provision contained herein shall be construed to amend, modify, repeal or null-ify Article 16, Section 31, of the Constitution of the State

of Texas.' Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November


