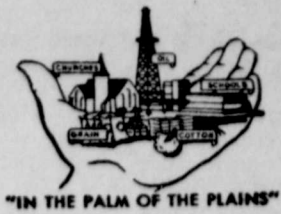

Big Crowd Votes In Texas Elections

Joy, Hazlewood Facing Runoff

Hale County box at Abernathy City Hall had a total vote of 569 Saturday, which may have been a record number of ballots marked in a Democratic Primary Election here. Aaron DuBose, election judge, and his staff worked to 5 a.m. Sunday counting votes and preparing tally sheets.

That election marked a first... the first time voters considered a candidate for U. S. Congressman, 18th District. Hale County will move from Congressman George H. Mahon's 19th District to the 18th Congressional District Jan. 1, 1969. Local voters cast 212 ballots for Dick Brown, 18th Congressional Democratic candidate.

In the race for Precinct 9 Democratic Chairman, Aaron DuBose was re-elected with 418 votes. Vic Struve and C. B. Beeson each received one write-in vote for the post.

Local voters gave James R. Ray 41 votes for Hale County Democratic Chairman. Write-in votes were: Mack Shurbet 12, C. B. Beeson 1 and Buford Conn 1. Ray won the post in the county-wide vote count.

Favored were the Unit Rule and Favorite Son status of Gov. John Connally during the Abernathy, Hale County, Precinct Convention held Saturday. Elected as Precinct 9 Delegates to the Hale County Democratic Convention in Plainview Court House at 2:30 p.m. Saturday, May 11, were Aaron DuBose, Y. F. Snodgrass, Ray Sanderson, Herman and Gary Lambert, G. W. Blackmon, E. M. Crow, Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Barnett, Mrs. L. A. Suttle, Hoppy Toler, Ivan Rhodes and Joe Lovelace. Alternates are Wesley Webb, E. J. Pope, Jr., and Rupert Lee Allen.

The propositions, non-binding as law, triggered the big turnout of voters here and over the state. Abernathy's Hale County box voted against liquor by the drink 426 to 113; against horse race betting 399 to 135, and against the milk commission 411 to 87.

The local Hale County box gave the front runners in the race for governor: Preston Smith, 253 and Don Yarbrough, 82. These men meet in the June 1st primary. Local voters gave Waggoner Carr 119 votes. Other candidates ranged from zero to 44 votes for Brisco. The Hale voters here joined the state in giving Ben Barnes a big vote, 451, for Lt. Gov., to a total of 68 for his two opponents. Vote for Comptroller were 253 for Calloway and 125 for Blankenship. Court Place 1: Davis 243 and McGee 162; Court Place 2: Denton 279, Reavley 149.

S. M. Harrison said 72 votes were cast at Lakeview. "Against" drew a majority vote on the three propositions. Vote in the races were: Smith 37, Yarbrough 5; Barnes 60 to a total of 6 for the other two in the Lt. Gov. race, the Unit Rule-Favorite Son combination drew a "no" majority in the Precinct Convention in Lakeview.

Abernathy, Lubbock County, and the New Deal boxes were covered in detail in the Lubbock Sunday Avalanche-Journal, giving the vote count in all races and propositions.

Judge James A. Joy of Plainview and attorney Jack Hazlewood of Amarillo will square off in the June 1 Democratic primary runoff vote for a seat of the Seventh Court of Civil Appeals.

Complete totals for all 46 counties in the Seventh Judicial District show Hazlewood with 62,594 votes to Joy's 53,905.

Attorney Bruce Miller of Hereford polled 13,328 in the same race to force the runoff. Final totals in the Democratic primary in race for Hale County Commissioner, precinct three, had Jack Eason winning without a runoff over two opponents.

Eason recorded a total of 775 votes, compared to 413 for Ernest Rice and 184 for Everett Masters. Eason and Rice are from Hale Center, while Masters is from Cotton Center.

Abernathy's Hale County box gave Judge Joy 360 votes, to 147 for Hazlewood and 19 for Miller. That box counted 306 votes for Eason, 141 for Rice and 81 for Masters, in the Hale County Precinct 3 Commissioner race.

Lakeview, Hale County, voted 43 for Judge Joy, 22 for Hazlewood and 4 for Miller. Abernathy's Lubbock County box voted 110 for Judge Joy, 73 for Hazlewood and 3 for Miller.

The box at New Deal School gave Judge Joy 106 votes, to 79 for Hazlewood and 6 for Miller.

New Deal Clubhouse voting was 91 for Judge Joy, 76 for Hazlewood and 11 for Miller.

GOP Convention

The Hale County Republican Convention will be held at 7:30 p.m. Saturday, May 11, at Hillcrest Elementary School in Plainview.

Voters in the Republican primary election, the first ever held in Hale Center, favored Paul Eggers for governor by a two thirds majority and strongly rejected proposals to legalize pari-mutual wagering, price controls on milk and liquor by the drink.

Cotton farmers in Hale County will vote the middle of May to decide whether they want to be able to sell or lease their cotton allotments outside the county. Joseph B. Stokes, Chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, has announced.

The referendum on the question will be conducted during the period May 13 through May 17. Ballots may be returned by mail or delivered by hand to the ASCS county office during that time. Mailed ballots must be postmarked not later than May 17 and must arrive at the ASCS county office before ballots are counted on May 22.

A social security representative will be working in the city hall of Abernathy Thursday morning, May 16, Maudie King, officer-in-charge of the Plainview social security office has announced.

"The purpose of his visit," King said, "will be to assist anyone who may want to apply for social security benefits, anyone who needs help with a medicare claim, or anyone who may have a question about any part of the social security program. Approximately the same service will be rendered there as in any social security office."

The City of Abernathy has made available a private interviewing room at the city hall. The representative will be there from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon, Thursday, May 16. Service will be provided in the order of arrivals. No charge is made for his service.

All residents of Abernathy and surrounding area whose addresses are Abernathy are served by the Plainview social security office.

If a social security beneficiary wants to inquire about his account, he may write the social security office at 1401B W. 5th St., Plainview, and ask that his record be brought, so that pertinent information may be available during the interview.

"If anyone is physically unable to meet the representative," King said, "he should notify the Plainview office and give the location of his home. The representative will drop by his home after noon."

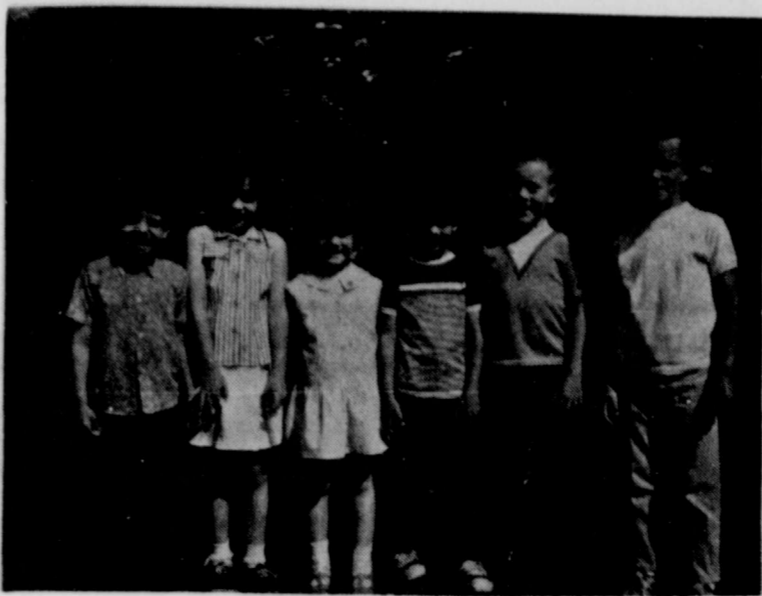

Mr. Charles Annett, publisher of the company magazine, THE SOUTHWESTERNER was present with his cameras and got a good picture of the cake before it was cut.

Everyone wished the Monks a long and happy retirement; and it was time to go home.

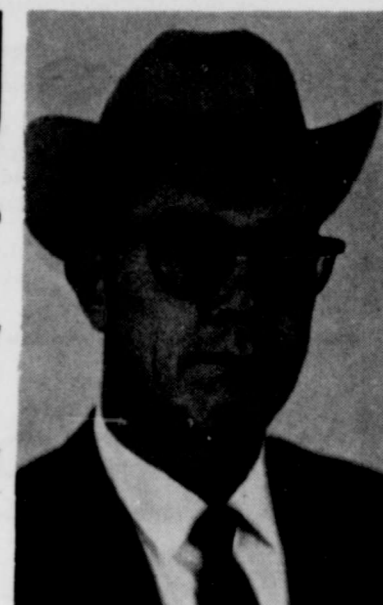
