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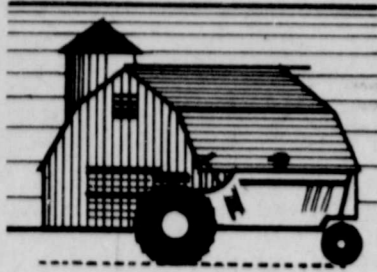

Officials Working With VA To Establish G. I. Bill Standards

Texas officials are now working with the Veterans Administration to establish standards for G. I. Bill on-the-job, apprentice-ship and farm cooperative training under the new law that became effective Oct. 1, according to Jack Coker, Manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco.

Monthly payments for this type of training were provided by Public Law 90-77, recently signed by the President, for veterans who had military service since February 1, 1955.

Interested veterans should contact the VA Regional Office at 1400 North Valley Mills Drive, Waco, Texas 76710, to see what institutional training has been approved in their area, and to learn how they can participate in on-the-job and apprenticeship training.

The new law requires the approval of the states involved and VA officials have been meeting with Texas officials so programs can get started as rapidly as possible, Jack Coker said.

Questions and Answers

Q. I am a widow and will soon be 60 years old. Both my husband and I have worked and earned social security credit. Should I apply for widow's benefits or for retirement benefits based on my own work?

A. A widow may receive reduced widow's benefits from age 60 to 62. At 62, full widow's benefits would be payable. A person may receive reduced retirement benefits on his own record between the ages of 62 and 65. Full benefits could be payable at 65 or after if no reduced benefits were paid.

If you would like to receive the reduced widow's benefits beginning at age 60, the people in your social security office at 1401-B West 5th Street, Plainview, will be glad to help you. Later when you are within 3 months of age 62 you may apply on your own record; however, after you have filed on both accounts, you will receive an amount equal to the larger of the two.

Q. I am receiving monthly social security checks, but I have not yet applied for medicare because I won't be 65 until February. How do I apply for medicare?

A. Since you are now receiving social security benefits, you will automatically receive the hospital insurance protection under medicare, but you must request the supplementary medical insurance protection. About three months before you are 65 you will receive in the mail information about medical insurance and an enrollment card. If you want to enroll, fill out, sign, and return the card before the month you are 65.

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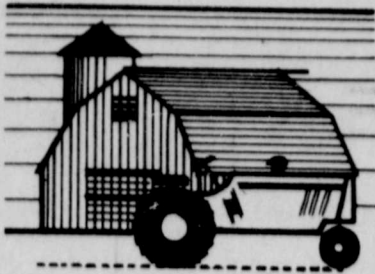

The new law requires the approval of the states involved and VA officials have been meeting with Texas officials so programs can get started as rapidly as possible.

Jack Coker said, Veterans with no dependents who enroll in full-time apprentice or on-the-job training will receive \$80 a month for the first six months. Veterans with one dependent will receive \$90; two or more dependents \$100.

Judge James A. Joy's candidacy for the Amarillo Court of Civil Appeals, 7th Supreme Judicial District of Texas, was unanimously endorsed by the Association, which also approved a resolution asking "that the people of this area join with this Association in support of Joy's candidacy."
