Holds Local Y F Title

Jerry Oswalt Is Area One Outstanding Young Farmer

Jerry Oswalt, young Abernathy farmer, was chosen as the Outstanding Young Farmer of Area 1 at the Area 1 Convention held in Tulla Saturday, Sept. 9.

Jerry had been selected by the Abernathy Young Farmer Chapter earlier as the Outstanding Young Farmer of the Abernathy area. This is the second year in a row that he has won the award of the Abernathy Chapter, and he was first runner-up in Area 1 last year.

A plaque and their choice of a major appliance was awarded the winner by Southwestern Public Service Company.

Jerry will compete with winners from the nine areas for the Outstanding Young Farmer of Texas in Austin January 11-13, 1967.

Oswalt is married to the former Claudia Shipman. They have three children, Debora 7, Jeff 5 and Lori age 4.

Jerry, who farms 720 acres north and east of Abernathy, is a very successful farmer and has achieved this success through the use of modern farming techniques. His crops include cotton, milo, wheat, cane, beef buidler and rye. He is also engaged in livestock farming and owns registered Hampshire breeding swine.

Jerry is the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. Doyle Oswalt who farm north of Abernathy. A 1958 graduate of AHS, Jerry was farming 80 acres for himself his senior year in high school. He was also assisting his father with his farming operation. Since that time Jerry has branched out and is at present farming 720 acres.

Jerry is very active in community affairs and is interested in working with young people. He has served as song leader for the Church of Christ for the past 11 years, served as deacon, Sunday School teacher and has taught a training class.

For the past four years he has served in the Members Service Committee for the South Plains Electric Cooperative; has been assistant General Supt., Secretary-Treasurer, Barn Supt., and Finance Chairman for the Abernathy 4-H Club-FFA Project show for the last 6 years. He holds the FFA Honorary Chapter Farmer Degree presented to him for outstanding service contributed for the FFA.

As a Young Farmer member he has been very active, and is a charter member of the Abernathy Y. F. Chapter, has served as president, secretary, Chairman of Community Service and Chairman of the Educational Committee. Jerry has been secretary of the Area 1 Young Farmers, and was president of that organization for the past year. He has been a voting delegate to three area conventions and five State Y. F. Conventions and has assisted in the organization of other chapters in the area.

Other winners of the 1967 Area 1 Young Farmers Awards announced are:

Bob Veigel of Hereford was second place winner in the Star Young Farmer division. He received a plaque and a \$50 bond. Third place winner was Tom Garrison of Tulla.

Other applicants were Jerry Bertram of Lockney, Monty Boozer of Dimmitt and Quinn Fitzgerald of Silverton.

Frenship Young Farmer Chapter was named outstanding Young Farmer Chapter and received a trophy from Texas Association of Young Farmers, \$75 presented by Electric Utilities Co. of Texas and a plaque from Southwestern Public Service Co.

Abernathy Chapter won second place and received \$50 from Electric Utilities Co. Third place winner was Tulla.

Other chapters entered in the contest were Dimmitt, Silverton and Anton.

Hale Survey Scheduled

Funds have been appropriated for a survey of water and sewer systems in Hale Center, Frenship, Abernathy, Edmonson and possible other Hale County municipalities.

The Farmers Home Administration appropriated \$9,030 for the survey which is to be completed before the end of 1968, said Don Jennings, FHA supervisor for Hale County.

The survey will determine what improvements and expansion may be needed. The results, if any, will be the basis for application for federal funds to carry out the projects, officials said.

Application for the survey grant was made by a commission appointed by the Hale County Commissioners Court in July 1966. On the commission are County Judge C. L. Abernathy, chairman; Irvin Cole, Petersburg; Ben Merrill, Edmonson; Roy Jones, Abernathy; Gerald Lee, Hale Center; Preston Walker, Otton; Ft. Plainview, and John Page, South Ward Community.

The commission contracted Ralph Douglass, a consulting engineer from Muleshoe, to compile the report, when and if the grant was made available.

The report to be prepared by Douglass will be divided into three main parts — a report, and a comprehensive water and sewer plan.

The preliminary report will include a brief summary of present county population, including a comparison with past years, the size of families, average ages, and projections on population.

Also included will be a general summary of the town's financial and economic conditions, and a short history of the area as a whole.

Existing public utilities will be summarized, along with their resources and permanency of supply. Natural resources will also be discussed.

Agricultural production land patterns and trends will be included in the preliminary report in their connections with future water and sewer needs for the county.

Water resources, including the quality and quantity, also will be included in the preliminary report, and recommendations for necessary further studies for development of news sources which will be needed will also be added to the report.

FILM TO BE SHOWN AT BAPTIST CHURCH

On November 24, 1964, the attention of the entire world was drawn to the name of Paul Carlson, who in the last weeks of his life became a twentieth century symbol of courage and dedication.

A 53-minute color film of the Paul Carlson story will be shown at First Baptist Church, Sunday evening, September 17 at 5:30 p. m.

Paul Carlson spent years in becoming an outstanding surgeon, sacrifice and devotion to medicine had prepared him not only for a service to his fellow man, but also for a life of economic security. But at an early age, Dr. Carlson gave his life in trying to meet the spiritual needs of the people of the Congo.

That Paul Carlson's death had a tragic dimension is an inescapable fact. Having endured many weeks of imprisonment, and having lived under the threat of death much of that time, he was only moments away from safety when a bullet ended his life on a Stanleyville street even as Belgian paratroopers, engaged in a giant rescue operation, filled the sky overhead.

Through the words of family, friends, colleagues, and a United States Government Official, we are able to see Dr. Carlson as husband, father, and brother; as co-workers, student, and friend; but more than these, we see him as Churchman, witness, and martyr; a man whose life marked him as one upon whom the entire world's respect and admiration was focused.

The resounding Abernathy Antelopes, capitalizing on several Frenship miscues, routed the Tigers by a score of 50 to 6 here Friday night, September 8, in the first game of the season for both clubs.

Abernathy's offense proved very capable of moving the ball on the first drive of the game, matching all the way from their own thirty-nine yardline for an Antelope touchdown. Fullback James Byers dove through the line from three yards out to place the first six points on the scoreboard, and quarterback Burl Fuller swept right end for two more points on the conversion attempt.

Guard Johnny Lutrick intercepted a wild Tiger pass near midfield and with the help of alert Abernathy defensive crew rambled all the way to the Frenship eight yard line to set up the Antelopes' second touchdown. Byers again barreled through the line from six yards out for the score. Fuller's attempted extra point kick went for naught thus ending the first quarter with a score of 14 to 0.

Frenship's ensuing drive was one in which Abernathy penalties proved beneficial. Halfback Johnny Carrizales ended the Frenship drive on the first play from scrimmage during the second quarter with a three-yard draw. Wadell Smith's running effort for extras failed.

Abernathy's first second-quarter touchdown, culminating a lengthy drive set up by a Tiger fumble on the Abernathy twenty-one yard line, came on a thirty-six yard jaunt by Darrell Selke. Fuller's kick was high and true adding an extra point to the Abernathy total.

Byers, emerging for his third time of the night as the Antelope pushing the pigskin across the double stripe, recorded Abernathy's final TD of the half. Fuller's making good on his conversion kick and the trapping of a misstepping Tiger in the end zone gave the Antelopes a 30-to-6 halftime lead.

Shortly after a thirty-yard pass from quarterback Fuller to Billy Elkins, Selke rolled across the goal line for the lone third quarter score. Fuller's kick was good giving the Lopes a 37 to 6 advantage going into the final quarter.

Early in the fourth period Abernathy brought down another Frenship pass on their own thirty-seven yard line. Fuller fired a pass to Selke who accounted for the remaining sixty yards and an Antelope TD. The try-for-extras was good with Fuller again propelling the ball through the uprights.

Abernathy's final TD was directed all the way from the Abernathy thirty-three yard line by Jerry Fuller, younger brother and understudy to Burl Fuller. Following a twenty-eight yard scamper by Mack Rogers and a twenty-yard pass to Selke, Jerry, who was in a fourth-and-three situation, lobbed an eight yard pass to Ronald Harley rounding out the victory. Burl Fuller's kick went wide leaving the score to 50 to 6.

SAINT ISIDORE CHURCH TO HAVE EXTENSION SOCIETY VOLUNTEERS

The Field Day, featuring guided tours of the research farm plots, research facilities, and farm equipment exhibits, annually attracts 2,000 to 5,000 visitors and last year's special guest speaker Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman boosted attendance to an estimated 9,000 persons.
More Equipment
Dr. Tom Longnecker, Foundation director, said farm equipment exhibit area this year has been expanded to feature more and varied equipment than ever before.
A new feature of this year's Field Day includes agriculture commodity displays featuring wheat and small grain exhibits, castor and soybean exhibits.
These displays will be located in the seed production laboratory in the west wing of the shop and technicians office building. They will feature the latest information on these crops and future programs under study at the Foundation.
Field tours will be conducted throughout the farm from 1:30 p.m. until 4:30 p.m. Hale County Agent Ollie Limer, County Associate Agent Roy McClung and Lee Dent, Hale Center Chamber of Commerce manager, will serve as dispatchers for the tours.
Research scientists will present information at several stops along the tour and each plot will be numbered to correspond with a number in the Field Tour booklet which contains information on all farm plots.
Featured on the tour will be discussions on row spacing, fertilizer placement, weed control, crop variety performance, a breeding nursery under high fertility conditions and various effects of temperature and possible methods of control.
Evening Program
Concluding Field Day activities will be the evening program scheduled to begin at 5 p.m.
Rep. Ralph Wayne will be master of ceremonies.
Following the guest speaker, the automobile drawing will be conducted.
Special guests expected for the Field Day activities include Hon. George Mahon of Lubbock, Congressman Bob Price of Pampa and State Rep. Bill Clayton of Sprnglake.
Dr. Longnecker said, "We feel the efforts of the High Plains Research Foundation, with knowledge gained from other agricultural research organizations in the area are important to our future economy. We are proud to have this opportunity to show the accomplishments that public contributions have made possible."

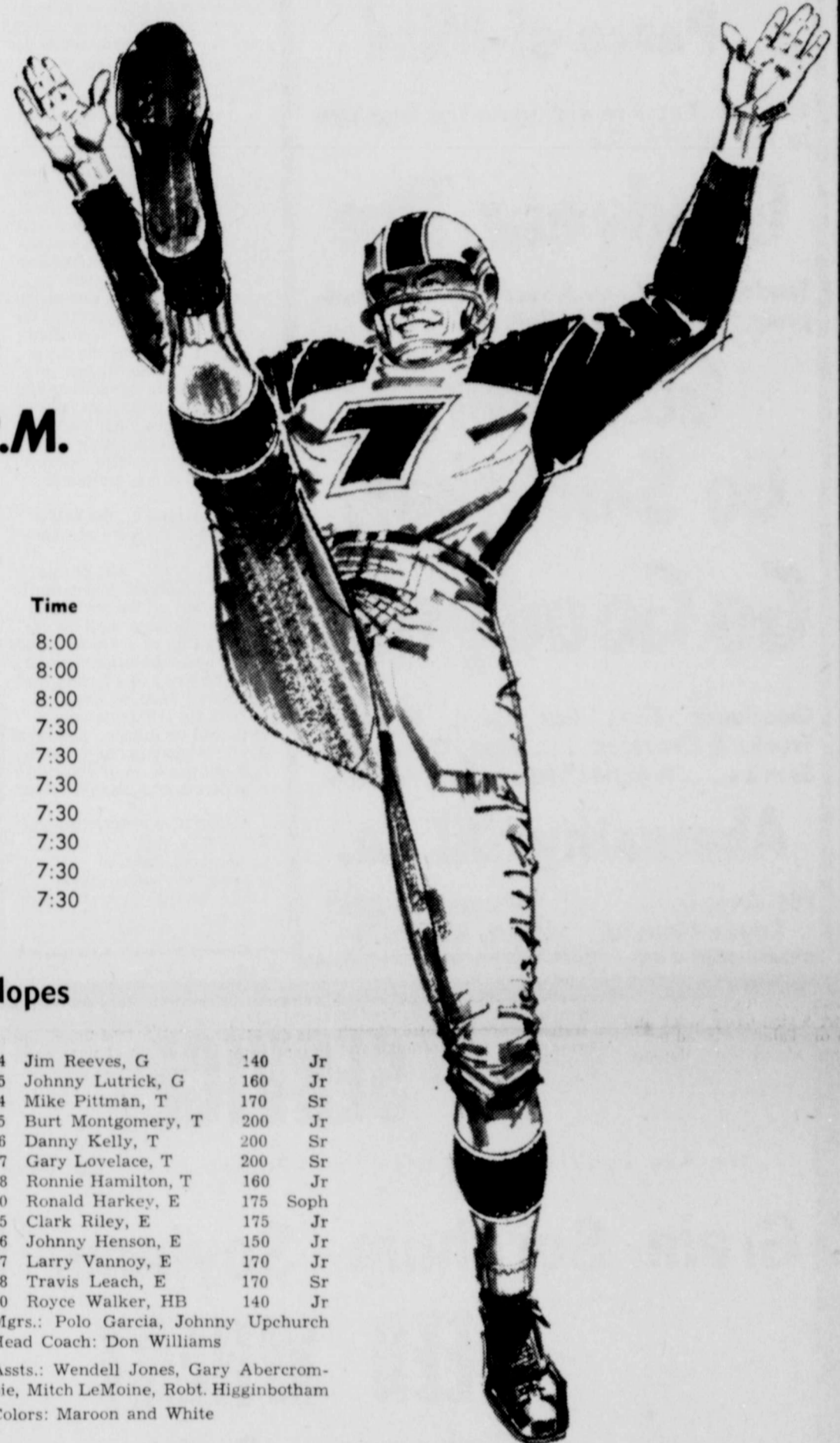

PUBLIC NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 156
An ordinance for the preservation of the health, sanitation and safety of the public; defining garbage and trash; providing for the collection, removal and disposal of garbage and trash within the City of Abernathy, Texas; Requiring owners, occupants, tenants or lessees of residences of buildings to provide containers and receptacles; providing defective containers shall be condemned after notice; specifying that containers and receptacles shall be placed in convenient locations; providing for the removal of garbage and trash and fixing schedules of reasonable charges to be made therefor; providing for removal of building construction waste; regulating individuals who haul their own garbage and the vehicle used for such purpose; prohibiting dumping within the city; prohibiting placing of dead animals in garbage containers and on streets and alleys; providing the method of collection of charges for sanitation services; providing for suspension of all City utility services for non-payment of specified charges; providing the superintendent of sanitation to make periodic inspections and enforce the provisions hereof; providing a savings clause; and fixing a penalty for the violation of this ordinance.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Abernathy, Texas:
Section 15. Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$200.00 for such offense for failure to comply with said ordinance, and each day's failure to comply with said ordinance shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.
