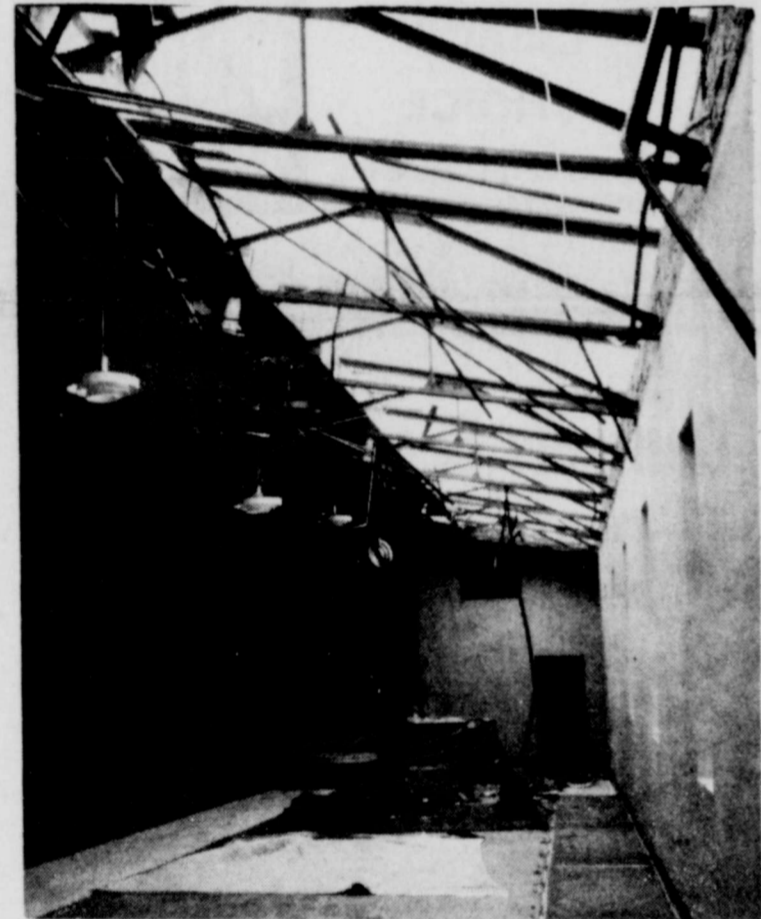

STORM DAMAGE HIGH AT NEW DEAL TWISTER RIPS ROOF OFF CHURCH

A twister ripped through parts of New Deal in a violent wind and rainstorm Friday night. Crops in the area west and east of New Deal and Abernathy were damaged by the storm, which also pelted the territory with hail. It knocked out windows in some homes in the County Line area.

First wind damage was noted on Mrs. Mary Stephenson's place north of New Deal, where roofing was ruffled from buildings. The drive-in dump area of New Deal elevator was demolished. A vegetable processing shed was damaged. The top was blown off the covered area over the driveway at Demp Webster's Service Station & Grocery. Plate glass was blown out of some buildings, and well houses and highway signs were damaged.

LOCAL BOYS WILL GO TO CAMP

The Abernathy Salvation Army Service Unit Committee will send two Abernathy boys to Camp Hoblitzelle for a week's vacation starting June 9th, according to the 1968 camp chairman, Robert Sokoll. "Our youngsters will be among 800 others from 313 Salvation Army Service Unit cities who will attend the big camp near Midlothian over a four week period this summer," Robert Sokoll said.

The boys are Mike Vandygriff and Gary Story. They will go to Midlothian via T.N.M. & O. Bus Lines. "It's a real opportunity for the kids who have never been to a real camp. At Hoblitzelle they enjoy boating, archery, horseback riding, swimming, crafts, movies, sports, worship services... you name it, and Camp Hoblitzelle has it."

Operated year around by the Salvation Army, the 370 acre camp near Dallas offers underprivileged youngsters and families a free vacation with all the modern facilities of a country club. Between now and Labor Day, over 2800 people will attend a total of 16 different camp sessions.

Sokoll said all organized activities are supervised by coaches and counselors. The campers are housed in brick redwood cabins, and receive well-balanced meals at the camp's own dining room. Camp Hoblitzelle was built through the generous gifts of more than 100 individuals in Texas. The Salvation Army operates the camp for the benefit of children and families who would otherwise not have the opportunity to enjoy camp life.

SUMMER SCHOOL DRAWS 72 PUPILS

The Board of Education of the Abernathy Independent School District met in regular session June 3 at 8:00 p.m. in the Board Room. Those present were: L.J. West, president; Billie Harrison, vice president; W.D. Sanders, secretary; and members Joe Oswalt, J.H. Myatt, Joe Lovelace, and Bob Riley. Also present were Earl Carter, business manager, and Delwin Webb, superintendent of schools.

Reports included budget progress report for the first 9 months of the school fiscal year, tax collection report showing that 98.18% of taxes collectible has been received and enrollment reports of membership for the year. The total membership for the year was 1106 which was an increase of 55 students over the same date last year.

Other reports included a lunchroom report, nurse's report, and reports on progress of the elementary library. A summer school report revealed that 72 students were enrolled in remedial reading and pre-school classes at the elementary level.

One new teacher was employed for the 1968-69 school year. She is Kathia Lynn Lack and she will be assigned to the junior high school level. Six vacancies remain to be filled. Next regular session of the board will be July 1 at 8:00 p.m. in the Board Room of the high school.

BY HALE GRAND JURY

Modernization Of Courthouse, Jail Facilities In County Recommended

Hale County Grand Jury last week issued a recommendation to the County Commissioners and County Judge calling for expansion and modernization of the courthouse and jail facilities.

Eleven of the 12 grand jurors for the January term were present to issue the recommendation, which on public record at the 64th District Clerk's Office, reads as follows:

"On this, the 27th day of May, 1968, the Hale County Grand Jury acting for the January Term, 1968, did give consideration to the adequacy of the existing courthouse and jail facilities, and the feasibility of expanding the same.

Need Underscored
It is the unanimous opinion and

recommendation of this Grand Jury that there is a definite need to expand and modernize both courthouse and jail facilities. In the courthouse, there is a need for a county courtroom, a commissioner's court, conference rooms, and additional office space. In the jail, there is a need for better facilities for juvenile and women prisoners, as well as additional office space for deputy work.

"It is the further opinion of this Grand Jury that the County Judge and County Commissioners are aware of these needs to expand and modernize the courthouse and jail facilities. There-

fore, it is the recommendation of this Grand Jury that these facilities be expanded and modernized commensurate with sound financial and fiscal policy, and that the County Judge and County Commissioners pursue such course of action with reasonable diligence."

The recommendation was signed by Hall Nall, Plainview, foreman of the Grand Jury. Members present were Nall, Ben Merrill of Edmonson, Curtis Lebow of Abernathy, Harold McCune of Abernathy, Bill Brington of Petersburg, Girard Fox of Plainview, Doug Ellison of Petersburg, Lowell Hoggins of Plainview, Jim G. McLaughlin of Plainview and Elton Wilson of Plainview.

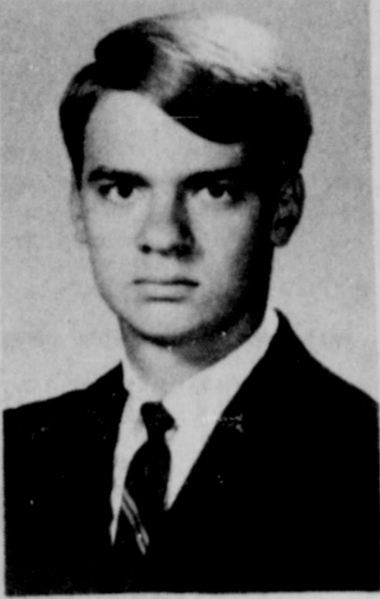

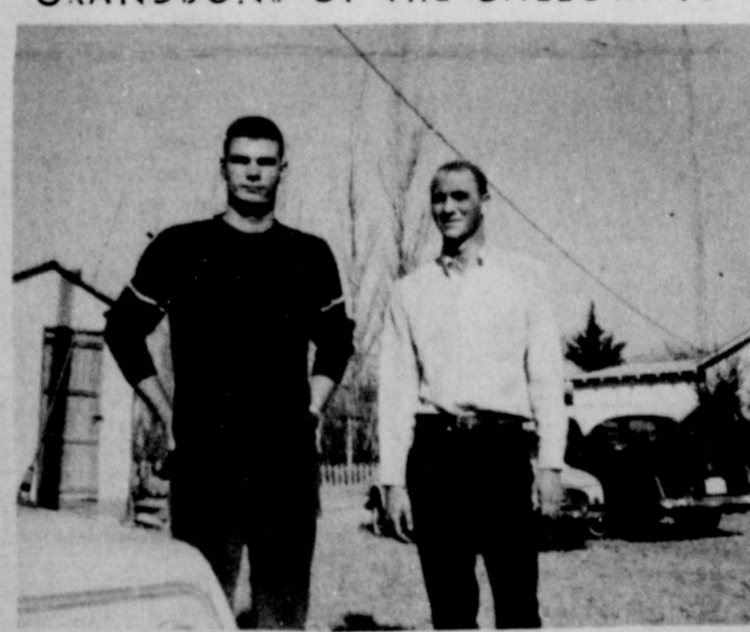

Mosquito War Again On Agenda Of Council

The Abernathy City Council held a Special Meeting at the City Hall, Wednesday, May 29th, at 7:30 p.m. Those present for the meeting were Mayor Roy Jones; Aldermen Lee Echols, Royce Henson, Joe Chambers, and City Manager Bob Sokoll. The purpose of the called meeting was to discuss an aerial mosquito spray program for 1968. It was reported by the City Manager that the tentative plans called for a co-operative venture involving Abernathy, Hale Center, Plainview, Hale County and the State Health Department.

Petersburg was to participate in the program, but withdrew due to the cost involved. The present program being considered will include a 35-square mile area. The breakdown on this area is: 27 square miles in and around Plainview, 5 square miles in and around Abernathy and five square miles at Hale Center. The program calls for six applications beginning around June 12th. This is the same area and number of applications that Abernathy received last year.

There will be no Federal participation in the program this year. The State Health Department tentatively has agreed to participate for research purposes. The City Council approved Abernathy's participation in the program, but did not take action on the financing of Abernathy's share of this cost. The "City Dads" agreed to wait until regular council meeting night, when the actual costs should be known.

The Council discussed one method of financing the program. That method was a \$1.00 per month service charge for all water meters in service until a sufficient amount is raised to pay for the actual cost incurred. This is currently how Plainview plans to finance their share of the cost. Depending on the participation of the State and County and the actual cost incurred, this \$1.00 per month service charge that will be added to the utility cards would be for a period of either four or five months.

County Delegates To Join Wallace Party Sessions

Former District Attorney Frank Gaston and Edmonson businessman Leon Melton will lead a Hale County delegation of approximately 25 persons to the state convention of the American Party in Fort Worth Saturday.

The American Party achieved its first victory in Texas on May 4 when more than 92,000 Texans pledged to support

George Wallace for president. Only 14,259 signers were required in order to place Wallace's name on the ballot.

R. M. "Bob" Morris, chairman of the Hale County American Party, stated that Gaston and Melton would act as spokesmen for the Hale County delegation. They will poll the delegation as required on matters of resolution and other matters of business, and report to the executive committee of the state.

Several persons who are not eligible to participate in the convention as delegates since they voted in the primary on May 4, have indicated they would like to attend as visitors. Word has been received from the state headquarters that they are welcome to attend.

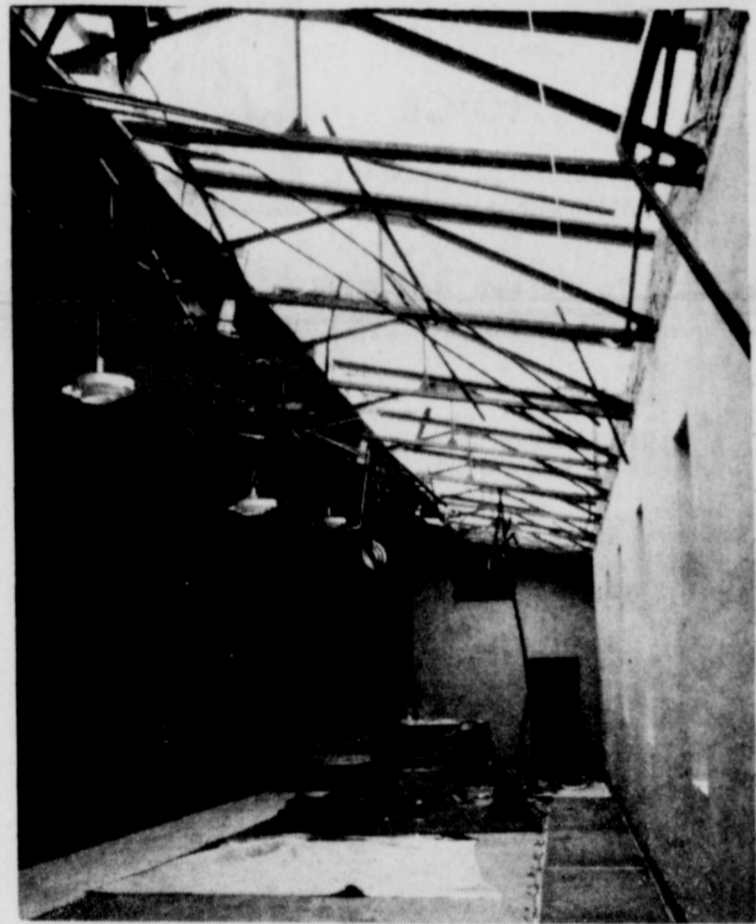
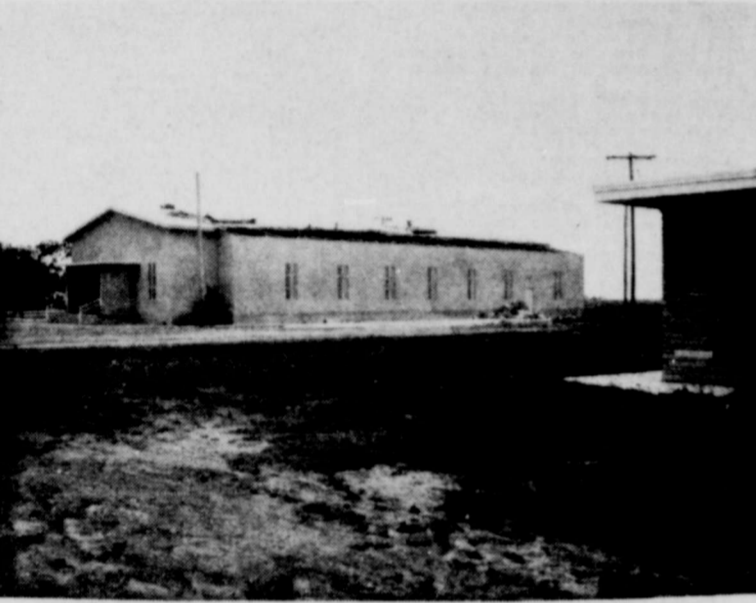
STORM DAMAGE HIGH AT NEW DEAL TWISTER RIPS ROOF OFF CHURCH

A twister ripped through parts of New Deal in a violent wind and rainstorm Friday night. Crops in the area west and east of New Deal and Abernathy were damaged by the storm, which also pelted the territory with hail. It knocked out windows in some homes in the County Line area.

First wind damage was noted on Mrs. Mary Stephenson's place north of New Deal, where roofing was ruffled from buildings. The drive-in dump area of New Deal elevator was demolished. A vegetable processing shed was damaged. The top was blown off the covered area over the driveway at Demp Webster's Service Station & Grocery. Plate glass was blown out of some buildings, and

well houses and highway signs were damaged.

Bearing the major damage was the roof on the north side of New Deal Baptist Church, which was ripped off. In the top photo is an outside view of the damaged church. At right in the picture is New Deal Church of Christ building, about 115 feet north of the Baptist Church. The Church of Christ building showed no storm damage. Also shown here is an interior view of the Baptist Church looking through the top where roof and ceiling had been lost. 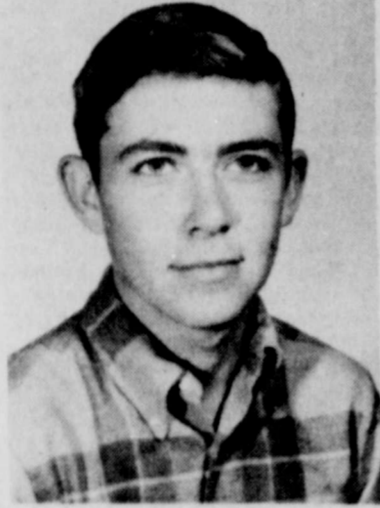
The boys are Mike Vandygriff and Gary Story. They will go to Midlothian via T.N.M. & O. Bus Lines.

Modernization Of Courthouse, Jail Facilities In County Recommended

Hale County Grand Jury last week issued a recommendation to the County Commissioners and County Judge calling for expansion and modernization of the courthouse and jail facilities.

Eleven of the 12 grand jurors for the January term were present to issue the recommendation, which on public record at the 64th District Clerk's Office, reads as follows:

"On this, the 27th day of May, 1968, the Hale County Grand Jury acting for the January Term, 1968, did give consideration to the adequacy of the existing courthouse and jail facilities, and the feasibility of expanding the same.

Need Underscored
It is the unanimous opinion and

recommendation of this Grand Jury that there is a definite need to expand and modernize both courthouse and jail facilities. In the courthouse, there is a need for a county courtroom, a commissioner's court, conference rooms, and additional office space. In the jail, there is a need for better facilities for juvenile and women prisoners, as well as additional office space for deputy work.

"It is the further opinion of this Grand Jury that the County Judge and County Commissioners are aware of these needs to expand and modernize the courthouse and jail facilities. Therefore, it is the recommendation of this Grand Jury that these facilities be expanded and modernized commensurate with sound financial and fiscal policy, and that the County Judge and County Commissioners pursue such course of action with reasonable diligence."

The recommendation was signed by Hall Nall, Plainview, foreman of the Grand Jury. Mosquito War Again On Agenda Of Council

The Abernathy City Council held a Special Meeting at the City Hall, Wednesday, May 29th, at 7:30 p.m. Those present for the meeting were Mayor Roy Jones; Aldermen Lee Echols, Royce Henson, Joe Chambers, and City Manager Bob Sobell. The purpose of the called meeting was to discuss an aerial mosquito spray program for 1968. It was reported by the City Manager that the tentative plans called for a co-operative venture involving Abernathy, Hale Center, Plainview, Hale County and the State Health Department. Petersburg was to participate in the program, but withdrew due to the cost involved.

The present program being considered will include a 35-square mile area. The breakdown on this area is: 27 square miles in and around Plainview, 5 square miles in and around Abernathy and five square miles at Hale Center. The program calls for six applications beginning around June 12th. This is the same area and number of applications that Abernathy received last year.

There will be no Federal participation in the program this year. The State Health Department tentatively has agreed to participate for research purposes. The City Council approved Abernathy's participation in the program, but did not take action on the financing of Abernathy's share of this cost. The "City Dads" agreed to wait until regular council meeting night, when the actual costs should be known.

The Council discussed one method of financing the program. That method was a \$1.00 per month service charge for all water meters in service until a sufficient amount is raised to pay for the actual cost incurred. This is currently how Plainview plans to finance their share of the cost. Depending on the participation of the State and County and the actual cost incurred, this \$1.00 per month service charge that will be added to the utility cards would be for a period of either four or five months.

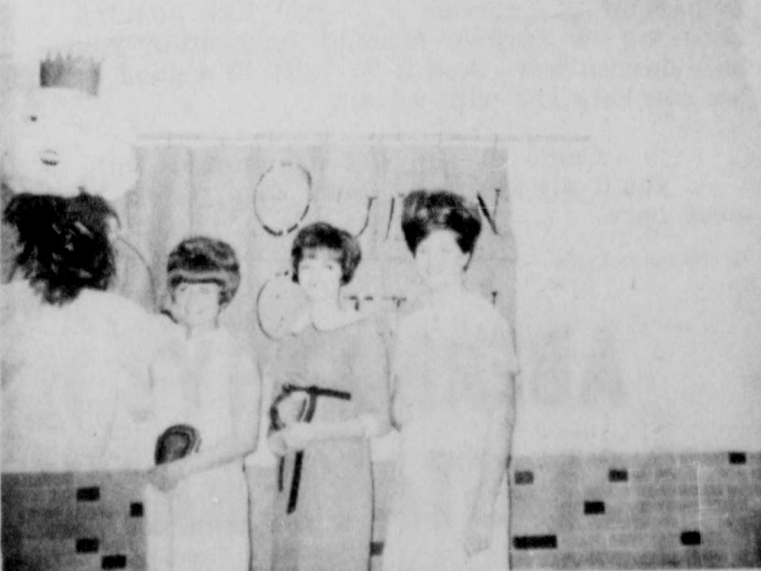

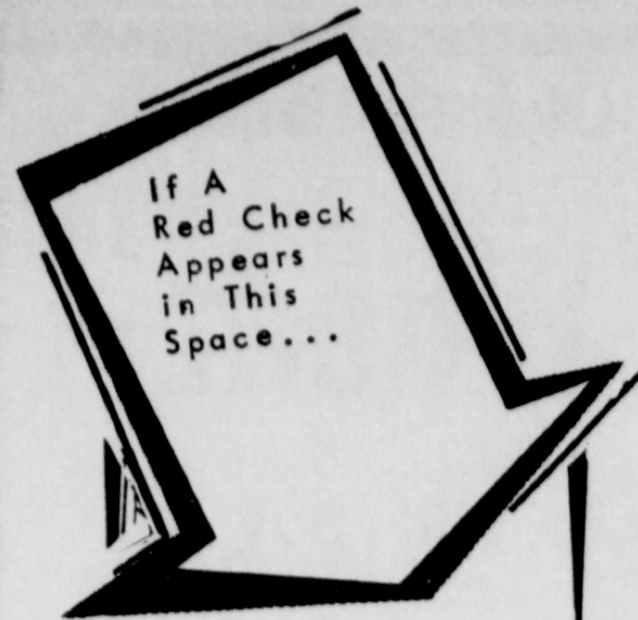

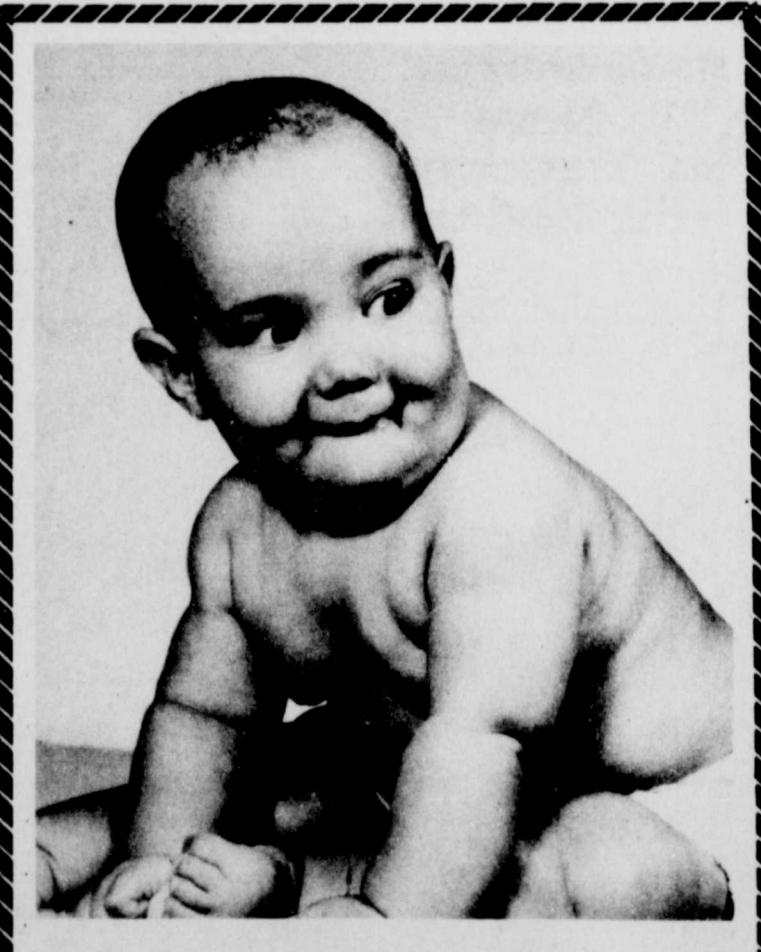
