School Correspondent Picking up close to 100 yards on touchdown efforts alone, sp-eedy Antelope quarterback Burl Fuller paced a strong Abernathy attack which dropped the Morton Indians by a score of 36 to 6 here last Friday night, September 22, in the Antelopes' final non-conference bout of the season.

Fuller, running touchdowns of ten, seven, and 80 yards, kicking two conversion attempts, and carrying the pigskin on another conversion, scored every point posted in the second. third, and fourth stanzas of the game for a total of 22 points to his credit.

In addition to his scoring jaunts, Fuller also toted the ball 56 yards to the Morton nine yard line on Abernathy's first play of the game, returned a Morton punt for 30 yards, and picked up short yardage on several other plays.

First Bale Grown In County Listed **Near Petersburg**

PETERSBURG - Vernon Smith, who farms between Lakeview and Petersburg, is believed to have produced the first bale of Hale County cotton to be ginned this year.

The bale was harvested from two and a half acres Thursday and yielded 2,300 pounds of seed cotton with 615 pounds lint and 910 pounds seed.

It was the largest first bale grown in the county Sept. 9, 1946, when a pound bale was produced by E. B. Stanley of near Cotton Cen-

The cotton was ginned by the Lakeview Gin Co. A bale of Lubbock County cotton was gin-ned in Petersburg last Thurs-For the first bale ginned by

the Lakeview Gin, the gin wrapped the bale free and paid 50 cents per pound for the lint and \$100 per ton for the seed. The cotton was planted April 30 following a pre-watering. The cotton was watered every other





Hale County and High Plains area sorghum crops hold the best prospects for a "good as seen here in several years, Hale County Agent Ollie

Liner said today.

If ad is not paid on first billing, a 25¢ charge will be added for sorghum harvest despite an re-billing, Card of Thanks \$1) early season threat of midge infestations and the present menace of spider mites.

Liner said that for the most part Hale County has suffered only slight midge damage. However late blooming milo should be checked closely for midge damage.

The spider mite infestations in most Hale County fields are light but some fields need spraying, Liner stated.

Liner credited farmers' fast action in spraying infested fields last month for the light population of mites. He said mice infestations were

decreasing in fields where good showers had been received. "These spiders will not hurt sorghum yields where grain has 50 per cent or less moisture," Liner said. He warned heavy infestations of the sap-sucking insects could weaken plant stems and the sorghum fall before harvesting.





Grain Sorghum Prospects High, **Agent Reports**

Hale County and High Plains area sorghum crops hold the best prospects for a "good

sorghum harvest despite an re-billing. Card of Thanks \$1) early season threat of midge infestations and the present menace of spider mites.

Liner said that for the most part Hale County has suffered only slight midge damage. However late blooming milo should be checked closely for midge damage.

The spider mite infestations in most Hale County fields are light but some fields need spraying, Liner stated.

Liner credited farmers' fast action in spraying infested fields last month for the light population of mites. He said mice infestations were

decreasing in fields where good showers had been received. "These spiders will not hurt sorghum yields where grain has per cent or less moisture," Liner said. He warned heavy infestations of the sap-sucking insects could weaken stems and the sorghum fall before barvesting.
