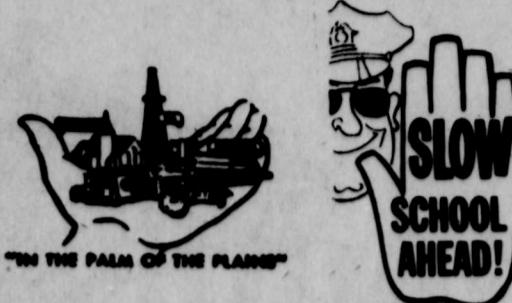

### THIS WEEK Area AA Squads Begin Loop Action

Before the season started, District 3-AA coaches pointed the finger at Olton, with Memphis challenging for the title and Friona labeled the darkhorse.

Now, over a month and three games later, that's the way it still looks. But looks, being deceptive, don't count. What do count are the district games which begin Friday night.

It's the same in the other South Plains Class AA district, as six of its seven members hit the championship trail. Only 'AA' team in either league without a conference game this week will be Stanton as it hosts McCamey of 6-AA.

Olton, Friona and Abernathy show spotless records while Memphis, last year's bi-district representative, sporting a 2-0-1 mark. The Cyclones swept into Childress last Friday and swept away with a 28-0 victory as Gary Rex scored a pair of last half touchdowns.

Abernathy is the surprise with an unblemished mark; the Antelopes had been picked for seventh in the league.

This week Olton hosts Friona in the top game of the four in 3-AA.

And in 4-AA, the only two teams above the .500 mark, Slaton and Denver City, clash at Slaton. Each possesses 2-1 a mark but reached that level by opposite means last week.

Slaton came into its game with Crosbyton as unbeaten but the Class A came up with a touchdown in the final quarter, then turned it over to tackle Joe Freeman for the winning placement with less than two minutes to play.

And Denver City pulled to its second victory by nudging Levelland 13-8 on Robert Kizer's 1-yard scoring effort in the final quarter.

Abernathy, led by quarterback Burl Fuller, posted its third victory without a loss, as 36-8; Fuller scored three, once it clipped Morton of 4-AA by an 80-yard keeper, for 20

### Beat Morton 36-6

Picking up close to 100 yards on touchdown efforts alone, speedy Antelope quarterback Burl Fuller paced a strong Abernathy attack which dropped the Morton Indians by a score of 36 to 6 here last Friday night, September 22, in the Antelopes' final non-conference bout of the season.

Fuller, running touchdowns of ten, seven, and 80 yards, kicking two conversion attempts, and carrying the pigskin on another conversion, scored every point posted in the second, third, and fourth stanzas of the game for a total of 22 points to his credit.

In addition to his scoring jaunts, Fuller also toted the ball 56 yards to the Morton nine yard line on Abernathy's first play of the game, returned a Morton punt for 30 yards, and picked up short yardage on several other plays.

A 30-yard pass from Fuller to Darrell Selke on a fourth-and-twenty-five situation climaxed the Antelopes' first drive and placed the first six points on the scoreboard. Fullback Ja-

### District Judge Joy Will Seek Appeals Post

James A. Joy of Plainview will be a candidate for Judge of the 7th Court of Civil Appeals. Joy, 64th District Court Judge since 1961, announced Saturday he would seek the bench serving the 46-county Texas Panhandle region.

Joy, 50, practiced law in San Antonio before moving with his family to Abernathy, in 1959. At Abernathy he practiced law, served as city attorney and later city judge before being appointed Hale County Judge in 1961 when the incumbent resigned.

He served in that post six months until appointed by then Gov. Price Daniel to finish an unexpired term as 64th District Judge. He was elected to a full term in a contested race in 1962, and in 1966 without opposition to his second regular term.

### First Bale Grown In County Listed Near Petersburg

PETERSBURG — Vernon Smith, who farms between Lakeview and Petersburg, is believed to have produced the first bale of Hale County cotton to be ginned this year.

The bale was harvested from two and a half acres Thursday and yielded 2,300 pounds of seed cotton with 615 pounds lint and 910 pounds seed.

It was the largest first bale grown in the county since Sept. 9, 1946, when a 631-pound bale was produced by E. B. Stanley of near Cotton Center.

The cotton was ginned by the Lakeview Gin Co. A bale of Lubbock County cotton was ginned in Petersburg last Thursday.

For the first bale ginned by the Lakeview Gin, the gin wrapped the bale free and paid 50 cents per pound for the lint and \$100 per ton for the seed.

The cotton was planted April 30 following a pre-watering. The cotton was watered every other row once during the growing season.

The first Floyd County Cotton was ginned two days earlier than last year on Sept. 13. It was grown by J. T. and Gary

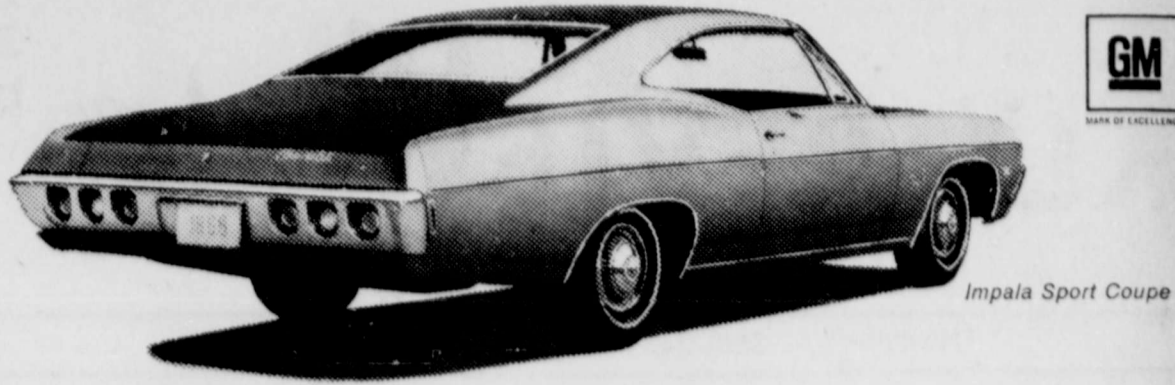

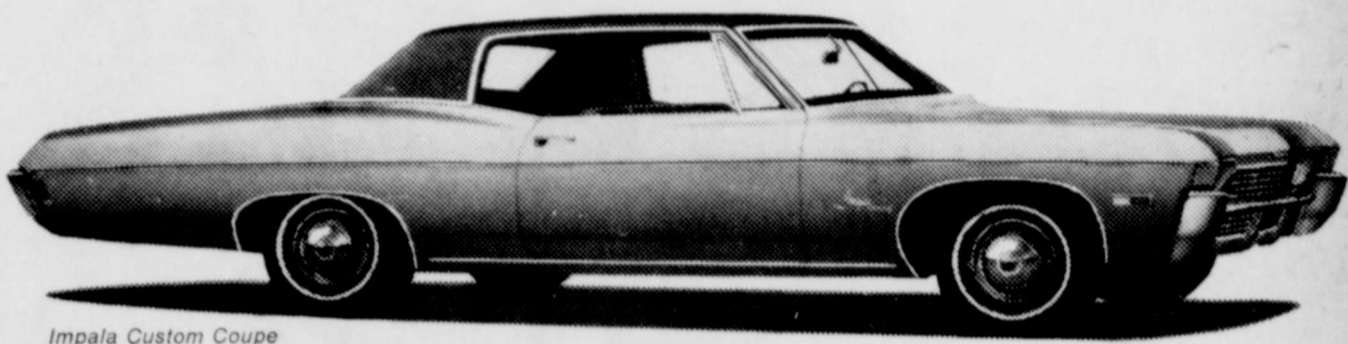

CAMP PENDELTON, Calif. (FHTNC) Aug. 21--Marine Private Shelby L. Smith, son of Mr. and Mrs. I. L. Smith of New Deal, completed two weeks of training under simulated combat conditions in the fundamentals of day and night patrolling, employment of infantry weapons, survival methods and assault tactics at this Marine Corps base.

This individual combat training is given every Marine after his graduation from recruit training. Taught by combat experienced non-commissioned officers of the infantry training regiment here, it prepares the young Leatherneck to become part of the Marine air-ground combat team.

While in the field he was taught how to use hand grenades, a compass and the principles of map reading and land navigation. He learned how to detect and disarm mines and booby traps and, while being exposed to live machine gun fire, he learned to advance safely from one point to another.

From this course, he is scheduled to go on to more advanced training before being assigned to his permanent unit.

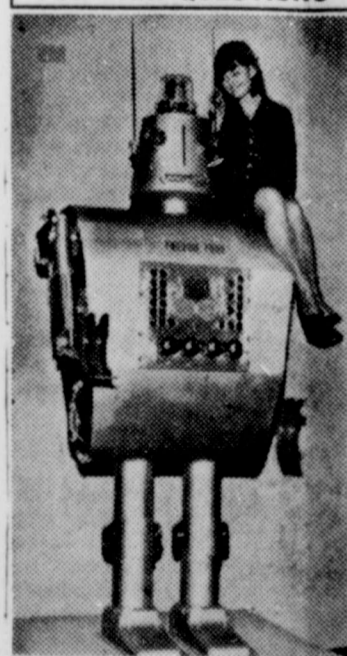

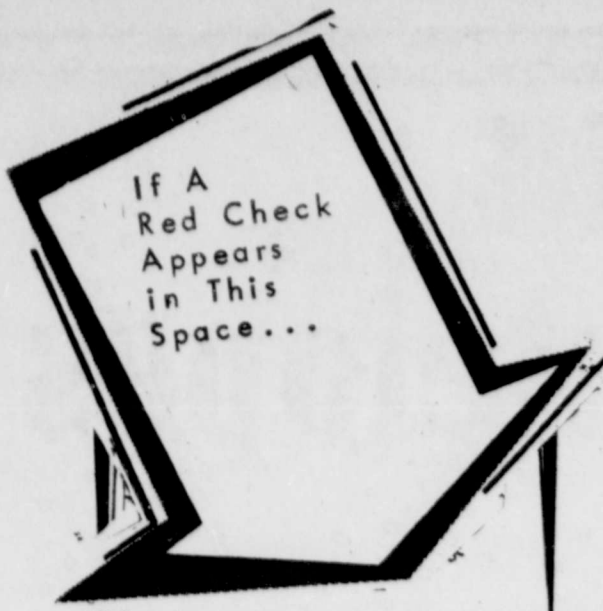

### Grain Sorghum Prospects High, Agent Reports

Hale County and High Plains area sorghum crops hold the best prospects for a "good crop" as seen here in several years, Hale County Agent Ollie Linder said today.

Good yields and bumper crops are expected from the sorghum harvest despite an early season threat of midge infestations and the present menace of spider mites.

Linder said that for the most part Hale County has suffered only slight midge damage. However late blooming milo should be checked closely for midge damage.

The spider mite infestations in most Hale County fields are light but some fields need spraying, Linder stated.

Linder credited farmers' fast action in spraying infested fields last month for the light population of mites.

He said mite infestations were decreasing in fields where good showers had been received.

"These spiders will not hurt sorghum yields where grain has 50 per cent or less moisture," Linder said. He warned heavy infestations of the sap-sucking insects could weaken plant stems and the sorghum could fall before harvesting.

## First Bale Grown In County Listed Near Petersburg

PETERSBURG — Vernon Smith, who farms between Lakeview and Petersburg, is believed to have produced the first bale of Hale County cotton to be ginned this year.

The bale was harvested from two and a half acres Thursday and yielded 2,300 pounds of seed cotton with 615 pounds lint and 910 pounds seed.

The cotton was planted April 30 following a pre-watering. The cotton was watered every other row once during the growing season.

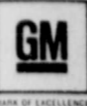

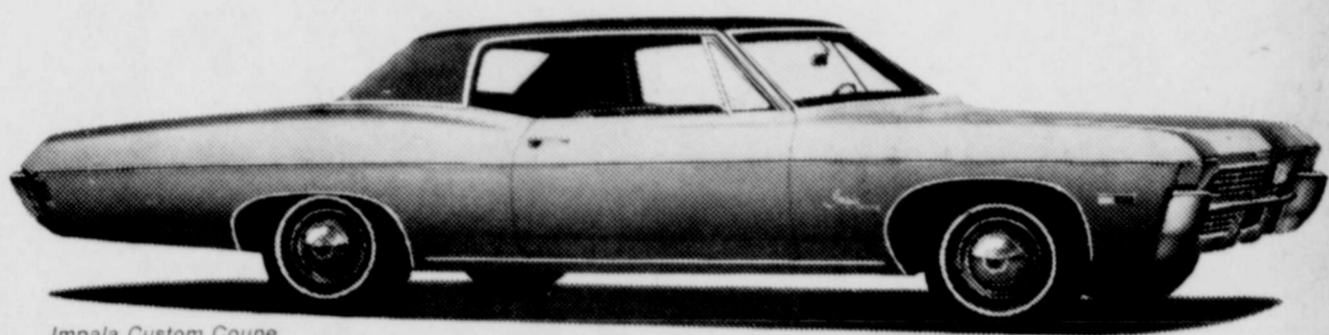

**CAMP PENDELTON, Calif.** (FHTNC) Aug. 21--Marine Private Shelby L. Smith, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. L. Smith of New Deal, completed two weeks of training under simulated combat conditions in the fundamentals of day and night patrolling, employment of infantry weapons, survival methods and assault tactics at this Marine Corps base.

This individual combat training is given every Marine after his graduation from recruit training. Taught by combat experienced non-commissioned officers of the infantry training regiment here, it prepares the young Leatherneck to become part of the Marine air-ground combat team.

While in the field he was taught how to use hand grenades, a compass and the principles of map reading and land navigation. He learned how to detect and disarm mines and booby traps and, while being exposed to live machine gun fire, he learned to advance safely from one point to another.

From this course, he is scheduled to go on to more advanced training before being assigned to his permanent unit.

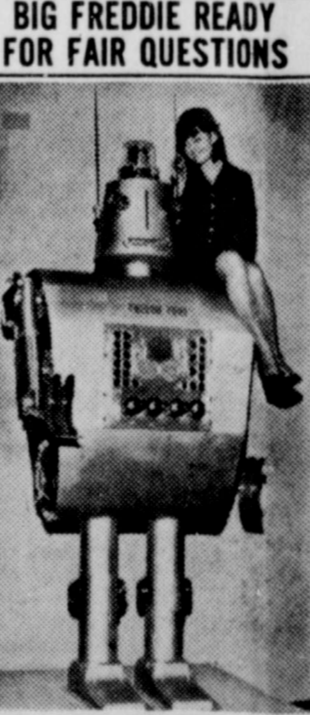

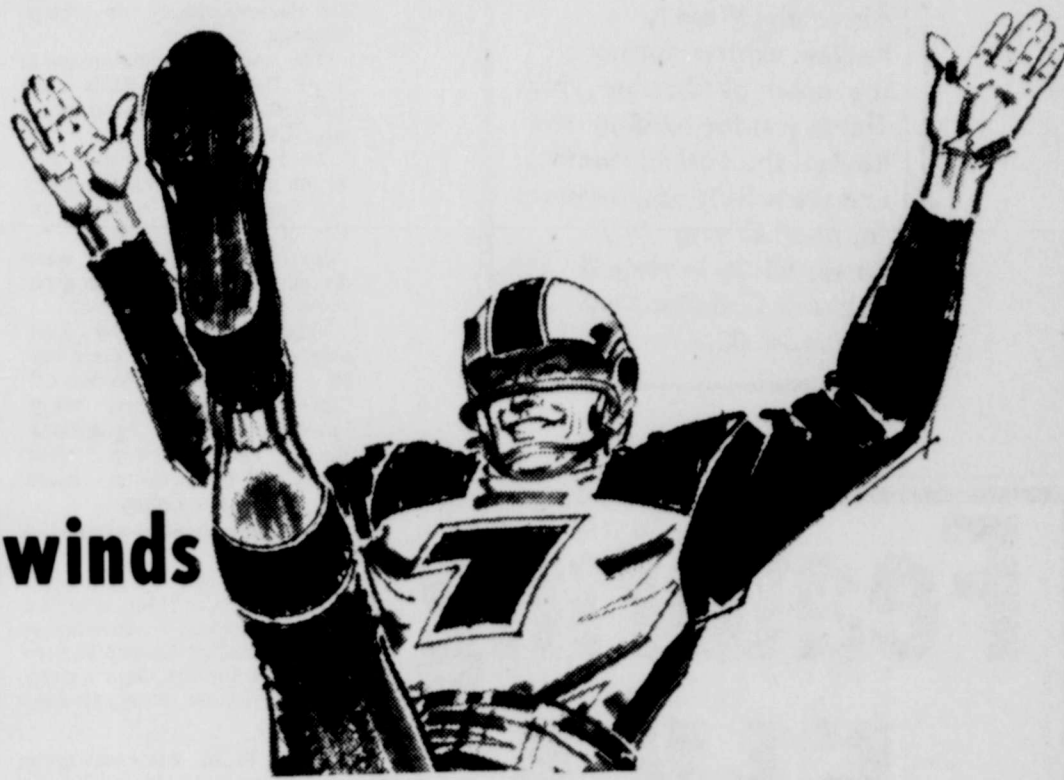

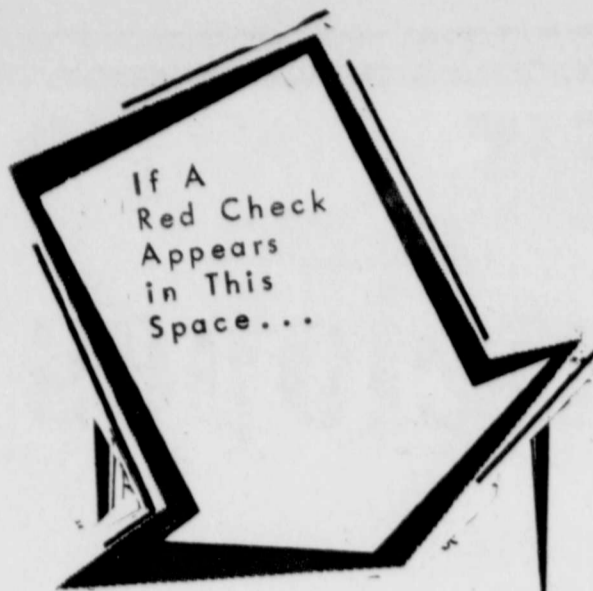

**Grain Sorghum Prospects High, Agent Reports**

Hale County and High Plains area sorghum crops hold the best prospects for a "good crop" as seen here in several years, Hale County Agent Ollie Linder said today.

Good yields and bumper crops are expected from the sorghum harvest despite an early season threat of midge infestations and the present menace of spider mites.

Linder said that for the most part Hale County has suffered only slight midge damage. However late blooming milo should be checked closely for midge damage.

The spider mite infestations in most Hale County fields are light but some fields need spraying, Linder stated.

Linder credited farmers' fast action in spraying infested fields last month for the light population of mites.

He said midge infestations were decreasing in fields where good showers had been received.

"These spiders will not hurt sorghum yields where grain has 50 per cent or less moisture," Linder said. He warned heavy infestations of the sap-sucking insects could weaken plant stems and the sorghum could fall before harvesting.
