# Production Company Sets Musical

## Seeks Musicians, Dancers, Personnel

Approximately 40 people were at the Muleshoe High School auditorium Thursday night for the first public meeting of the

Muleshoe Production Company. Kerry Moore, speech and drama director, from Muleshoe High School, conducted the meeting to explain the purpose of the Muleshoe Production Company, and ask for input on the first production.

Moore said choreographers, singers, musicians, dancers, actors and actresses, stage crews and many others would be needed to have a successful production late in June this year.

He first proposed 'The Music Man,' citing it as a 'fun' production where you can laugh, holler and hoot all night, and have a lot of fun in rehearsals.

Needed for any production will be people three to 100 years old, according to the speech and drama instructor.

He said anyone considering being in a production would need to make a total commitment, as there will be 20-two hour rehearsals, as well as two dress rehearsals.

Between 100-150 community residents will be needed to have a production by and for local and area residents.

Also, Moore explained that any production, especially a musical will not be a 'cheap' show. He explained that the MHS contest play will cost about \$3,000 in order to make it to state competition. This figure does not count travel, room and board. A contest play easily costs \$5,000--\$9,000, he said.

Included in the cost will be the 'royalties' for the play itself, costumes, make-up, props, tickets and programs.

All the cost will not have to be paid 'up front' added Moore. But Cont. Page 6, Col. 3

## TDH Holds New Clinic For Measles

With a case of measles 'popping-up' in Muleshoe at the beginning of last week, a second immunization clinic was conducted Wednesday by the Texas Health Department.

In an emergency clinic on Saturday, March 18, some 28 infants and young people received the immunization against the disease.

At the Wednesday clinic, 120-125 additional inoculations were given.

On Friday, the TDH planned to work immunizations in among their regular schedule at the Health Department office at 306 West Second St.

JoAnne Head, R.N. with the Texas Department of Health said the immunization clinics were prompted locally after a young Lubbock woman, who had been in Muleshoe assisting with a photo fund-raiser was hospitalized with the measles. She was contagious when she was working in Muleshoe on Saturday, March 11, although she had not broken out with the red rash that accompanies measles, said Mrs. Head.

Especially targeted for the immunizations are infants above the age of 15 months, and young people under the age of 33.

## Commissioners Adopt Two Tax Abatement Resolutions

During a special session for the Bailey County Commissioners Court Thursday afternoon, two resolutions were adopted concerning the Muleshoe Area Industrial Foundation (MAIF) request for a tax abatement.

Bailey County Judge Jim Watson explained to the approximately 15 persons present that if the county adopted the abatement, it would be for a period of two years, then laws mandated that it be re-considered.

He said the abatement Guide-

lines and Criteria would be for the enhancement of industry for the county and would be attempting to provide for more employment for local and area people and financial investments to be made in the county.

Judge Watson explained that the tax abatement would apply to some property, which would be considered 'permanent' fixtures, but would not affect personal property, as such property is not abateable.

The guideline adopted by the

county is on a sliding scale, according to the type of investment being considered in Bailey County.

For businesses or industry planning to invest \$75,000 the tax abatement would be 25 percent for two years. For industries planning to invest up to \$12 million, and employee 200 individuals, the abatement could be up to 100 percent for 6-7 years. Any investment above \$12 million would be individually negotiable.

An enforceable clause included in the guidelines would be that if a company does not fulfill their commitment, all taxes would be due and payable, ending the Cont. Page 6, Col. 1

## House Approves Hospital District

Wednesday, the Texas House approved the creation of the Muleshoe Hospital District. This was approved, as well as a hospital district for Lamb County.

Next step is for the bill to be considered in the Senate, where no opposition is expected to stop or hinder passage of the bill.

Once approved by the Senate, the Muleshoe Hospital District Bill comes back to Bailey County for residents within the limits of the district to either vote their approval or disapproval.

If approved locally, the Muleshoe Hospital District will include most of the northern two-thirds of the county, as well as portions of southern Bailey County lying adjacent to this county. It would go to the boundaries of the existing Farwell Hospital District.

After approval by the House, the five temporary directors will be calling for an election on the creation of the district. Before such an election can be held, however, 10 percent of the regis-

tered county voters must sign a petition asking for the election to officially create the Muleshoe Hospital District.

If such a petition, or a vote should fail, petitions cannot be resubmitted for 12 months.

And, after West Plains Medical Center was closed for a year, local and area voters are expected to approve the Hospital District, as that is deemed the only way WPMC can keep its doors open and keep operating.

Although up to 75 cents per \$100 valuation can be levied against property owners, the Hospital District Bill currently in Austin calls for an annual maximum property tax rate of 25 cents.

Rep. Pete Laney, D-Hale Center, presented the Bill in the House, and says "the reason for the legislation is that they are having some real serious problems in rural areas with hospitals."

Sen. Teel Bivins, R-Amarillo, is expected to introduce the bill in the Senate for Muleshoe.

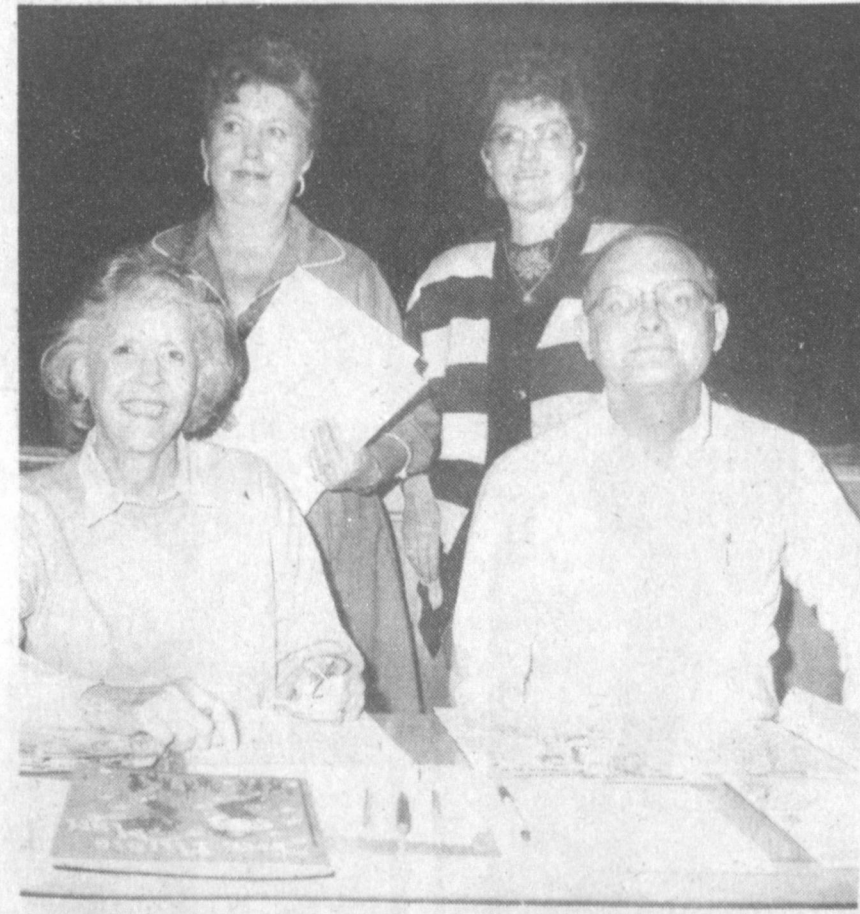
Each of the counties in PCG territory has two directors, one a businessman and the other a cotton producer.

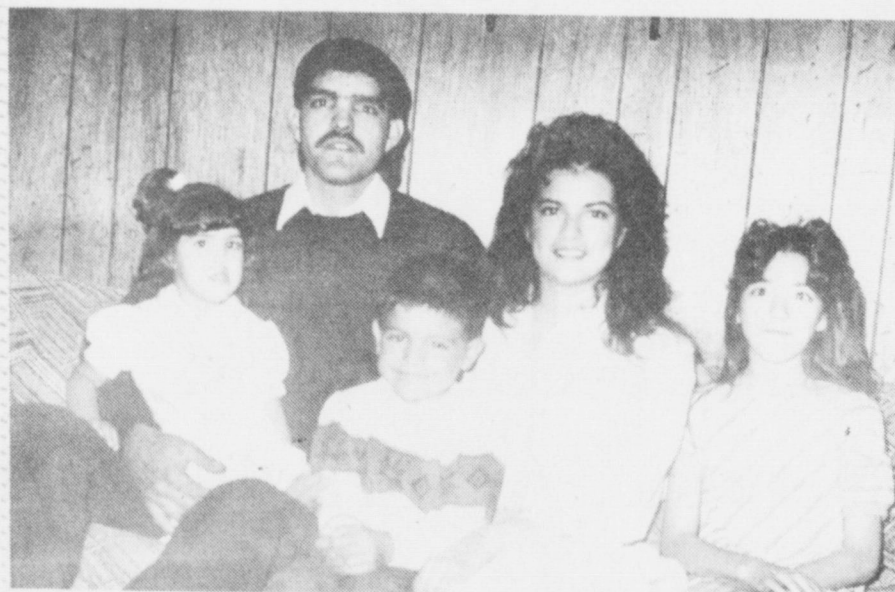

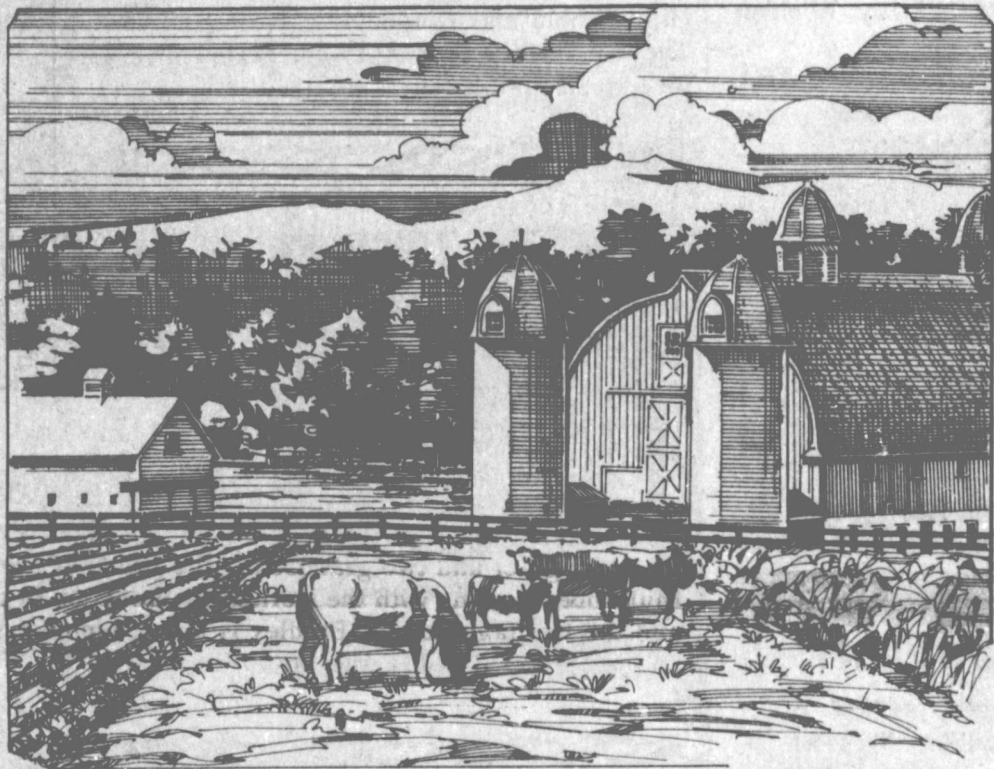

If you received a homestead exemption on your present home in 1988, you won't need to apply again for 1989 unless the chief appraiser requires you to reapply.

However, if you passed your 65th birthday or became disabled before January 1, file a new application to receive the additional exemptions.

If you haven't received an exemption on your present home, or if you've moved to a new home, make a new application for 1989.

**The deadline**

for applications is April 30, 1989. Contact your appraisal district before then if you need more time.

This scholarship is made available through voluntary contributions from Extension Home-maker Clubs, individuals, and other groups in the South Plains District.

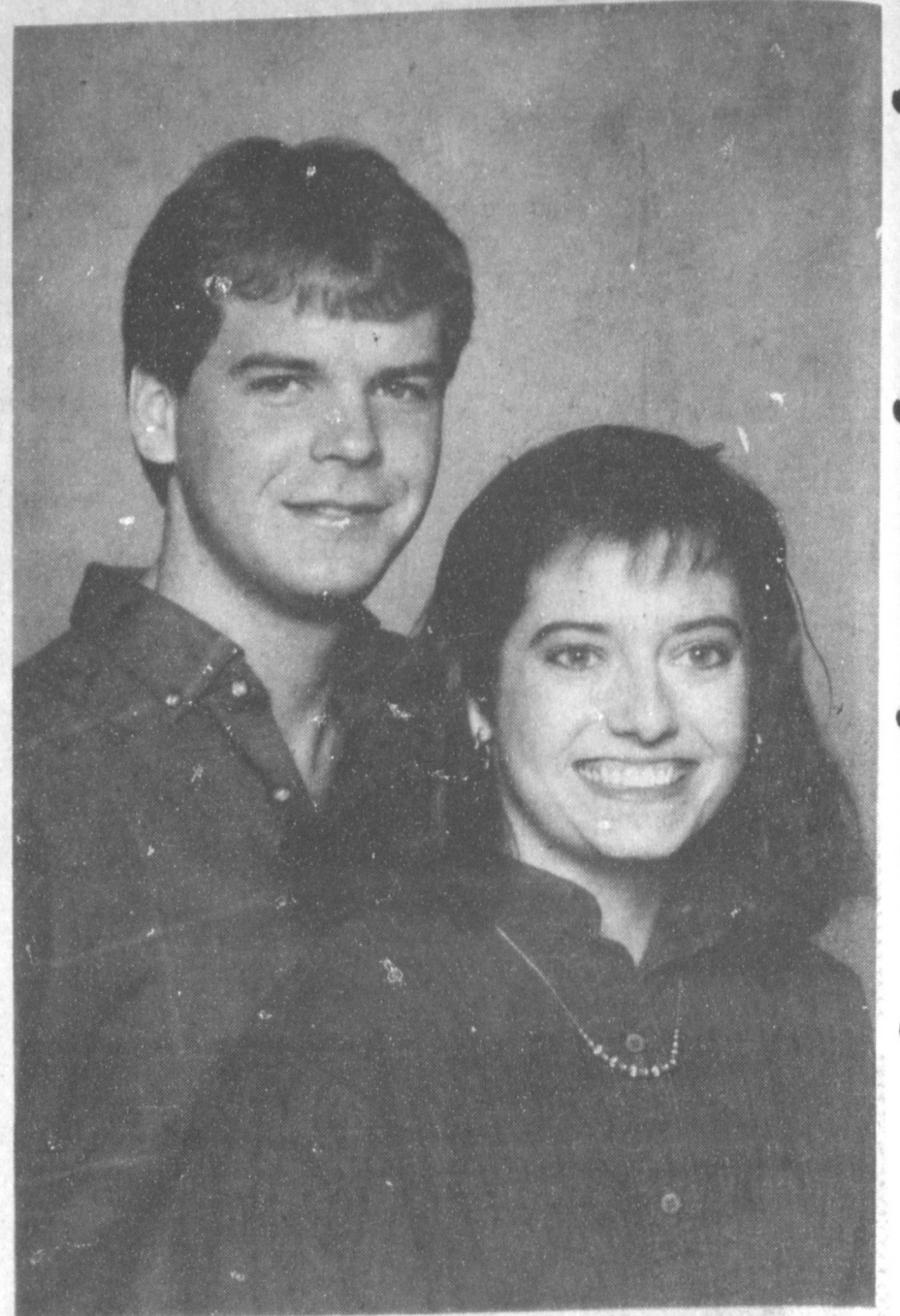

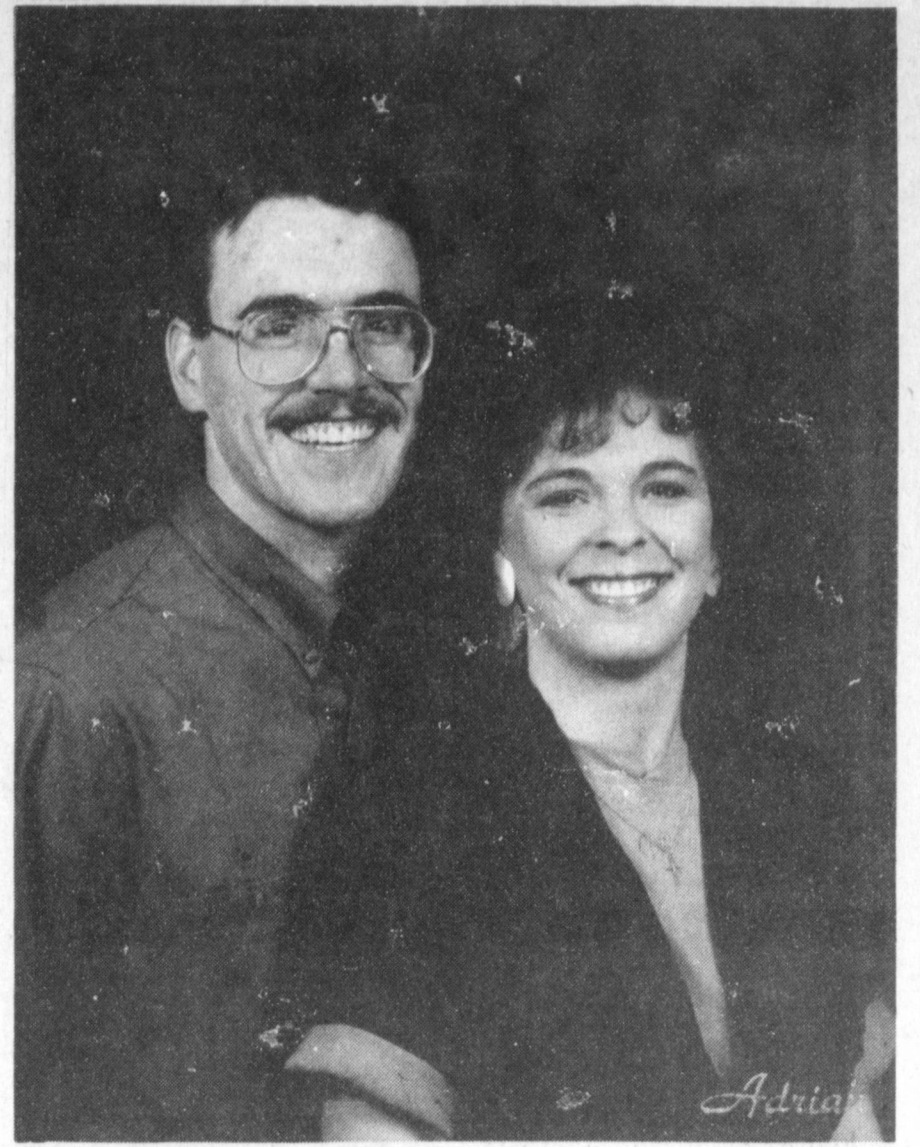

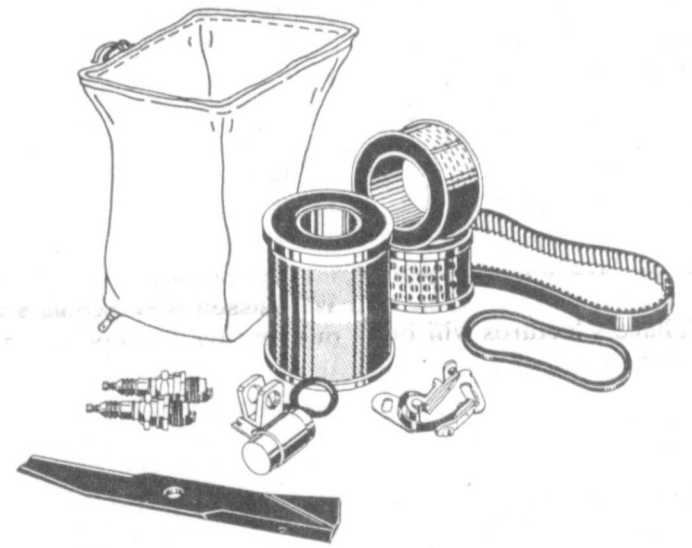

abatement. Judge Watson commented, "A tax abatement sends signals to industry -- 'we want you.'"

"The Muleshoe Industrial Foundation has done a tremendous job to date in helping Muleshoe," added the judge, "We want to do what we can to help their efforts."

The judge said the city is prepared to handle larger businesses and more residents. "We are sure we can handle a lot more stress on water, sewers, schools and other criteria with no problem," added Judge Watson.

It was noted that in a recent survey, fourteen towns were surveyed, and 13 of the fourteen towns, comparable in size to Muleshoe had declined in state sales taxes. Muleshoe was the

only town that had shown increases of the 14 surveyed.

It was reminded that every abatement agreement would be preceded by a public hearing on that particular agreement.

some initial expense will be involved.

While talking about rehearsals he assured that anyone involved will need to make a total commitment. "You can't show up for a practice 30 minutes before showtime, and expect to know what to do," he added. "That would be like showing up 30 minutes before a football game to play; or band members showing up to practice 30 minutes before a show, expecting to put on a concert."

Over 300 rehearsal hours are involved in a contest play, he added. The high school youths who appear in contest plays, or help with the play, know what is expected of them, and make the commitment to do the necessary work.

Where 32 minimum rehearsals are scheduled for the contest play, the Muleshoe Production Company's presentation is slated for 22 total rehearsals.

Moore also said that at least 1,000 advance tickets would need to be sold before the play or production could be held. Anything less than 1,000 tickets, and it would be bankrupt before it could ever be staged, he added.

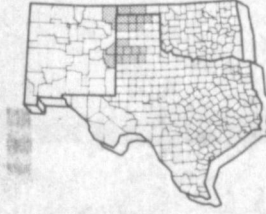

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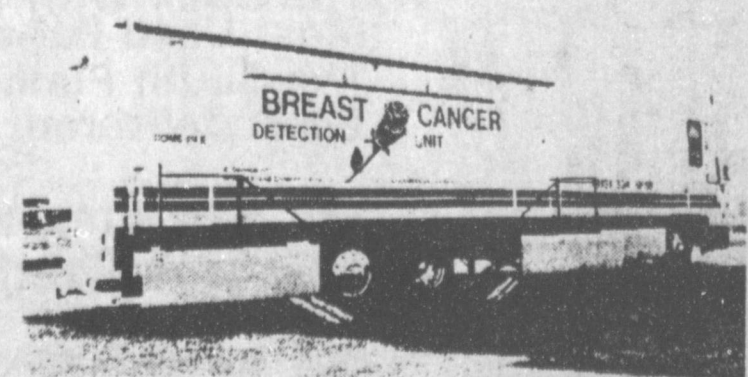

### Teachers Back Pay Raise In Legislature

In a collaborative effort, the Association of Texas Professional Educators, Texas Classroom Teachers Association, and Texas Federation of Teachers -- representing a majority of teachers in Texas -- have jointly developed and announced support for the salary enhancement bill that is to be filed by state Representative Gregory Luna (D-San Antonio).

The bill would set the beginning annual salary level for

Texas teachers at \$18,500 a year, and would set the annual salary for teachers with 30 years of experience at \$40,900. In addition, the bill would provide a minimum salary level of \$29,900 for teachers with at least 11 years of experience. Currently, the minimum teacher's salary in Texas is \$15,200.

Texas teachers have not had a significant salary increase funded by the state of Texas

since 1984. We certainly feel that this salary schedule approaches the true need which most state leaders, as well as most education leaders, have recognized," said ATPE State President Patty Ruth.

"It also demonstrates that the teacher groups can, indeed, work together on some key issues in order to benefit the profession. Where we (the teacher groups) are different, we are truly different, but where we have like concerns, we can certainly come together."

TCTA President Susan Crocker stated that "a majority of Texans are willing to support higher salaries, presumably because they recognize that teachers are primarily responsible for assuring that their children receive a quality education.

"It is critical that we recognize the skills of career teachers, and this proposal will assure that there is continued career potential for experienced teachers without leaving the classroom," Crocker said.

John Cole, TFT President, said, "We made a small advance toward the national average in teacher salaries as a result of H.B. 72, but because the state has done nothing for teacher salaries since, we are slipping down the scale. Something must be done immediately to correct this downward trend if Texas is to attract and keep the best teachers."

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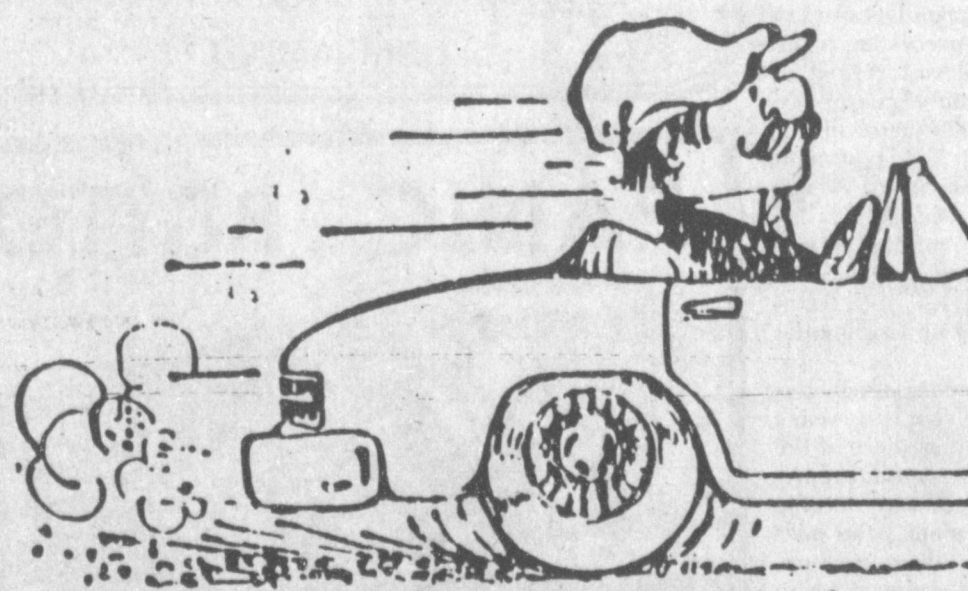
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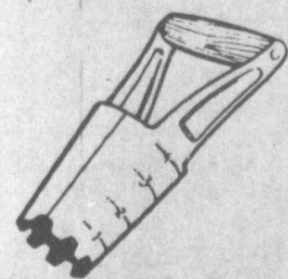
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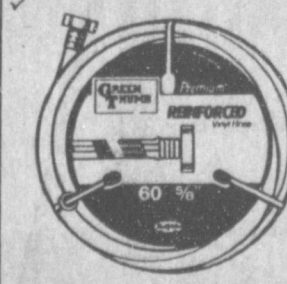

**Texas A&M engineers provide free energy audits to small Texas industries**

**COLLEGE STATION** — A team of Texas A&M University mechanical engineers that last year saved 30 small Texas industries an average of \$18,000 through free energy audits is offering the service again this year to companies across much of the state. The program also gives Texas A&M students first-hand experience while still in school.

"We can help small and medium-sized manufacturers save energy and dollars," explains Dr. Warren Heffington, head of the Energy Analysis and Diagnostic Center at Texas A&M. The program is sponsored by the U.S. Department of Energy and managed by the University City Science Center in Philadelphia. The energy analyses are performed at no cost to the manufacturers.

"We will do 30 audits this year," Heffington said. "Last year we studied a wide range of industries including a manufactured housing factory, an agricultural chemical manufacturer, a foundry and a meat-processing plant. We identified annual cost savings of about \$550,000 and annual energy savings equivalent to 39,000 barrels of oil."

Plants interested in a no-cost audit must have gross annual sales of \$50 million or less, annual energy bills between \$30,000 and \$1.5 million, employ not more than 500 persons and have no in-house energy expertise. The Texas A&M team will travel up to 150 miles from campus.

Heffington said participating companies are asked to supply a year's worth of utility bills in advance of the team's visit, at which a company representative will spend one day showing the team through the plant. After making observations and taking measurements, the team looks at energy use in the plant by studying such things as flow rates, combustion efficiencies and environmental temperatures.

"We then compute energy use rates and savings from various projects such as waste-heat recovery, boiler tune-ups, insulation, electrical demand control and lighting replacement," he said.

A mechanical engineer and number of students make up each team. Interested manufacturers should contact Heffington at (409) 845-5019.
