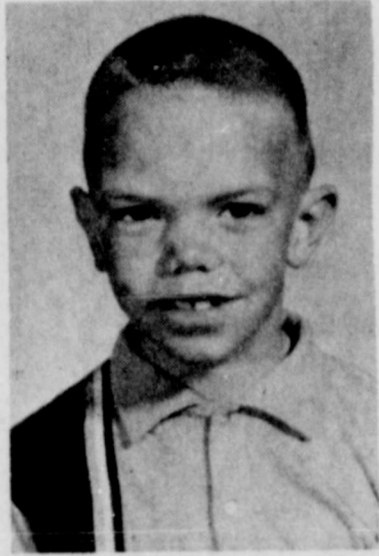

The house in which he was born, Feb. 23, 1897, once stood some 100 yards from the house in which he died.

Jack S. Barton and Miss Josephine Waddell were married Dec. 26, 1917, in Plainview.

Jack S. Barton was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Barton, who moved to this area in 1890 from Robertson County, J. J. Barton started the town of Bartonite northwest of Abernathy in the early 1900's. When the Santa Fe Railroad built its line from Plainview to Lubbock in 1909, it missed Bartonite by approximately 10 miles. Most of the Bartonite businesses moved to Abernathy which was founded in 1909.

Dr. Sam G. Dunn, 66, widely known Lubbock physician, died at 5:40 p.m. Friday, a short time before Jack Barton died. In addition to the normal physician-patient relation, Dr. Dunn and Jack Barton were friends of many years. Dr. Dunn's late father, the Rev. R. F. Dunn, once was pastor of Abernathy First Methodist Church, of which Barton was a member. Barton and Dr. Dunn both died of the same ailment.

The Abernathy Antelopes, getting down to the serious business of battling for the district crown, will face the stout Dimmitt Bobcats this Friday night at Dimmitt.

Dimmitt and Abernathy along with Friona are presently tied for second-place in district warfare with identical conference records of three wins and one loss. However, Dimmitt dumped the Memphis Cyclones 21 to 6 while the Cyclones edged past the Antelopes 15 to 13 earlier this season.

Of the two teams, Abernathy presently owns the better offensive record with Dimmitt holding the defensive record. Abernathy has scored a total of 97 points against its four district opponents whereas Dimmitt has only mustered 54 points. But on the other hand, Dimmitt has limited its four competitors to only 33 points while Abernathy has let 55 opposing points reach the scoreboard in district play.

Time for the clash is 7:30 p.m. at the Dimmitt High School stadium. Everyone able is encouraged to follow the Antelopes to Dimmitt. Only three more games remain on the 1967 schedule, and each is going to be tough. The Antelopes need your support.

Sherman scored from seven yards away in the first quarter and from one yard and 27 yards out in the second. His conversion and a two-point pass from Wayne Price to Gary Hamilton made the score 21-0.

Tommy Haggard's 35-yard return of a pass interception widened the margin to 27-0 at halftime. Haggard went three yards for a 33-0 lead in the third. Halfback Jerry Cooley's nine-yard run made it 39-0 before Roosevelt got on the scoreboard with a 7-yard run by Barry Blankenship. Junior Brown got his first two conversions.

Roosevelt scored again on a 3-yard run by Leonard Brown and it was 39-14. Then New Deal finished the night with a one-yard touchdown by Ronnie Taylor. Terry Martin converted.

The Abernathy Antelopes returned to their winning form handing the Lockney Longhorns a 31-to-20 loss here last Friday night, October 20.

Abernathy lit the scoreboard early in the first period as Travis Leach ensnared a 30-yard pass from quarterback Burl Fuller and went into the end zone standing up. The extra-point failed.

Following the recovery of a Lockney fumble in the second quarter, Fuller again fired a scoring bomb, this time a 23-yarder to Billy Elkins. A running try-for-extras failed.

Lockney put their first points on the board when Raymond Sterling caught a 20-yard pass from Robert Duckworth late in the second quarter. A faulty pass on the conversion sent the teams to the dressing room with Abernathy owning a 12-to-6 lead.

A four-yard drive by Antelope fullback James Byers initiated the second-half scoring. Darrell Selke intercepted a Longhorn pass and raced 40 yards to set the stage for Byers' TD. Again a running conversion failed.

An 11-yard pass from Fuller to Leach climaxed the Antelopes' longest thrust of the night covering 65 yards. Byers, on carries of 20 and 21 yards, accounted for the majority of the yardage and two of the drive's three first downs. Fuller's extra-point kick was good.

The City of Lubbock Contest will be November 22 at 2:00 p.m. at the Lubbock High School auditorium.

The winner of the various cities and communities will compete in the District 19 Contest on Dec. 1 at 1:00 p.m. in the Lubbock High School auditorium. The Legion's District 19 western boundary includes the counties of Bailey, Cochran, Yoakum, Gaines, and Andrews; and the eastern boundary includes the counties of Floyd, Dickens, Garza, Borden and Mitchell.

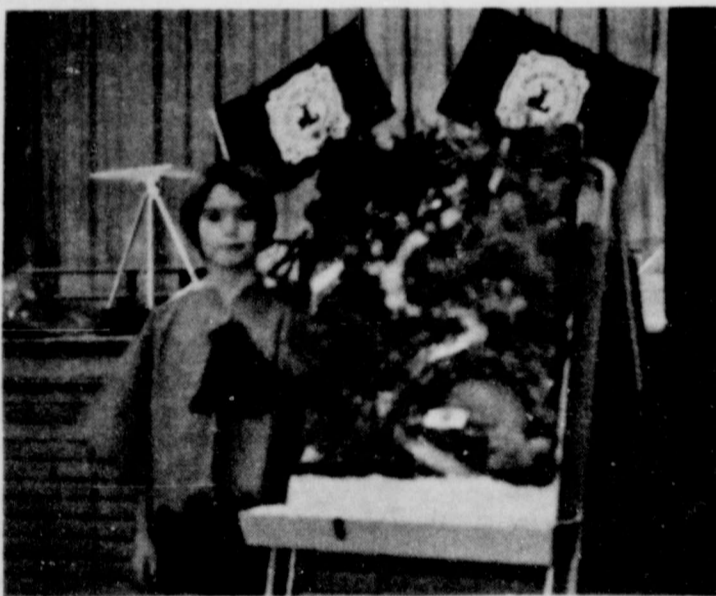
