COUNCIL CHECKS CITY BALLOTING

The Abernathy City Council met in regular session Monday, April 8, 1968, at 7:30 p.m. in the City Hall with the following members present: Mayor Roy E. Jones; Aldermen Lee Echols, Ralph Wolf, L. G. Deering, Joe Chambers and Royce Henson. Absent: None.

The minutes of the previous council meeting were read and approved as read.

The Council canvassed the returns of the City Election held April 6, 1968. The results of the election were as follows: ALDERMEN

Ralph Wolf----182 Royce Henson --- 206 Ray Sanders--- 99 M.S. Stevens--111 L.G. Deering -- 150 L.G. Deering moved and Joe

Chambers seconded that the Election Judge's decision be accepted and that the followected: Ralph Wolf, Royce Henson and L.G. Deering. Motion carried. Mayor Jones then administered the oath of office to the newly elected officials.

The City Council elected Royce Henson to serve as Mayor Protem. Royce Henson moved and Joe Chambers seconded that Lee Echols be elected to serve on the Lubbock Metropolitan Council of Governments. Motion carried.

The Council discussed the excess effluent at the city disposal plant. Ralph Wolf stated that it would cost approximately \$4,500 to dig an oxidation pond the size that had been proposed. Marvin Patterson stated that the City would have approximately 150 to 170 acre feet of water available annually that could be sold to any interested party. The Council appointed Mayor Jones to check with interested parties to see what the chances were for selling this excess effluent.

The City Manager reported that the indications were good that Abernathy might possibly receive city mail delivery in July of this year. The City Manager also presented the quarterly financial report.

Rose Has Faith Rose is a calm, cheery woman with a deep affection for, and a complete faith in every member of her family. Linc, the oldest brother, is twenty-two, tall, muscular, and most attractive in a virile, out-doorsy sort of way. The younger son, Lex, is 17, and very much like his brother. Cherry, the 19-year-old daughter, is very pretty, with the same vigor, health, and friendliness that the other

Millie Carpenter is a friend of Linc's that lives in the city. She is delightfully pretty and "completely charming." Cindy Garvin was cast in this part. A friend of Millie's is Rudy Leonard, a cheap romantic with a sort of "oily" quality. Rudy is portrayed by Bud Rhodes.

Adding a continental touch to the play are James Byers as M. Gaston, an expansive French chef; and Gary Lovelace as Tim O'Rourke, a robust, hearty, Irish policeman. Discreet appearances are made by Shirley Knight as a waitress, and Kirby Spruiell as a teen-age bellboy.






