CITY STUDIES SWPS RATE INCREASE BID

The City Council of Abernathy, Texas, met in regular session in the City Hall Monday, October 9, 1967, at 8:00 p.m. Those present were Mayor Roy Jones; Aldermen Joe Chambers, Royce Henson, Ralph Wolf, Lee Echols and L.G. Deering.
The first item on the age-

nda was the consideration of the proposed rate increase by Southwestern Public Service. Melvin Rape, local manager for the electric company, met with the Council to explain the rate increase. After discussing the matter for some Councilman Deering moved and Councilman Chambers seconded that the rate increase proposal be tabled. The motion carried.

It was the feeling of the Council that more time and study should be given this rate proposal before any action would be taken. The City Manager was instructed to check on the rates being charged in other cities, compare the Franchise Tax being paid other cities and study the affect the rate increase would have on both residential and commercial electrical cust-

Mayor Jones opened the sealed bids on the new truck and the dump body and hoist. The bids on the truck were as follows: Scotty's Automotive \$3,000.00, Reid Chevrolet \$2,998.50 and Abernathy Motor Company \$3, 189. 51. Bids on the dump body and hoist which allowed a trade -in on the City's present dump body and hoist were: Hobbs Trailers \$774.00 and King Trailer & Equipment

Afterstudying and discussing the bids, the Council tabled the truck bids and decided to check into purcha-sing a used truck. The Council accepted the King Trailer bid on the dump body and hoist, on the condition that a used truck is purcha-

In other action the Council passed on a motion that would grant Glenn McKinney a release from General Telephone Company to receive telephone services from Southwestern Bell Telephone Company. The Council also passed ordinances that granted Pioneer Natural Gas Company a twenty-year franchise and increased the franchise tax being paid the City from 2% to 3%. The final business was reports submitted by Robert Sokoll, City Manager.



County's Share In Health Unit **Budget Slashed**

PLAINVIEW (Special- The Hale County Commissioners Court in a special session reduced the county's share of the Plainview - Hale County Health Unit from \$22,850 to \$15,370. Reduction of the county's contribution to the unit has been mulled over for more than a year, officials said.

The commissioners went on record as favoring transfer of the reduced contribution to the health unit on condition that a part-time director's salary not exceed \$7,500. Dr. Carl Weidenbach, full-time director draws \$15,000 annually, paid equally by the city and county. No action had been taken on the part of the city in regard to its con-

The health unit had asked for a total budget from the city and county of \$45,740 during the 1967-68 year. However, Dr. Weidenbach said at a health board meeting with the city and county governing bodies that the budget for the previous year had been \$45,000 but the unit actually had spent only \$34,006.

Child Welfare Budget Cut Dr. Weidenbach said at the time that he expected expenses to run about the same during the coming year.

another reduction to the 1968 budget for Hale County, commissioners lowered the Child Welfare department's budget from \$18,000 to \$13,500. Another item of interest to both city and county residents which came up at the meeting was a fire service contract






