But, the building is not built. A lot of planning and inquiring; work and research; money-raising and floor-planning will be done before the first ground-breaking can occur. The point is-as long as Haskell has dreamed of a big civic center-this is the first time a set of officers and board of directors has been appointed to get the job done.




ON APRIL 22, 1970, the Department of Transportation brought forth its pape sions in 11 pages of small print in the Federal Register. Omitted in this snall any mention that the exemption of drivers of farm trucks was being ended I and over would have to take periodic physical and mental examinations. Down 21 would be prohibited outright from driving farm trucks. The new regulates go into effect on January 1, 1971.

ON DEC. 18, 1979, SCARCELY TWO WEEKS BEFORE THIS DATE, the Fault and the National Council of Farmer Cooperatives joined in a letter to the D of Transportation asking for postponement of the regulations affecting farm of grounds that farmers had not participated in this decision. At the 12th hord 31, the Department agreed to a 6-months postponement.

FEW ASPECTS OF FARM BUSINESS ARE MORE IMPORTANT to 18 transportation. The very nature of a farm-requiring space unclustered by tracks, warehouses, and markets-calls for special efforts. Supplies and equip ed for production purposes must be hauled to the farm. Commodities that an must be hauled away from the farm to market. It is the nature of farming that such jobs occur during the production and seasons when manpower is in shortest supply. It would be impossible to shift workers in to truck. A possible atternative to young drivers might be older whose driving reflexes are past the peak. Most of this driving occurs to-market roads. As a matter of fact, the safety record of farm drivers has viable; much better than the record of urban drivers.

SINCE POSTFONEMENT OF THE REGULATION, the Farmers Union and a groups, as well as Congressmen and Senators, have taken up the problem.
