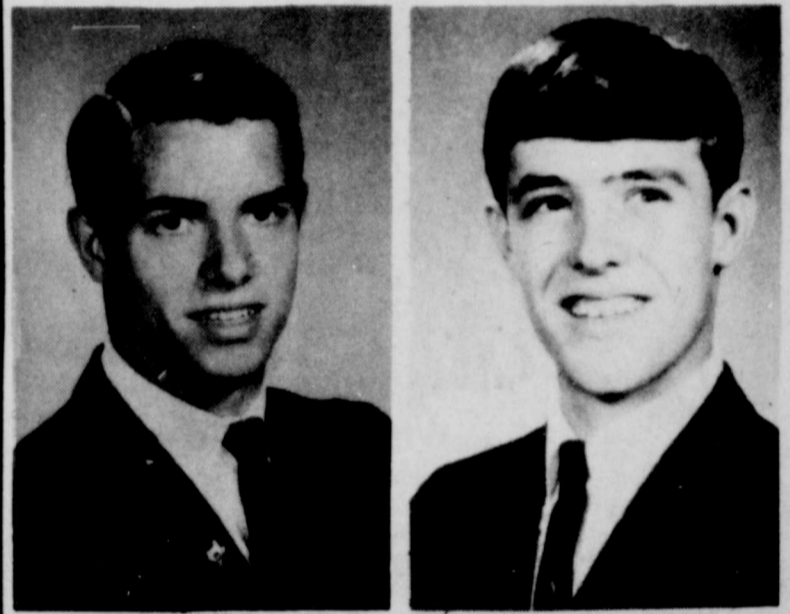

ASSEMBLY SCHEDULED
To Elect Three New General Superintendents

Delegates from Nazarene churches in this state and area will share in a rare denominational event at the 17th quadrennial General Assembly of the Church of the Nazarene at Kansas City, Mo., June 13-21. For the first time in church history, three of the six Nazarene General Superintendents, who comprise the supreme governing body in the church, will retire on account of age. Delegates will elect their successors.

The closest comparable situation in Nazarene church history was 20 years ago, in 1948, when two of the four men in office were new.

HIGHEST ELECTIVE POST
General Superintendent is the highest elective office in the Nazarene church. It corresponds to bishop in some denominations. The three clergymen retiring in June will have a total of 62 years of service in the office. They are: Dr. Hardy C. Powers, Dallas, Texas; Dr. G. B. Williamson and Dr. Hugh C. Benner, both of Kansas City, Mo.

The three other incumbent General Superintendents will be candidates for re-election to four-year terms. There will be a total of 680 official voting delegates at the Assembly, about half ministers and half laymen. They will represent 76 church districts in the U. S., Canada, Britain and 47 other world areas. Delegates from this church district will be:

Principal Airport from all obligations of deed without warranty from the United States to the City of Abernathy. Motion carried.

L. G. Deering moved and Joe Chambers seconded that Hal Howard, Olen Anderson and Floyd Shipman be appointed to the Board of Equalization for 1968, and that W. A. Scott be appointed to serve as alternate. Motion carried.

J. B. Jacobs and Paul Farras from General Telephone Company met with the Council to discuss the telephone company's discontinuing 2-party line business phones.

Ralph Wolf moved and Lee Echols seconded that Ordinance No. 160 be adopted. This ordinance will authorize General Telephone Company to freeze the offering of 2-party business phones in Abernathy. Motion carried.

The passage of a junk car ordinance was discussed in great detail and it was decided that the city could not enforce such an ordinance unless it is able to provide storage facilities for the junk cars for the required time. The State Statutes require a car confiscated or a junk car impounded to be stored 60 days before it can be disposed of. The Council instructed the City Manager to meet with the City Attorney and draw up an ordinance that would regulate the parking of cars, trucks, trailers, etc., for a specific time on all city streets and alleys.

The City Manager gave reports on the domestic well at the airport, monthly financial statement, street sealcoating project and reviewed the monthly police activity report. The Council instructed the City Manager to contact the Hale County Commissioner's Court and request that an Absentee ballot box be established at the Abernathy City Hall for all county-wide elections. No other business coming before the council, meeting was adjourned.

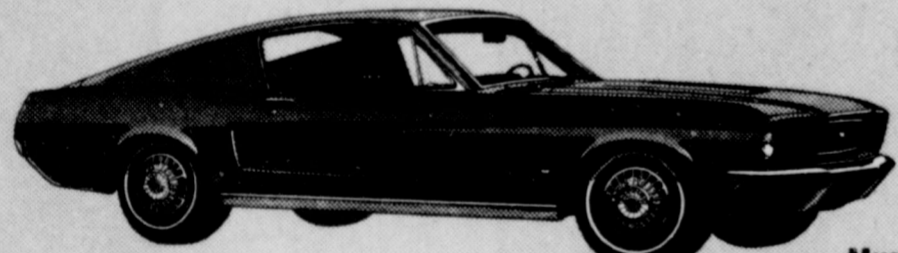

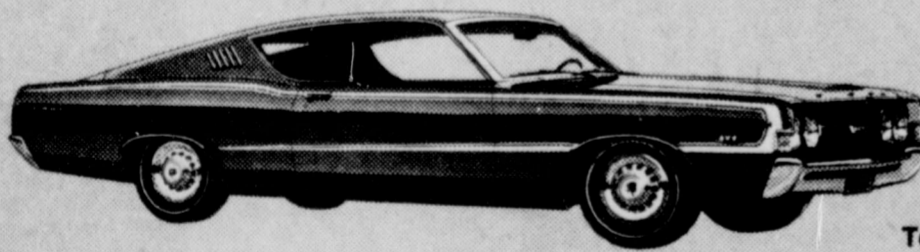
