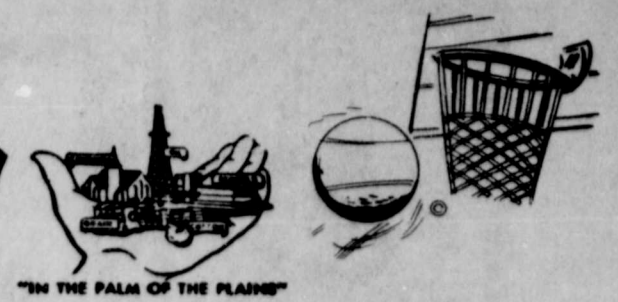

CINDY GARVIN 'IN CLOUDS' Abernathy Girl Crowned Sheriffs Poses Queen

Seventeen-year-old Cindy Garvin of Abernathy was all up in the clouds about being named Sheriff Poses and Riding Clubs 1968 Queen in Lubbock Saturday.

Which was not at all uncomfortable for a girl who hopes someday to become an airline hostess.

But she said she would be more than content to stick to horseback for quite a bit of the more than 16,000 miles she'll probably travel during the coming months to represent the organization in parades, rodeos and similar events throughout the nation.

Her coronation as queen after judging of 13 contestants capped the AASPRC's two-day 14th annual convention here Saturday.

Earlier, representatives of the 175 member chapters in 17 states elected Clark Janigan of Canyon as the organization's 1968 president.

Janigan succeeds Zip Taylor of Irving at the reigns of the organization which has more than 20,000 members, counting those in the recently formed Brisbane, Australia, chapter.

Other officers elected by the more than 200 persons convened here Friday and Saturday at the Holiday Inn Parkway were Dr. Robert Morse of San Angelo, executive vice president; R. B. Allen of Canyon, secretary-treasurer; and vice presidents in order of rank, Dwight Freshower of Little Rock, Ark., Dee Evans of Duncanville, Tex., Lowell Hamilton of Fort Worth, and Mike Lloyd of Lawton, Okla.

Miss Garvin, an Abernathy cheerleader, was crowned by the 1967 queen, LaWayne Schrader of Lawton, Okla.

A member of the Abernathy Riders Club for the past four years and the club's queen for the past three years, Cindy is the granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. D. Garvin of Abernathy.

Arno will join representatives of other chambers and civic clubs in collecting information which will benefit those of us unable to attend the fact-finding trip.

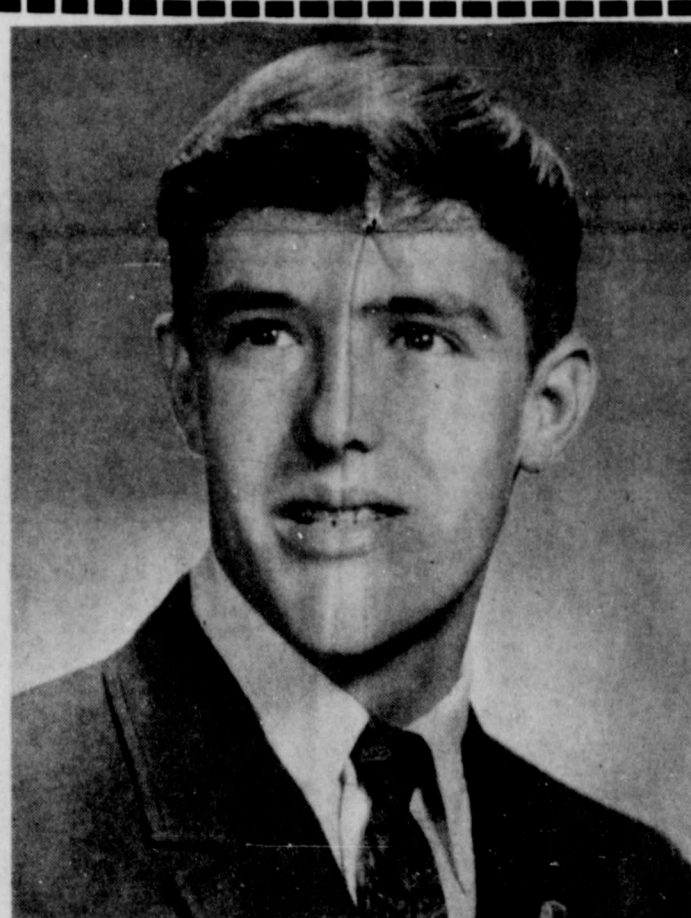

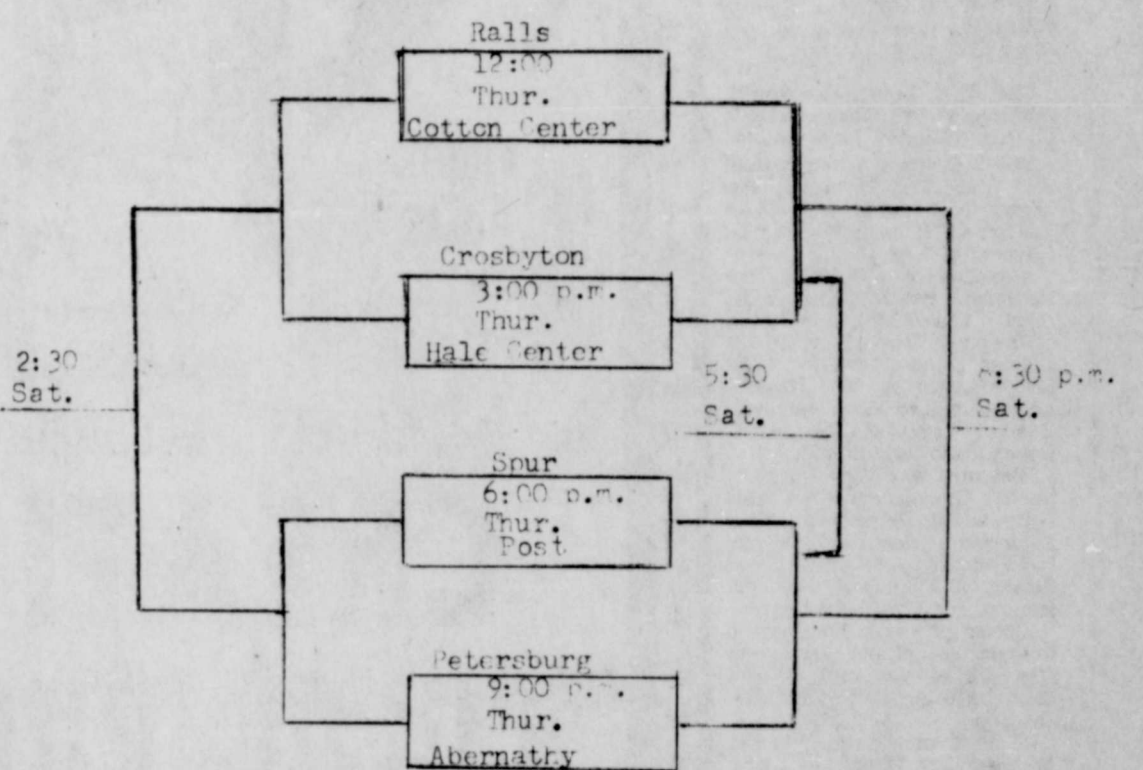

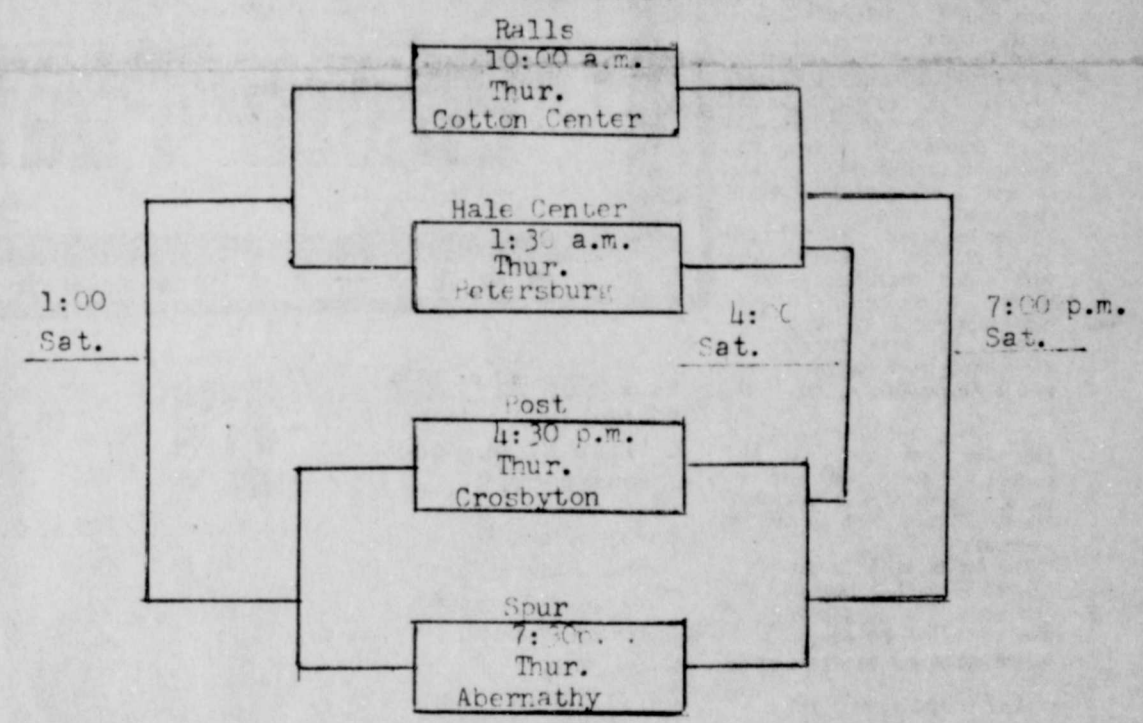

Several Area Residents
Plan Water, Inc. Tour

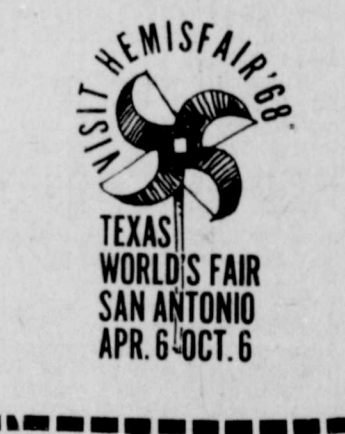
A group of area citizens will leave Amarillo and Lubbock by plane on Dec. 10 for California and a tour of that state's water projects.

Seventy-five area leaders and their wives will make the tour sponsored by Water, Inc., the recently organized water development agency. The tour members, representing some 30 West Texas and New Mexico communities, will return on Dec. 13th.

Itinerary Listed
John Kendrick of Brownfield, president of Water, Inc., said the group will visit state water officials in Sacramento and go from there to the giant Oroville Dam, the starting point of the \$1,750,000,000 California Water Project. "And the starting point of the tour," Kendrick added.

Among those making the tour from this area include W.B. Tilson, J.P. Walker and Homer Garrison of Plainview; Roy Jones and Mr. and Mrs. Arno Struve of Abernathy; Russell Grimes of Petersburg; H.L. Dent, Jr. and Wesley M. Davis from Hale Center; and Gene Collins Jr., L.B. Brandes, J.R. Belt Jr., Hershel Carthel and Chester Carthel of Leckney.

While in California, the water group will visit Kern County, located in the San Joaquin



Valley, one of the most intensively irrigated areas in the world. While there, the Kern County Water Agency in Bakersfield will explain the so-called "Master District" water agencies' operation to the tour members.

California, like the Water, Inc. region, is running out of underground water and has inaugurated a water transportation system to move over four-million acre-feet of water annually by open canal from northern areas of the state to the southern areas of need, a distance of some 440-miles. The system is coordinated with other water developments constructed by the federal government and local agencies, Kendrick said.

Kendrick explained that Water, Inc. is "looking for some of the answers needed toward solving the water needs of West Texas, Eastern New Mexico and Western Oklahoma. Californians have impounded, conserved, transported and made water available for beneficial use by their people. We hope to find some possible methods and procedures which we could adopt and use to finance and secure supplemental water supplies for our area."

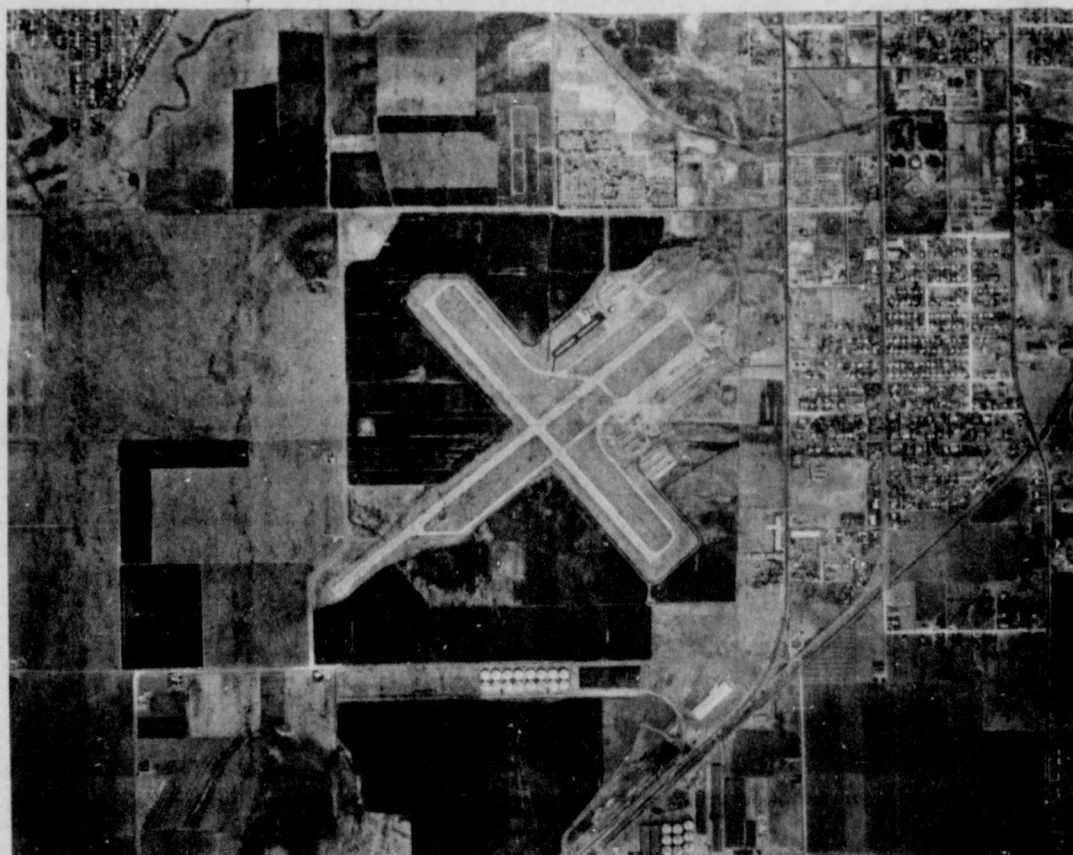

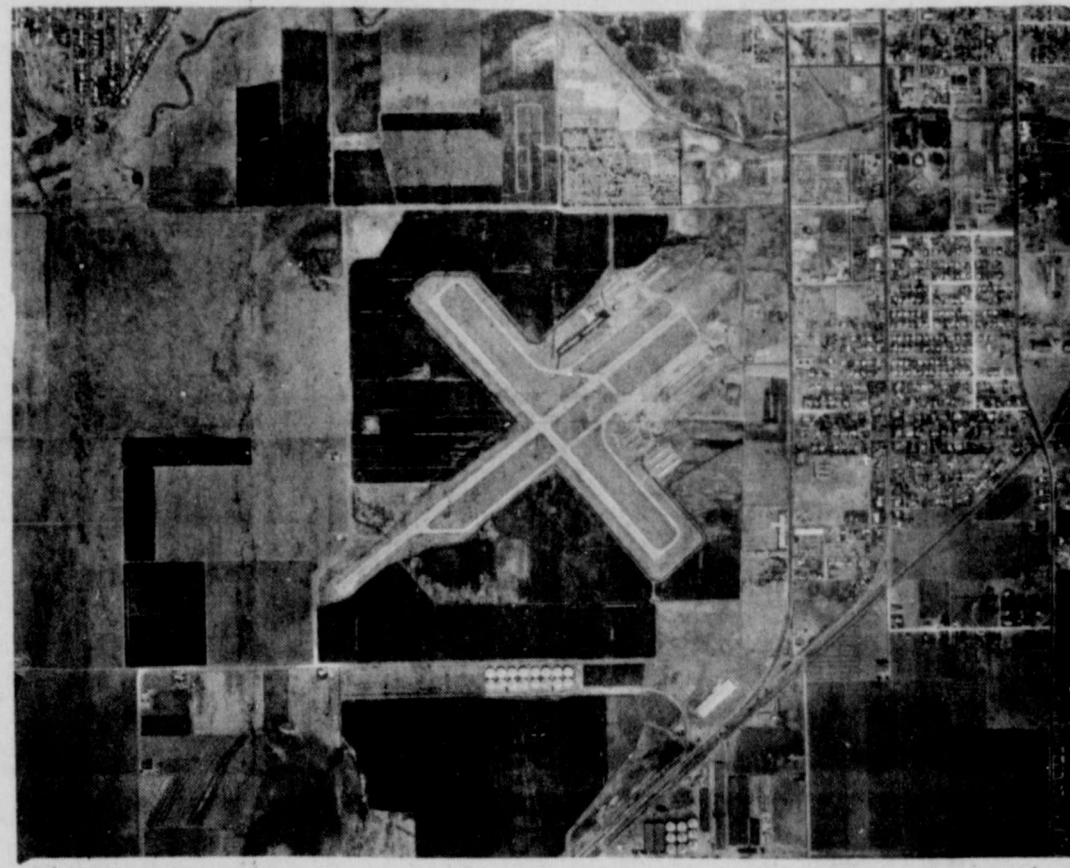

A survey party headed by Lt. James M. Wintermyre is in Plainview for field work which will require about two weeks.

The survey will cover a circular area around the airport and fan-shaped approaches to the runways. In these areas, the field party will determine and chart the height, location and other characteristics of any air traffic obstructions, along with the location of any air navigation aids. Runway lengths will be measured precisely.

Results of the survey will appear on an airport obstruction chart to be published in five or six months. The charts are used by the FAA in planning airport landing and take-off procedures.

To prepare the new chart, information obtained during the ground survey will be used in conjunction with aerial photographs taken earlier by CGS.

Draw Project Is Discussed

The Running Water Draw watershed project took up the bulk of the morning session of the Hale County Commissioner's Court meeting while insurance took up most of the afternoon meeting.

Meeting with the group for the morning session was Kelly Cook, a land rights specialist and engineer with the Soil Conservation Service in Temple.

Cook, along with SCS representative Jimmy Lewis, and F. F. (Flip) Calhoun, chairman of Hale County's soil and water conservation Dist., met to discuss obtaining easements on the watershed project so that actual work could begin.

Calhoun said the only other holdup on the project was the lack of a signature from representatives of the city of Plainview on a work order for either the Soil Conservation Service plan or a similar project with the United States Corps of Engineers.

Calhoun said all of the other agencies or government groups had signed work orders so that work in securing easements could begin. The overall project covers the Draw from Eastern New Mexico to just east of Plainview.

Still Own Land
Cook told the group that

when landowners granted easements, they would continue to own the land. Cook said the only rights given to the SCS are to use the land to build water-retarding structures and the right to come on the land to maintain the structures.

Meeting with commissioners in an afternoon session were representatives from several insurance companies. The persons were meeting to discuss group insurance for county employees.

After listening to several presentations, commissioners decided to meet next week to make a decision on awarding the insurance contract.

County Judge C. L. Abernethy said in the meantime he would contact other insurance men who had earlier expressed an interest in the contract to make sure none have been left out.

Also on the afternoon agenda was a discussion of a possible retirement system from Hale County employees, and a discussion of operation and maintenance of Hale County Airport.

The meeting was moved from its regular Monday meeting date since several commissioners could not be in town on the regular Monday meeting date.
