

Q. I am a widow and will soon be 60 years old. Both my husband and I have worked and earned social security credit. Should I apply for widow's benefits or for retirement benefits based on my own work?

duced widow's benefits from age 60 to 62. At 62, full widow's benefits would be payable. A person may receive reduced retirement benefits on his own record between the ages of 62 and 65. Full benefits could be payable at 65 or after if no reduced benefits were paid.

If you would like to receive the reduced widow's benefits beginning at age 60, the people in your social security office at 1401-B West 5th Street, Plainview, will be glad to help you. Later when you are within 3 months of age 62 you may apply on your own record: however, after you have filed on both accounts, you will receive an amount equal to the larger

Q. I am receiving monthly social security checks, but I have not yet applied for medicare because I won't be 65 until February. How do I apply for medi-

A. Since you are now receiving social security benefits, you will automatically receive the hospital insurance protection under medicare, but you must request the supplementary medical insurance protection. About three months before you are 65 you will receive in the mail information about medical insurance and an enrollment card. If you want to enroll, fill out, sign, and return the card before the month you are 65.

SOCIAL SECURITY **Questions and Answers**

By MANCIE KING Social Security Representative

Q. I am a widow and will soon be 60 years old. Both my husband and I have worked and earned social 'security credit. Should I apply for widow's benefits or for retirement benefits based on my own

A. A widow may receive reduced widow's benefits from age 60 to 62. At 62, full widow's benefits would be payable. A person may receive reduced retirement benefits on his own record between the ages of 62 and 65. Full benefits could be payable at 65 or after if no reduced benefits were paid.

If you would like to receive the reduced widow's benefits beginning at age 60, the people in your social security office at 1401-B West 5th Street, Plainview, will be glad to help you. Later when you are within 3 months of age 62 you may apply on your own record: however, after you have filed on both accounts, you will receive an amount equal to the larger of the two.

Q. I am receiving monthly social security checks, but I have not yet applied for medicare because I won't be 65 until February. How do I apply for medi-

A. Since you are now receiving social security benefits, you will automatically receive the hospital insurance protection under medicare, but you must request the supplementary medical insurance protection. About three months before you are 65 you will receive in the mail information about medical insurance and an enrollment card. If you want to enroll, fill out, sign, and return the card before the

month you are 65. For further information of assistance, contact your social security office at 1401-B West 5th St., CA3-4371.
