Big Crowd Votes In Texas Elections

Hale County box at Abernathy City Hall had a total vote of 569 Saturday, which may have been a record number of ballots marked in a Democratic Primary Election here. Aaron DuBose, election judge, and his staff worked to 5a.m. Sunday counting votes and preparing tally sheets.

That election marked a first...the first time voters considered a candidate for U. . Congressman, 18th District. Hale County will move from Congressman George H. Mahon's 19th District to the 18th Congressional District Jan. I, 1969. Local voters cast 212 ballots for Dick Brown, 18th Congressional Democratic ca-

In the race for Precinct 9 Democratic Chairman, Aaron DuBose was re-elected with 418 votes. Vic Struve and C. B. Beeson each received one write-in vote for the post.

Local voters gave James R. Ray 410 votes for Hale County Democratic Chairman, Writein votes were: Mack Shurbet 12, C.B. Beeson I and Buford Conn I. Ray won the post in the county-wide vote count.

Favored were the Unit Rule and Favorite Son status of Gov. John Connally during the Abernathy, Hale County, Precinct Convention held Saturday. Elected as Precinct 9 Delegates to the Hale County Democratic Donvention in Plainview Court House at 2:30 p.m. Saturday, May II, were Aaron DuBose, Y.F. commission 411 to 87. The local Hale County box gave the front runners in the race for governor: Preston Smith, 253 and Don Yarbor-ough, 82. These men meet in the June 1st primary. Local voters gave Waggoner Carr 119 votes. Other candidates ranged from zero to 44 votes for Brisco. The Hale voters here joined the state in giving Ben Barnes a big voter, 451, for Lt. Eason recorded a total of 775 votes, compared to 413 for Ernest Rice and 184 for Everett Masters. Eason and Rice are from Hale Center, while Masters is from Cotton Center.

Abernathy's Hale County box gave Judge Joy 360 votes, to 147 for Hazl-wood and 19 for Miller. That box counted 306 votes for Eason, 141 for Rice and 81 for Masters, in the Hale County Precinct 3 Commissioner race.

ties by sale or by lease. Transfers of allotments by an owner. to a farm that he owns or controls may be made across county lines without regard to the outcome of the referendum.

In no case may transfers be made outside the State. An affirm ative vote by at least twothirds of the county's cotton farmers who vote will permit such transfers by sale or lease

Three similar referendums were conducted in 1965, 1966, and 1967, and growers in 95 counties throughout the Cotton Belt have already voted - in 1966 or 1967 - to approve such transfers for the 1969 crop.

Not Approved The 1965 vote, however, covered only the 1966-68 crops, so the vote this year will be held in counties where such transfers have not previously been approved for 1969, including those where transfers were approved in the 1965 vote.

The Chairman points out that voting by mail is easy and convenient and the vote therefore should be large and fully representative of the wishes of the cotton farmer in the county.

Copies of the ballot will be sent to all cottor producers of record in the county, together with information describing the program's purpose and opera-tion. Any cotton producer who has a question about the refer-endum or about who is eligible to vote is urged to get in






