

RADIOLOG!CAL COURSE IS SET TO START HERE

A 16-hour course to train radiological monitors has been scheduled for Abernathy, according to City Manager Bob Sokoll. The course is designed to train individuals in methods and techniques of using radiological data, evaluation of radiological information, and reporting procedures.

Any citizen who has the desire to be of service to his community by acquiring technical knowledge to better meet the challenge of the nuclear age is elgible to attend this course. The classes will be held in the City Hall Clubroom beginning Tuesday April 9th. The classes will be three hours long and are scheduled for Tuesday April 9th. Thursday April 11th, Tuesday April 16th, Thursday April 18th, and Tuesday April 23rd. All classes will begin at 7:00 p.m.

There is no charge for attending these classes. All costs are borne by the Texas Education agency. The instructor for this course will be Bill Payne from Lubbock, who is an approved Radiological Monitor Instructor. Any citizen interested in attending this radiological course should contact Bob Sokoll at City Hall at his earliest convenience.


Ralph Wayne Is Conservative In 'Who's What'

HERALD AUSTIN BUREAU AUSTIN - Rep. Ralph Wayne of Plainview may not need the help until November, but his conservative constitutents will be reassured when they read Gen. James E. Taylor's unofficial "Who's What" rundown on legislative candidates.

Taylor, former state senator from Navarro County and now a lobbyist, had undertaken the task of defining candidates since Gen. Preston Weatherred died. The list doesn't have an official title nor is it published by an organization, but it's one of the best-read guidebooks Texas politics.




