Everett, 54 years of age, is a candidate for County Commissioner, precinct three. He filed as a candidate for the post Tuesday, Dec. 19.

Precinct three includes Cotton Center, Hale Center and Abernathy. Currently serving as commissioner of the precinct is Ernest Rice of Hale Center who was appointed to the position following the death of the elected commissioner, Herschel Williams, earlier this year.

Everett has engaged in farming in the Cotton Center area for 38 years. He is an active member of the Methodist Church at Cotton Center and the Masonie Lodge and the Woodmen of the World at Hale Center.

DURING HIS ADULT life Everett has been a tireless worker for better hositals, churches, schools, REA, RTA natural gas for farmers and other worthwhile projects. A past president of the Hale County Farm Bureau, he has toiled for agriculture, several times on a high level that required personal visits to Washington, D. C., on such issues as the bracerro program, cotton marketing and sugar beet development for the Plains area.

He also has been a strong supporter of the extension service in its work for farmers title of the second grade proand youth in Hale County. and the FFA program.

Everett is the father of two sons, Wesley of Amarillo and Jesse of Mayfield, both gra duates of Cotton Center high school. His wife Florence, also has four children, Jean of Houston; Mary Ethel, a junior at West Texas State University in Canyon; James, a Marine posted in Florida; and Marvin, a senior at Hale Center high school.

EVERETT IS one of the founders of the Myasthenia Gravis Foundation which now serves the entire state of Texas and part of Oklahoma and Louisiana. The chapter was the first one of its kind organized west of the Mississippi River.

In his announcement, Everett said, "I believe in the future of Hale County. It is not only one of the top agricultural counties in the state, but it is also gaining in industry.

"I believe we need strong leadership in the commissioners Court to handle the county government for such a progressive area and to keep the wheels of progress rolling." He said that if he is elected

he will devote full time to serving the best interest of the precinct and the county, and will strive to give this precinct the strong representation it deserves, "If elected, I will represent every part of our precinct fairly and impartially," he said.

Presently he is a member of the County School Board, but Miss Alma Ruth Patterson he said he would resign from that position if elected to the commissioner's post.





Charges were to be filed on a Lubbock man for theft of a camper unit in Hale County.




